



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

III. DAILY PROCEEDINGS

TWO HUNDRED TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Marriott Waterfront Hotel, Baltimore, Maryland

OPENING WORSHIP

Thursday morning, 10:30 AM, May 26, 2011

Ballroom

The people gathered to the singing of “*Uyai Mose, Tinamate Mwari*,” Shona for “Come, All You People.” Worship leaders processed in to the congregational singing of “O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing.” After an opening prayer, the gathering sang “Come to the Table of Grace.” This was followed by a litany, “Connecting through Racial Hospitality.” The Rev. Dred Scott moved among the congregation as he drummed a response. The Gospel reading was Luke 14:17-24. Bishop Schol introduced the preacher, the Rev. Alfreda Wiggins. He gave thanks for her ministry, stating that she has been a trailblazer. Mark Miller and others led the singing of “*Gracias Amigo, Gracias mi Dios*,” (“Thank You, Friend, Thank You, My God”).

Rev. Wiggins came to the podium. She called the people’s attention to Acts 1:8-9, reminding us that the coming Sunday was Ascension Sunday. She told a story of a girl visiting a southern city in which she observed the marked contrast between the condition of white churches and a small black church. The girl’s grandmother said, “The building ain’t the church. When we go inside, the church is what will be there, because we are the church.” Rev. Wiggins stated that her message that morning was “The Church Connected for a Purpose.” The church, she said, is an organism consisting of men and women, boys and girls, who have accepted Jesus Christ as their savior.” Jesus holds the deed to the church. When he ascended, it was both a sad and a happy day. Rev. Wiggins suggested that Jesus’ words just prior to his Ascension and the aftermath of that event speak to a church connected for a purpose.

Before his Ascension, Jesus taught the disciples about empowerment. The disciples needed to wait for the promise of the Holy Spirit. They had to wait until the power came. The purpose of the Holy Spirit may not be what we think it is. The first thing the Holy Spirit empowers us to do is to be witnesses and disciple-makers in the world. No matter where we are, we are expected to be witnesses. Jesus said that after the Holy Spirit comes, we shall be his witnesses. We have the power within us to be witnesses. We have been empowered by the Holy Spirit of God and our power is unlimited because God wants us through Jesus Christ to let somebody know that there is still power in the Holy Spirit. Wherever we go we ought to be the voice with the purpose for connection — we ought to be about connecting with those persons who are not in Christ.

The Ascension was no ordinary event. It was a miracle. God specializes in miracles and it is going to take a miracle to do the work God has assigned us to do as disciples to bring in other disciples. All of the people at the annual conference session are miracles. If it had not been for the Lord on our side, where would we be? Because we are miracles, we ought to witness — to tell somebody else that what the Lord has done for me, he can do for you also. Where there is proclamation of the Gospel, there will be miracles.

The angels (in Acts 1:11) asked the disciples where they were gazing. Rev. Wiggins challenged us, “Stop gazing and start grazing — grazing for new disciples.” If we are not careful, gazing will lead to spiritual paralysis. It’s time for the church to stop gazing. We need to be reminded that we still have work to do. God is calling us to be the servants who seek out the least, the last, the lost, the left out, the lowly and the lonely. In Luke 14, Jesus teaches us that we must leave our comfort zones and go and bring others into the Great Supper. How many congregations, Elders, preachers, church members can say that we have done what God told us to do? At the Great Supper we can all be connected. There’s still room at the table. Rev. Wiggins said she was reminded of a hymn she had sung as a girl in Sunday School, “So you bring the one next to you, and I’ll bring the one next to me; In no time at all, we’ll have them all; We’ll just win them one by one.”

There was a preacher friend of hers, Rev. Wiggins said, who wouldn’t let his congregation sing, “When We All Get to Heaven.” His position was that “we can’t all get to heaven until we all get together.” So his congregation sang, “When we all get together, what a day of rejoicing that will be. When we all see Jesus, we’ll sing and shout the victory.” Rev. Wiggins ended her sermon with, “When the morning comes and all the saints of God are gathered home, we’ll tell the story of how we’ve overcome, and we’ll understand it better by and by.” Mark Miller and group then lead the singing of the hymn “Well Understand it Better By and By.”

Bishop Schol announced that the offering that would be taken would go to aid those who had been victimized by the numerous natural disasters throughout the world. The offering was collected as the congregation sang “I Need You, You Need Me” and “God Has Work for Us to Do.” A prayer of dedication followed. The offering totaled \$58, 866. The congregation sang, “I Come with Joy” as the table was prepared for the sacrament of Holy Communion. Bishop Schol and Bishop Forrest Stith led the liturgy. The congregation came forward to receive the elements as we sang “Bless the Lord, My Soul,” “Come to the Table of Grace,” “I Come to the Garden Alone,” and “Draw the Circle Wide.” Bishop Schol offered the benediction, exhorting us to tell others about the love of Jesus Christ and what God has done for us. People departed the ballroom to the singing of “Glory, Glory Halleluiah” (“Since I Laid My Burden Down”).

FIRST PLENARY SESSION

Thursday afternoon, 2:00 PM, May 26, 2011

Ballroom

Members of the annual conference poured into the ballroom to the singing of “Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing,” “Come, O Redeemer, Come,” and “In the Name of Jesus, We Have the Victory.” Bishop Schol introduced Mark Miller who in turn introduced the singers and instrumentalists of the band. After the singing of “All My Days,” Rev. Herb Watson led the conference in the opening prayer, asking that we let self decrease so that God’s Spirit can rise within us.

Bishop Schol asked if Rev. Ernst Johnson was in the assembly. He then told the gathering that Rev. Johnson has been attending Annual Conference since 1927. While serving as a pastor of a church in Sykesville, the annual conference gave Rev. Johnson’s congregation funds to start some housing in the community. Now Rev. Johnson was presenting the Annual Conference with a check for \$1,000 for homeless ministry and challenging other clergy to also support homeless ministry. The Bishop then offered a prayer of healing on behalf of Rev. Callie Matthews who had been taken to the hospital earlier that day.

Organizing the Conference: Bishop Schol called the 227th Session of the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference together. He turned to Conference Secretary Mary Jo Sims, who made the following motion:

In order to expedite the business of the Annual Conference, the following motion is offered. Be it ordered that:

1. The printed agenda in the *2011 Annual Conference Booklet*, subject to such changes as may be deemed necessary, shall be the agenda of the Annual Conference.
2. The bounds of the Conference will be all chairs in the Grand Ballroom, excepting those on the extreme left and right, as designated by *Conference Guest* signs. Those chairs are not in the bar of the Conference, but are for guests and non-voting members. People standing, or seated outside the bounds of the Conference, shall not have voice or vote on legislative matters or balloting.
3. The roll call of attendance shall be taken from credential cards presented by members of the Conference at the time of registration.
4. Requesting permission to speak at one of the microphones and voting will be indicated by lifting the voting card received at registration.
5. The following people be approved as the Secretarial Staff for this session of the Conference: Joyce King, with Pauline Wilkins coordinating the pages and tellers and Yvonne Mercer-Staten coordinating the marshals.
6. The Rules of the Session as printed in the *2007 Conference Journal*, subject to any revisions as may have been or may be presented and adopted by the Annual Conference, shall be the rules of this 227th session
7. The councils, boards, commissions, committees and task forces as printed in the Commission on Nominations Report, in the *2010 Conference Journal*, subject to such changes as have been made or needed, in tandem with any organizational changes effected by this Session of the Annual Conference shall be the agencies of the conference until June 30, 2012.
8. Questions of agenda shall be addressed to selected members of the Agenda Committee: Rev. Ianther Mills or Rev. Evan Young.
9. Only such reports and material given to the Conference Secretary by June 24, 2011, shall be printed in the *2011 Journal*.
10. Recommendations or action items not in the Pre-Conference Booklet or in the Conference Packet shall be handled according to paragraph 5410.1.g.4, page 544, in the 2007 Conference Journal.

I move its adoption.

After some clarification regarding the bounds of the Conference, the motion was passed. Bishop Schol then drew the body's attention to the page in the Conference Booklet entitled "You Are Invited to Holy Conferencing," a statement formulated by the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church.

The Episcopal Address: The bishop then introduced the following: Delores Oden, Conference Lay Leader; Robert Slade, Chair of the Discipleship Council; Charlie Moore, Chair of Conference Council on Finance and Administration; and Ianther Mills, Dean of the Cabinet. They, along with nearly 20 leaders of the Conference, participated in the shaping of the Episcopal Address, which the body was to hear shortly, and a Report from the Leaders of the conference, which would be presented later in the conference. The bishop expressed his gratitude for the leaders who had helped with the addresses and then asked for a period of silence and prayer. Mark Miller and his band led the singing of “Sanctuary.” The bishop offered a prayer that God would be with us and that we would become God’s vessels; that God would use all of us to speak to one another and to hear one another and that in our speaking and hearing we would listen for God’s voice.

The bishop began the Episcopal Address by reading from Paul’s letter to the Philippians:

“Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal;
but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own.”
– Philippians 3:12

He then continued, saying:

The Apostle Paul writes to the Philippians to encourage them and his words echo through the centuries to our ears today. “Press on toward God’s call.” Today’s *Call to Action* is as urgent as God’s call to Abraham, Mordici’s call to Esther, Jeremiah’s call to the Israelites, Jesus’ call to his disciples, and John Wesley’s call to a new society called Methodists. The call is the same in every instance: “I need you for such a time as this.”

For times such as this, in a world besieged by war and poverty, environmental calamity and economic uncertainty, hunger and conflict – and, yes, in places, even hopelessness – God calls us to be a forward-leaning people. We are not to turn away from the fierce oncoming wind. God’s challenge to us as the people of the United Methodist Church is to LEAN INTO IT.

How do we know where to lean when winds are swirling all around us? How do we know which direction to lean into? We look to what the mission of The United Methodist Church calls us to do – make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

God’s plan for us could not be more simple, nor more crucial, at this hour. We are to be a people united by pressing on into the growing numbers of non-religious and nominally religious people. God calls us to press on to connect with the people in our communities and in our lives, those whose hope may be shaken by the great challenges of our time. We are called to share with them the hope we are given through God’s grace.

God calls us to join the un-churched and spiritually hungry into the celebration of the jubilant word that Jesus has made ALL of us his own! PRESSING ON is the essence of who we are as United Methodists.

For inspiration, we need look no further than the amazing examples right here in our own backyard – congregations and individual United Methodists right here in the Baltimore-Washington Conference who, despite the pressures of their everyday lives, are findings ways and time and energy to lean into the wind. They are pressing on toward the goal of Jesus Christ.

- **THEY ARE DOING SO WITH COURAGE.** Oakland Church in Charles Town, W.Va., was faced with a lawsuit by neighbors because of their feeding program and growing ministry with youth. God helped them prevail and preserve the right of area congregations to provide outreach ministries in the community. Even in the midst of the lawsuit, the congregation pressed on with its ministry in the face of adversity.
- **THEY ARE PRESSING ON WITH RADICAL HOSPITALITY.** The Calvary Church of Great Cacapon, W.Va., is taking ministry to their community. The Rev. Richard Voorhaar and the people of Calvary are visiting every family in their community in an effort to see how the church might serve and connect with the community more fully.
- **THEY ARE PRESSING ON WITH COMMITMENT.** Manna House, one of the largest soup kitchens in Baltimore, faced closing. Numerous congregations stepped forward to send volunteers and to pay approximately \$450 to feed 165 people each week.
- **THEY ARE DOING SO WITH VISION.** Our renewed focus on starting new faith communities by adding worship services has inspired 10 new worship services already this year.
- **THEY ARE PRESSING ON WITH FORGIVENESS.** The Rev. Chris Gobrecht in Cumberland has used his Internet savvy to create an open dialogue on faith with families of those in prison and awaiting trial.
- **THEY ARE DOING SO WITH OPEN MINDS & HEARTS.** The Mt. Winans-Westport Community of Shalom Center is in the process of transforming an asbestos-ridden school closed for over 30 years within the community into a \$5M state of the art facility that offers health-care, recreation and economic empowerment opportunities to all in need.
- **THEY ARE PRESSING ON WITH INGENUITY.** Churches in Hagerstown and Frederick have joined forces with other community groups to participate in the Bikes for the World program, where on one day 500 used and under-used bicycles were collected, cleaned and packed for shipment to people in Africa, who will use their new bikes for business travel, pastoral visitation, getting to work, to school and for providing an income for their families.
- **WE ARE DOING SO WITH FAITH.** This year, we had nearly 6,000 participants at our ROCK youth event, our most ever, where 2,000 youth committed or recommitted their lives to Christ.

The United Methodists of the Baltimore-Washington Conference are not merely pressing on at home. We press on with our sisters and brothers around the world.

- **WE ARE PRESSING ON WITH PERSERVERANCE.** In the Ivory Coast as political upheaval ignited conflict and bombs were falling, much of the nation was taking refuge. When all of the radio stations shut down, one continued to operate, the United Methodist-sponsored radio station offered hymns of the faith, words of hope and prayer to a war torn nation.
- **WE ARE PRESSING ON WITH TENACITY.** Throughout Africa, where United Methodists have distributed malaria nets, incidents of malaria have gone down. In Sierra Leone, where we have blanketed much of the country, cases of this deadly disease have gone down across the nation by 38%. In the Zimbabwe villages where BWC teams have distributed bed nets, there has been a reduction of as much as 80 to 90%.

- WE ARE PRESSING ON WITH FAITH. In Aertil, Russia, a family with nine children, seven of whom were adopted, prayed that a place of prayer might be created in their village, which had recently experienced a spate of violence. So the family chose to build a prayer room attached to their home and invite all the people of the village in.
- WE ARE PRESSING ON WITH TIRELESSNESS. We are in Japan, Haiti, Alabama, New Orleans, along the Mississippi bringing ongoing relief through UMCOR. Our United Methodist relief work has been ranked among the top five relief agencies in the world.

We need only look around to see examples of fellow Wesleyan people pressing on every day in ways that are surprising, amazing, and a sign that God has never been more active among us. And there has never been a more important time for us to focus on that activity. For as we know, the United Methodist Church – our congregations, our conferences, our denomination – is challenged in ways that we never have been before.

Recently, The United Methodist Church released a sweeping study of the denomination. It is being called one of the most in-depth studies by an outside group of any denomination, ever. The study sought to do something critical: understand *what vital congregations do to make themselves vital*. The study measured vitality in three ways: 1. Congregational growth over a five-year period of time, 2. Significant engagement of members in ministry and the mission of the church, and 3. Healthy stewardship that is measured by giving to mission.

The study reviewed the statistics of 33,000 United Methodist churches in the United States over a five-year period of time and found that approximately 5,000 were highly vital. Only FIFTEEN PERCENT of our congregations were found to be “highly vital.”

The study found that United Methodists face a common obstacle. That obstacle is our denomination’s “adaptive spiritual challenge.” It is this “adaptive spiritual challenge” that is the “WHY” behind the discouraging numbers you saw on the screen just a moment ago.

This adaptive spiritual challenge is defined in four key ways:

1. We have deep division and mistrust at all levels of the church, which renders us unable to respond to the needs of our communities around us.
2. We are adverse to what the report called metrics. We are not comfortable with setting goals and measuring the fruits of our work in answer to God’s call. This enables us to continue to do things that are not working.
3. We do not have enough turn-around leaders, leaders who courageously face the challenges and inspire people toward greater goals. We need leaders who press on toward the goal that is set before us.
4. We are not connecting with the nominally and non-religious people in our communities. Instead, we chose to connect with people who think like us, act like us and look like us.

Our denomination’s “adaptive spiritual challenge” is quite different than the challenges with which many of us are more familiar – our “technical” challenges. A technical challenge, for instance, is *what time are we going to hold Sunday morning worship?* The adaptive spiritual challenge is *how do we attract and offer a meaningful worship experience to the non-religious and nominally religious people in our community.*

We tend to avoid or deny our adaptive spiritual challenge because it is harder. It forces us to face our weaknesses and vulnerabilities. It forces the people inside the church to change, to change our hearts and minds, for we have to change before we expect others to change.

Paul pressed on toward the goal because his heart and mind went through a radical transformation on the road to Damascus. What will be The United Methodist Church's Damascus road experience. Today we see congregations leading in addressing our denomination's adaptive spiritual challenge. They are changing their hearts and minds for new ministry as they seek to be like Christ. For example, Cabin John UMC responded adaptively as they considered the challenge of how to reach out to fellow Chinese immigrants, many of whom work late Saturday night at area restaurants and are unable to attend church Sunday morning. Their answer: Rev. Ek Ching Hii started a worship service from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m. on Monday nights at Taipai 101 Restaurant. The 11 or so workers, who all speak Mandarin, gather with Hii after their shift and worship and fellowship long after midnight.

But even as we reflect on changing hearts and minds, both inside the church and out, let's talk about some of our major technical challenges. For in many ways, they form who we are and how we view our faith lives today. For our small congregations, the cost of clergy and property is increasing at a faster rate than incomes in our urban and rural communities. This creates increased demands and challenges for our smaller churches. We commit to work with you to appropriately grow your congregation's disciples, ministry and stewardship. We also are committed to reducing the amount we apportion your congregation so that you have additional resources to make disciples and grow your congregations.

- Franklin UMC in Churchton continues to reach out to the community through a six-week summer enrichment camp which is free to the participants and is a collaborative effort with local businesses. They also started a new way of doing Sunday school which was modeled from the Summer Enrichment Camp. As a result of both programs, some of the children of the community have started attending the church along with their parents and other family members.
- Last winter, the congregation of Mt. Calvary UMC, a small church in Charlotte Hall in the Washington East District, began serving a hot meal to anyone who stopped by on Thursdays at 6 p.m. Soup for the Soul with Scripture (SSS) reflects the spirit of the program, which serves its meals on china and offers up Christ to whoever hungers.

Our larger congregations face greater expectations by worshippers; significant programming demands that need more building and parking; the expectation of greater variety and quality of ministry, all of which place a heavy demand on fundraising. We understand that many of the resources the conference provides generate from within your congregations, and yet you pay a significant amount of apportionments. We are grateful for the sacrifices you are making and what we are learning from you. You are raising the entire annual conference up as you create new ministries and opportunities that make new disciples and strengthen the overall ministry of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

- The former AP Shaw church, now the Brighter Day Multi site Parish, has assumed responsibility for three challenged congregations in Southwest Washington. By infusing those churches with leadership, they are growing as disciple-making and community-transforming congregations.
- Mt. Zion Church in Bel Air has taken responsibility for creating permanent housing for the homeless in Harford County.
- Foundry Church in Washington, D.C., is helping the Baltimore-Washington Conference repurpose the Calvary Casa property into 79 units of permanent housing for the homeless and

a space for an appropriate-sized congregation that makes mission in the community its primary aim.

- Community Church in Crofton has led the way in our Zimbabwe partnership, helping to establish models for planning and completing building projects as well as developing a communications infrastructure that will connect Zimbabwe United Methodist churches, schools and clinics through the Internet.
- Bel Air Church has helped to seed a new congregation by giving leaders, members and money to The Vine, a new church start.

We thank our larger churches and pledge to partner with you on the new frontiers of ministry in which you are leading us.

Our mid-sized congregations have been most affected by the change in our culture and the transition in our communities. Once large congregations with large choirs, Sunday schools, scouting ministries, youth programming, many of you have been challenged by the expectation of strong program ministries and a declining interest in the culture in the church. Your members remember the “glory days,” and yet you have neither the people nor finances to support larger programming within the congregation. We recognize you are faced with aging members and a culture that has less interest in the church. We understand that some of your families are seeking larger congregations with a larger program life. We recognize that your numbers neither reflect your effort, nor your commitment to serving Jesus Christ. We recognize that you want to grow and are faced with dwindling resources and a resistance to change by long-established members. While we expect all of our congregations to make new disciples of Jesus Christ, we recognize that in some of our mid-sized congregations there are cultural and traditional values that will mean growth will take longer to achieve. We will continue to come alongside of you to walk with you, pray with you and learn together how to create turn-around congregations that, in this time and under these circumstances, capture the hearts and imaginations of people in our communities.

We have seen this beginning to occur in a number of our congregations:

- This year, when Nichols-Bethel UMC in Odenton had to scale back their vision for a new building, they took the opportunity to “rethink church,” and create a new vision. Recognizing that the church exists for those outside its walls, the congregation built a “Welcome Center,” a facility that will house contemporary worship services, a cafe, youth facilities and space for community activities.
- First UMC in Laurel, which has 220 in worship each Sunday, provides leadership to “Side-by-Side,” a cooperative ministry that brings churches and schools together to help children learn and to strengthen families. This past year, First UMC members served on the board that created “Almost Home,” a tutoring program for elementary school children in area apartment complexes.

However, to make uniqueness and individuality the pinnacle of how we understand ourselves is to focus on what divides us. Our technical problems can become what breeds mistrust . . . that which preoccupies us and prevents us from being outbound in ministry. It prevents us from spreading the gospel to the non-religious and nominally religious. It is to do what the “Call to Action Report” warns us against: to focus on our division and differences, to be satisfied with status quo rather than

turn-around leaders, to focus on the institutional needs of the church rather than connecting with the people in our communities.

But when we focus on our adaptive spiritual challenge, we focus on what unites us! When we focus on Jesus' goal for us, we focus on what makes us one – one Conference, one United Methodist Church.

Today, we have the opportunity to begin leaning into our denomination's adaptive spiritual challenge by *affecting what we actually have the capacity to affect, right here at home*. By embracing God's plan for us, we can help our congregations choose to PRESS ON into the communities around us – toward those who are spiritually hungry. We can set aside, for a moment, our pressing technical problems in the name of addressing our far more important adaptive spiritual challenge. By doing so, we can help lead an entire denomination in making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world!

Think about the ways in which we can do this together. Our congregations can provide safe and welcoming places for people who seek to test the love and compassion of Jesus Christ. This requires us to recommit to the Gospel's challenge to love our neighbor, particularly the new neighbors moving into our communities who are not like us. We are charged to make disciples of Jesus Christ of our new neighbors. How do we do it? By extending to them the radical hospitality of Jesus Christ. God calls us to evaluate our ministry, set appropriate goals, and reach new generations with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We need to grapple with the questions: Why do people need Jesus? Why do people need the church? and Why do people need our congregation?

We need to take those answers into the communities around us. With those answers, we need to press on, into the wind. When we do, I daresay the answers to our technical challenges start to follow.

This year we have experienced something that has not occurred for a very long time. Two of our districts, Cumberland-Hagerstown, under the leadership of John Rudisill, and Greater Washington, under the leadership of David Argo, grew in the number of professions of faith, worship attendance, in the number of people engaged in mission, apportionment giving and membership. In five key areas of ministry, these two districts grew. These districts are pressing on. Other districts are pressing on as well. Through 2010, 408 congregations achieved the Acts 2 fruit that we measure. That is almost 70% toward our 2012 goal. On our 2010 goals we have experienced the following results.

1. Increase by 4% the percentage of apportionments paid – Achieved.
2. Assist 85% of the BWC congregations to produce one additional fruit – Achieved.
3. Engage 85% of BWC worshippers in ministry – Achieved.
4. Decrease the benevolence factor to 21% - Achieved.
5. Increase total BWC apportionment base by 4% over the 2009 – Achieved.
6. The one goal we did not achieve in 2010 is a 1% increase in the total BWC congregations' professions of faith and worship attendance.

We, the leaders of the conference, pledge to come alongside of you and work with you. Here are a few things we are preparing to do:

1. Set a goal of reducing the benevolence factor to 16%, or to have reduced how much you are apportioned by almost 40% within ten years.
2. Improve our spiritual leadership development by developing a comprehensive program for lay and clergy leadership training.
3. Start 20 new congregations over the next 10 years.

4. Work with congregations that want to repurpose their building for permanent housing for the homeless or other vital community mission.
5. Grow four or more African-American churches to more than 400 in worship. We have already begun work on this by appointing associate pastors to congregations in D.C.
6. We also plan to partner with our urban congregations by appointing a Director of Urban Ministry to address the specific needs our urban congregations are facing.
7. Work with every congregation that wants to become vital or become more vital.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference is made up of more than 670 small, medium and large congregations in rural, urban, and suburban communities that comprise a number of different races and nationalities. Each is unique and each is connected through a web of belief, tradition and values that make us United Methodist.

We value: Acts of piety or the transformation of one's soul; acts of mercy and justice for the transformation of our world; being disciplined and held accountable through class meetings, or today what we call small group ministry; and engaging in mission through the local church because the local church is the place where disciples are made and engaged in the world.

In the midst of our diversity, we press on toward the goal that is before us.

Today we call you to action. We call you, United Methodists of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, to:

- Pray for one another, for the church and for the people in our communities;
- Open our minds to learn what changes God needs from us today;
- Demonstrate courageous turnaround leadership that leads to where the church has not been before;
- Take risks, experiment in ministry as we go to the margins of society to minister with the poor, the immigrants, the prisoners, and the homeless as well as with the non-religious and nominally religious people in our communities;
- Unite as one, develop deeper trust so that together we face our adaptive spiritual challenges.

As we press on to be more like Christ as we grow spiritual leaders to make disciples, grow vital congregations and transform the world, there is no one way to meet the adaptive spiritual challenges we face today. There are no clear answers. We call upon you to be adventurers, pioneers in a culture that values spirituality but does not find it in the same church that we grew up with and love. We need not be threatened by these new attitudes but serve like Christ Jesus as he engaged with a new and emerging culture:

- Jesus aligned with Kingdom culture when he sat by a well and drank water with a woman of another faith.
- Jesus aligned with Kingdom culture when he met in the homes of the town's despised sinners.
- Jesus aligned with Kingdom culture when he loved his enemies and prayed for those who persecuted him.
- Jesus aligned with Kingdom culture when he put people before popularity, put principle ahead of power, and demonstrated that being in the midst of the culture, was preferable to the safety of the sanctuary. He captured the imagination of those within the culture, and helped them embrace abundance and sacrifice, people at the center of the society and those at the margins, and accountability and grace.

In the midst of our challenges, together let us press on to the high calling that is before us. Let us not look back, but join together to run the race, to be the church of Jesus Christ -- vital, restored, forgiven, connecting the Gospel with those at the center and the margins, those in our pews and the nonreligious and nominally religious. Press on.

CLERGY EXECUTIVE SESSION AND BALLOTING

Thursday afternoon, 3: 30 PM, May 26, 2011

Grand Ballroom

After the Organizing of the Conference and the Episcopal Address came to a close, the laity left the ballroom. Bishop Schol greeted the clergy and then turned to the Conference Secretary for the Organizing Motion for the Clergy Session. Conference Secretary Mary Jo Sims made the following motion:

In accordance with paragraph 602 of the 2008 Book of Discipline, I move that full clergy members of the conference and lay members of the Board of Ordained Ministry be seated with voice and vote; that provisional members under the 1992 and 2000 Disciplines, affiliate members, associate members, local pastors under full-time and part-time appointment to a pastoral charge, be allowed to sit in the clergy session with voice but without vote; that other persons under appointment as clergy, the Executive Secretary to the Bishop and the Administrative Assistant working with the Board of Ordained Ministry be allowed to sit without voice and vote; and that this be the operative procedure unless the chair deems it necessary to convene a closed session.

The motion passed. The bishop directed the clergy's attention to the Executive Session Report. Bishop Schol introduced Rev. Joye Jones, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, who led the clergy through the executive session. Rev. Ianter Mills, dean of the Cabinet, came to the podium to give the Cabinet's response to Question 17 of the report. Rev. Mills gave the following report:

The Bishop and Appointive Cabinet have carefully reviewed the character and conduct of the clergy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church in accordance with paragraphs 604.4 and 605.6 of the 2008 Book of Discipline and found that the majority of clergy are faithful in fulfilling their calling while at the same time exemplifying models of Christian character. Meanwhile there are some clergy that the bishop and Cabinet are working with on issues of character and effectiveness in accordance with the provisions of The Book of Discipline. There are presently four persons under complaint.

A significant development in our work together is the result of Judicial Council Decision 1189. Decision 1189 clarified that "under ¶ 355 of the Book of Discipline, the bishop and the district superintendents may request an involuntary leave of absence without the consent of the provisional, associate, or full member by giving to the clergy member and the Board of Ordained Ministry in writing specific reasons for the request. Involuntary leave of absence may be requested by the bishop and the district superintendents:

- When a written or signed complaint is not resolved through the supervisory response within 120 days and is referred by the bishop as an administrative complaint;
- When remedial action is required to address allegations of incompetence, ineffectiveness, unwillingness, or inability to perform ministerial duties, which becomes an administrative complaint; or

- When an administrative or judicial complaint requires more than a ninety day suspension.”

Decision 1189 clarified a change in processing IVLOA. This change occurred with the 2008 Book of Discipline. Until that clarification, the Baltimore-Washington Conference and some annual conferences had been following the process outlined by Decision 973, which stated that it was not necessary to refer a complaint in order to seek an involuntary leave.

Since 2008, the Baltimore-Washington Conference has had two cases of IVLOA. In these two cases, both individuals under complaint had indicated that they preferred to continue the just resolution conversation over referring the complaint. Decision 1189 clarified that the cases should have been referred.

Decision 1189 has narrowed the opportunity for the Cabinet to work with clergy in obtaining a just resolution when an IVLOA is involved.

Decision 1189 has made it more restrictive for clergy, Cabinet, and BOOM in complaint cases and for supervisory issues.

- Those under complaint cannot go on VLOA.
- When an IVLOA is sought it is to be referred to the BOOM or Council for the Church.
- When an IVLOA is sought, the process moves from a conversation between complainant, respondent, and Cabinet seeking just resolution to an administrative hearing and possible church trial.

Decision 1189 impacted two Baltimore-Washington Conference IVLOA cases. Both IVLOA cases have been addressed according to the Judicial Council requirements.

Decision 1189 does not impact any VLOA cases. VLOA cases are processed as follows:

- BOOM CRC sends a letter annually to people on any form of LOA.
- Individuals must write to BOOM CRC to request termination of their leave. These requests must be made in accordance with the timeline requirements specified in the Discipline.
- Persons listed in the BOOM Report either have not requested to come off leave of absence or the CRC has reviewed any conditions of the leave and found that they have not been met.

It continues to be the goal of the Cabinet to resolve each compliant in the most redemptive manner possible. However, it is important to understand that the recent rulings of the Judicial Council restrict the terms under which a just resolution can be reached and requires the referral of an involuntary leave of absence for administrative hearing and possible church trail.

Going forward, as colleagues together in ministry, we are encouraged to continue to commit to holding one another in mutual care, accountability, and prayer, for we are the body of Christ.

Rev. Jones then directed our attention to Question 19. Richard Oursler, certified candidate for the Annapolis District was added to the listed. He was certified in 2011. In Question 21.a, Richard Oursler’s name was added with a notation that he attended LLPS in 2010. Jennifer Webber’s name should be listed under 21b instead of 21a; she is appointed as a 75% LP to Frostburg UMC. Jessica Statesman, who serves at Bowley’s Chase Cooperative Parish Baltimore Metro District, should be listed as quarter-time instead of half-time. All of Question 21 was then approved by the body.

Questions 25, clergy in good standing from other Christian denominations serving in our conference, and Question 26.b, affiliate members in our conference without vote, were both approved.

Question 27 concerns those who are elected as associate members. Rev. Stacey Cole Wilson, Registrar for Provisional Members, presented the associate member and provisional member candidates (both Deacon and Elder). Each candidate was approved individually — one for associate membership (Question 27), sixteen for provisional membership (three as Provisional Deacons and 13 as Provisional Elders). All were approved. Bishop Schol congratulated each one and the body greeted them with loud applause. They were then given a voting card so they could vote for clergy delegates later.

Rev. Mark Smiley, Registrar for Full Members, introduced the candidates for ordination. There were nine candidates — two for Deacon's Orders and seven for Elder's Orders. All the candidates were approved (Questions 31.a and b, 32.a, and 33.a). These new clergy colleagues were warmly received by the body and each was personally greeted and congratulate by the bishop. Question 39 deals with those seeking to have their orders recognized from another denomination. Lena Dennis was presented to the body and then excused while the voting occurred. She was approved and Lena reentered the ballroom amid warm applause and some shouts. The bishop said how thankful he was for pastors such as Lean who serve in challenging situations like her current appointment. Rev. Jones gave thanks for Revs Wilson and Smiley and their work in the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Rev. Jones then directed our attention to Question 43.a, those granted honorable location, and Question 44, those granted honorable location — retired. These were approved. Question 46.b was also approved.

Then Joye Jones, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, directed our attention to Question 50: Who are the provisional or ordained members on leave of absence and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation (paragraph 354)? She noted that Glen Strickler is listed under both sections b: Involuntary? and c (2): Who have been placed on leave of absence since the last session of the annual conference?

Rev. Charles Harrell of Trinity UMC in Prince Frederick, came to a microphone, introduced himself, and also noted that he had served as Glen Strickler's clergy advocate. He stated, "I rise to request a declaratory decision, to request a ruling of law, and to make a motion." The bishop declared this in order. Rev. Harrell continued by stating his request for a declaratory decision: "Pursuant to paragraph 363.d of the 2008 Book of Discipline with reference to the supervisory response process which states, 'All time limitations may be extended for 30 days upon the consent of the complainant and the respondent.' I request a declaratory decision of the Judicial Council as to whether the thirty day extension provided by the Discipline is a single extension or whether, as stated in a communication from Bishop Schol to Rev. Strickler and copied to me as Rev. Strickler's clergy advocate and dated 2 February 2011, it may be extended a second and subsequent times without limitations." The request was seconded. Rev. Harrell spoke to his request for a declaratory decision: "The thirty day extension provision to paragraph 361.d, which allows for extension by mutual consent of the complainant and respondent, and the supervisory response to a complaint against a clergy member might seem to be almost an administrative detail. It is, however, a detail which bears upon the rights of the respondent, that is, the accused in the complaints process.

"In the matter of the process involving Rev. Strickler, the effect of the repeated extension was detrimental to the respondent in two ways. First, it meant that the respondent was understood not to have certain rights, which are due to the respondent when a complaint has been referred. In other words, during the supervisory response process, which per the Discipline is supposed to be pastoral in nature, the respondent was understood by conference leadership to have fewer rights than would have been the case had the complaints been referred, therefore not to have access to certain documents and

reports which bore on the matter. Second, the repeated extensions served to keep the matter out of the purview of the Board of Ordained Ministry where it properly belongs when an involuntary leave of absence has been sought, as in Rev. Strickler's situation, pursuant to Judicial Council decisions 1156 and 1189. The net effect is that the rights of the accused are not properly respected, and maintained, when serial extensions may be sought by complainants or conference leadership, which were the same in this instance, in a situation where the respondent may feel that he or she has little option but to agree. This is particularly the case when the respondent feels pressured to agree that the conference leadership is operating within the strictures of the Discipline regardless of misgivings that this may not be the case, as occurred in communication dated 3 March, in which Rev. Strickler was told that conversations could not continue until he agreed that the leadership was operating within the Discipline, even though Rev. Strickler had particularly stated this not to be the case."

Rev. Vivian McCarthy, Superintendent for the Central Maryland District, spoke against the request. She stated that the conference leadership was in a waiting pattern [at the time the extensions were made]. They were waiting for a report from a doctor. They also questioned whether they should proceed with a complaint against Rev. Strickler and send such to the Board of Ordained Ministry. The Board of Ordained Ministry did ask for an involuntary leave of absence for Rev. Strickler. While the conference leadership was not actually waiting for the end of a trial, Rev. McCarthy did note that there was a civil court case in process that had not been resolved [during the time when extensions were being given].

After some clarification regarding whether a request for a declaratory decision is debatable or not, Rev. Dean Snyder of Foundry UMC asked that the entire language of the request be repeated. Rev. Harrell obliged: "Pursuant to paragraph 361.d of the 2008 Book of Discipline, with reference to the supervisory response process which states 'All time limitations may be extended for 30 days upon the consent of the complainant and the respondent,' I request a declaratory decision of the Judicial Council as to whether the thirty day extension provided by the Discipline is a single extension or whether as stated in a communication from Bishop Schol to Rev. Strickler and copied to me as Rev. Strickler's clergy advocate and dated 2 February 2011, it may be extended a second and subsequent time without limitations."

The assistant to the Bishop, Rev. Evan Young, came to a microphone and confirmed that the extensions in this matter had been agreed upon by both the respondent and the complainants. A vote was taken and the request for a declaratory decision did not pass.

Charles Harrell returned to the microphone and made the following request for a ruling of law: "Whether the bishop, pursuant to his duties of administration under paragraph 403 of the 2008 Book of Discipline may inform a respondent to a complaint that he is unappointable now or in the future or whether such notification violates the separation of duties under the Discipline, specifically paragraph 635.k, which places the recommendation for changes in conference membership status under the purview of the Board of Ordained Ministry and paragraphs 605.6 and 369.3, which vests the Clergy Executive Session with the power to enact such changes."

This matter did not require a vote and will be forwarded to the Judicial Council for a ruling of law. Rev. Harrell also made the following motion: "Pursuant to Judicial Council decision 1189, I move that the Board of Ordained Ministry, in consultation with the Administrative Review Committee, conduct an investigation of all complaints and supervisory response process matters, which resulted in voluntary and involuntary leaves of absence, which began or were in process on or after 1 January 2009, for the purpose of determining whether proper procedures were followed, whether corrective action needs to be taken to bring the conference in line with the Book of Discipline, and finally whether in those cases where there were errors of procedure, whether compensation for lost wages

or benefits is due to the respondents in each such case.” The motion was seconded. Rev. Harrell then spoke in support of his motion, saying that in the introductory remarks to Judicial Council decision 1189 the following words are found,

“We encourage annual conferences and boards of ordained ministry to review any and all instances occurring since the effective date of the 2008 Discipline to ensure that full and fair process as intended by the 2008 General Conference was afforded in each case where an involuntary leave of absence process was commenced that resulted in a voluntary or involuntary leave of absence. In instances where appropriate process was not observed, the annual conference should consider taking appropriate steps to resolve any deviation from disciplinary process.” Rev. Harrell said that since [Judicial Council decision] 1189 was written with a special reference to the Baltimore-Washington conference, it would seem appropriate for us to lead the way in fulfilling this prudent recommendation.

Rev. Ianther Mills, Dean of the Cabinet, came to a microphone and offered the following clarifying information: Since the 2008 Book of Discipline became effective, there have been only two involuntary leaves of absence cases. Those have been reviewed and dealt with according to decision 1189. The bishop further clarified that Rev. Strickler has received a letter and a check has been written, that is in the property of the conference until he is released from prison. The check will then be turned over to Rev. Strickler. That check covers the time period from the last paycheck Rev. Strickler received from Grace United Methodist Church in Gaithersburg until the date of Rev. Strickler’s incarceration.

Rev. Eugene Matthews, retired clergy, came to a microphone. He told the body that he presently serves as the vice chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry. He said that relative to the issue raised about examination of all the action the board has taken regarding involuntary leaves of absence, that Rev. Joye Jones, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, has already asked him to convene a group of people from the Board of Ordained Ministry to review all actions taken relative to those who are on involuntary leaves of absence. Rev. Jacqueline Jones-Smith, a member of the Committee on Review, said that with regard to the motion, that voluntary leaves of absence, under the Discipline, are not the purview of the Committee on Review. The actions Rev. Mills mentioned are within the purview of the committee. Therefore, there can be no motion for the committee to review voluntary leaves of absence. The committee has reviewed the involuntary leave of absence of Rev. Strickler. Bishop Schol clarified that there is only (currently) one involuntary leave of absence. There was a situation where involuntary leave of absence was initially sought but the person concerned indicated that they wanted to go on voluntary leave and was granted such. At the bishop’s request, Rev. Harrell reread his motion.

Rev. Ken Humbert, pastor of Nichols-Bethel UMC, raised a point of order. He contended that a portion of the motion was out of order, the portion regarding voluntary leaves of absence, since Rev. Jones-Smith in her remarks had indicated that was beyond the purview of the Committee on Review. Therefore, Rev. Humbert said, it seemed that portion of the motion would be mute. The bishop responded that the Committee on Review had been requested to review voluntary leaves of absence and they had indicated to the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet that they did not think that was procedurally correct since they do not have purview under certain things within the Discipline and that their review should not be expanded to issues for which they do not have purview. Rev. Humbert replied that it was unclear to him if that portion of the motion [regarding voluntary leave of absence] is effectively illegal under church law. The bishop answered that the Discipline is very clear about certain things. However, Judicial Council rulings indicate that you can expand permission to do something but you cannot constrict the Discipline. He would have to look at the paragraph concerning review before knowing for certain if the motion were out of order. He suggested that we vote on the motion and then he would have an opportunity to look up the paragraph(s) and Judicial

Council rulings regarding review and then inform the executive session if he felt that the motion is out of order. The other possibility is for the house to vote on the matter and indicate if it thinks the motion is in order or not. He then tested the house and it was determined that the house did not feel the motion was in order.

Therefore, the motion before the body now only related to matters of involuntary leave. Rev. Mamie Williams, pastor of John Wesley UMC, Glen Burnie, asked for clarification. She wondered if the group Rev. Eugene Matthews referred to was the advisory task force that the bishop spoke about last year [at annual conference] that is referred to on page 256 [in the 2010 Journal] when Rev. Valerie Barnes requested that there be a review process. Rev. Joye Jones responded that the group to which Rev. Matthew referred was one that she put together following decision 1189, even though it was only recommended that we do the review. The Board felt we should be reviewing involuntary leaves of absence. Rev. Mathews was not referring to the task force mentioned last year. Bishop Schol also read ¶ 636 of the 2008 Book of Discipline regarding the Administrative Review Committee: "Its only purpose shall be to ensure the disciplinary procedures for involuntary leave of absence, involuntary retirement, or administrative location are properly followed." The body was correct in its decision to rule out of order the portion of the motion relating to voluntary leaves of absence.

Rev. Harrell then read his motion again, deleting that portion that had been ruled out of order: "Pursuant to Judicial Council decision 1189, I move that the Board of Ordained Ministry, in consultation with the Administrative Review Committee, conduct an investigation of all complaints and supervisory response process matters which resulted in involuntary leaves of absence, which began or were in process on or after 1 January 2009, for the purpose of determining whether proper procedures were followed, whether corrective action needs to be taken to bring the conference in line with the Book of Discipline, and finally whether in those cases where there were errors of procedure, whether compensation for lost wages or benefits is due to the respondents in each such case." After taking a vote three times, it was determined that the motion did not pass. Rev. Jones then directed our attention to Question 50, which the body approved.

The bishop then addressed the body, saying that this has been a difficult and painful process for all, particularly for those who have been involved. It was a mistake not to refer a complaint when an involuntary leave of absence was requested. As we had already heard, Rev. Mills indicated that there had been a recent change in the Discipline and that the Cabinet was basing its decision on a previous Judicial Council decision and a particular way it read the change in the Discipline. The bishop recognized the mistake and also recognized that what the Cabinet does on behalf of the annual conference is a matter of trust and when a mistake is made, it raises questions. He also recognized that all of us feel the challenge and pain that it experiences. He wanted the clergy to know that the Cabinet has taken every step to abide by the Judicial Council ruling and to correct the matters that were not handled appropriately. He assured the clergy that the Cabinet has abided by the Judicial Council ruling and that in the future if there is a request for involuntary leave, a complaint will be referred. Bishop Schol expressed hope that we will all continue to work together. He said that Rev. Charles Harrell's questions are good questions. They are important questions and concerns that ask, "Are we appropriately carrying out the Discipline?" The bishop said he is glad Rev. Harrell raised these questions and concerns and brought them to the floor and we have had the conversations around those questions and concerns. The bishop committed to continuing to do his best, and even better, in such matters and regrets fully any pain and challenges that have been created for the clergy involved, their advocates, the Cabinet, the Board of Ordained Ministry, and all the clergy. Then he led the clergy in prayer, asking God that we continue to live in alignment with Divine will and the Discipline of The United Methodist Church. He prayed for Rev. Strickler, asking that God's healing continue to

work in him and that our conference continue to build trust and to carry out God's will and to follow the Discipline. He asked for God's wisdom and understanding for us all.

Rev. Valerie Barnes then asked to make a correction, indicating that she has only been on voluntary leave one year, not two, which is what the report reflects. Rev. Jones explained how such leave is recorded for the Board of Ordained Ministry Report and that as of July 1, 2011, Rev. Barnes would be beginning her second year of leave. Then Rev. Barnes asked what has happened, aside from the Board of Ordained Ministry review of those on involuntary leave, regarding the task force that was mentioned previously by Rev. Mamie Williams. Rev. David Cooney, lead pastor at Towson UMC and chair of Conference Relations Committee (CRC), explained the process for those who are placed on voluntary leave. He said that all of those on voluntary leave come to CRC at the initiation of the person requesting the leave, along with a written change in status form requesting the voluntary leave, so there is agreement to that. All are informed or asked if that is what they are choosing to do at that time. They are given options if they choose not to go on such leave. Voluntary leave is followed up annually. Those on leave are notified in the fall, asking them what their hope and desires are for the coming conference year and reminded that the Discipline requires that they provide a written request six months prior to annual conference if they wish to come off leave. Any who make such a request are interviewed by CRC so the request can be processed. Rev. Barnes received such a letter this past year and she requested to remain on voluntary leave of absence.

The clergy approved Question 52.c, those who are granted incapacity leave. Question 53 concerns those who are seeking retirement. Rev. Jones read the names of the retirees: as deacon, John William Bennett; as elder: Emora T. Brannan, Ronald Lee Collier, Sr., Vicki S. Curry, Tunde E. O. Davies, George F. DeFord, Douglas Fox, Richard G. Gray, Jr., William Richard Harden, James Morgan Hunt, Richard K. McCullough, Michael A. H. McKinney, Walter Middlebrooks, Conrad D. Parker, Kristina Peterson, Kelly Steven Sparks, Horace Lee Wallace, Alfreda L. Wiggins, Jeremiah G. Williams, and Carol Cosens Yocum. As their names were read, the retirees stood. In thanksgiving for their ministry, the clergy gave them a standing ovation. The clergy approved Question 53. Question 54, Associate Members to be retired, included William Jack Bussard and John F. Footen. They stood and were recognized. The question carried. Question 55, Provisional Members to be retired included Donald Atkinson, Linda Healy, and Eloise Newman. The question carried. The Rev. Jones recognized those retiring as local pastors: C. Lee Brotemarkle, Frederick N. Iser, Charles E. Slauch, and Holly Slauch. They were greeted by the body.

The bishop then turned to Rev. Mark Smiley, chair of the elections committee. Rev. Smiley gave instructions on how to cast votes using the hand-held electronic devices. We did a couple of test runs using the devices. The candidates came to a microphone and introduced themselves. There was no election on the first ballot. After the first ballot, Mark Smiley made a motion, which was seconded, that when reading the election results, the names of those who receive five votes or fewer will not be read. The motion passed. There was no election on the second ballot. On the third ballot, four people were elected. In order of election, they were: Terri Rae Chattin, Laura Easto, Conrad Link, and Rodney Smothers. Ingrid Wang gave the Benediction, thanking God for the glorious day, the wisdom we had heard, and for the power of the Holy Spirit we had witnessed. After handing in their electronic devices to a nearby attendant, the clergy departed the ballroom.

LAITY SESSION AND BALLOTING

Thursday evening, 6:15 p.m., May 26, 2011

Grand Ballroom

Delores Oden, lay leader of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, welcomed the laity to the 227th session of annual conference. She introduced Bishop John Schol, who called the session to order and opened with prayer. The Rev. Mark Smiley explained the voting process to be used in the election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional conferences.

The following lay people were elected: Tom Price, Sandy Ferguson, Darius Butler, Melissa Lauber, Edith Williams and Charlie Moore. One additional delegate was needed to complete the delegation to General Conference.

Delores Oden called those who were to give ministry reports to come to the stage. She also congratulated and recognized Gertrude Dailey, who was commissioned as a deaconess in April.

Jackie Harris and others from Asbury UMC in White Marsh lifted their voices in praise as they sang "How Great Is Our God."

Ministry Reports

Richard Keller, Conference Director of Lay Speaking Ministries, asked all lay speakers to stand and be recognized. He reminded those present that lay speakers are active members of The United Methodist Church, eager to serve the church, the community and the world. They are well informed about Scripture, doctrine, heritage and the organization of the denomination; committed to witnessing through church and community leadership, caregiving and spoken communication; and are willing to improve themselves with continuing education. It's more than just filling in for the pastor; it's being a leader in areas such as teaching, serving, training, leading, participation, caring, loving, and communication, he said. He recognized and thanked the district lay speaking directors. He then highlighted one innovative and creative area of Lay Speaking Ministries: during Advent and Lent several Lay Speakers did podcast sermonettes. Mr. Keller encouraged those present to listen to these on the conference website. Those involved in lay speaking ministries are looking forward to continuing the podcasts.

Kelly Robier, president of the CCYM (Conference Council on Youth Ministries) shared a video that highlighted, through song and dance, the ministries of conference youth. There are between 50 and 80 members of CCYM, coming from all four regions of the conference. They meet monthly at the BWC Mission Center. They share devotions, fellowship and plan the year's conference youth events. The largest event of the year is the annual ROCK retreat. The entire conference youth budget is financed by ROCK. There will be four one-day ROCK events this summer.

The Conference Young Adult Council (YAC) report followed. The first part of the report was given by Darius Butler. In July 2010, about 10 young adults from Korea joined others in the United States, engaging one another in worship, mission, fellowship and spiritual development. In August 2010, nearly 50 young adults from across the conference gathered at West River Retreat Center for the annual Young Adult Retreat. The YAC sponsored quarterly gatherings at the BWC Mission Center. It also published Shift, a quarterly magazine, designed as a devotional tool for young adults and young adult ministries in local churches. All the articles and studies in Shift are written by young adults

from across the conference. It is mailed to the pastor or young adult ministries coordinator of every church in the conference.

Mr. Butler talked about the decline in worship attendance of those between the ages of 18 and 35. He said that we have the power to change this dynamic, but we need to reach outside of ourselves and our traditions, if we are truly to change this dynamic. We aren't really engaging in ministry until we reach beyond the walls of the local church to pull inside those who are outside, he said. We aren't engaging in ministry until we include those who don't look like or talk like us. We aren't engaging in ministry if we continue to breathe life into traditions that aren't effective in furthering the vision and mission of the church. He reminded those present: "If you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got." If we want different output, we must put forth a different input and watch God move through the Holy Spirit.

Then Michael Parker highlighted some of the upcoming YAC events, such as the mission trip in July to Haiti, the September annual retreat, and a secondary young adult conference in January. The YAC will continue to publish Shift.

The United Methodist Women's report was given by its president, Nancy Randers-Pehrson. She said that the accomplishments of the UMW are amazing. UMW membership is 800,000 strong and reached more than 100 countries with aid. About 150 people from the Baltimore-Washington Conference, including Bishop Schol, attended the 2010 Women's Assembly in St. Louis. This year the conference UMW members wrote letters, signed petitions, and visited Washington legislators, serving as advocates for such social issues as immigration. Nearly 150 women attended the School of Mission in Hagerstown. This year's study was on Sudan. The coming year's study will be on Haiti. Across the conference, UMW units have contributed about \$400,000 to mission. They gave 16 scholarships of \$800 each. Epworth House donated a \$10,000 scholarship to a woman from Germany who is studying at Wesley Theological Seminary. Sabrina White of the Baltimore Metropolitan District is the new president of the NEJ UMW and Jane Grays of the Washington East District is now serving a two-year term as dean of the regional school.

Ms. Randers-Pehrson told those gathered that God has a purpose for each and every one of us. The women of the UMW are ambassadors of Christ. They are called to unite, to be connected, to bond together, to become whole people, to know God and to fulfill God's calling to help the weak, the sick, the impoverished, the abused and neglected, here and far away, by sharing God's love and kindness, and by standing up for justice for all, especially women, children and youth.

She then talked about the proposal that would separate the UMW from the General Board of Global Ministries, instead of remaining a division under that agency. The UMW wishes to become its own agency, while still being connected with GBGM in the area of missions. This proposal will give the UMW a place at the table and more flexibility while maintaining its mission and purpose.

Darvin Hebron, president of the Conference United Methodist Men, gave that group's ministry report. In March, he attended the UMM Presidents' Conference, held in Nashville. While there, he was touched by God as he witnessed the BWC receiving first place awards for EMS membership and the payment of 100 percent of apportionments. Mr. Hebron said, "Our men are stepping up to the plate."

Sandra King Shaw, who succeeded Helen Fleming as Director for Certified Lay Ministers (CLMs), reported on their activities and accomplishments during the past year. She reminded the assembly that CLM is really quite new, having been established by the 2004 General Conference. She delineated the requirements for becoming a CLM and stressed that when certified, CLMs work in local congregations at the direction of the pastor.

She talked about the name tag she had on that reads “Ask Me.” She encouraged everyone to ask her about CLM. She explained the requirements for recertification and said that those who are in that process all studied the book, *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations*. As a result of this study, certified lay ministers will further enhance the spiritual life of their congregations, their districts and their neighborhoods, Ms. Shaw said.

Delores Oden returned to the podium and thanked everyone for their reports. She also recognized the district lay leaders and Mary W. White, lay leader for the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference. She expressed how blessed the laity were to have the young people among them and the hope that they will be a part of the laity session again at the next annual conference. Bishop Schol came to the podium and thanked all the laity, especially Ms. Oden, for their work. The session ended with Mark Miller and his band singing, “Let the Glory of the Lord Rise among Us” and “Hakuna Wakaita sa Jesu,” which is Shona for “There’s No One in the World Like Jesus.”

SECOND PLENARY SESSION

Thursday evening, May 26, 2011

Grand Ballroom

The clergy joined the laity in the ballroom. Bishop Schol introduced David Shank, who will be commissioned as a provisional elder at the ordination service and who is being appointed to a new church start in the Annapolis District, which will focus on young adult ministries. David led the gathered session in prayer, asking that the Spirit of the Living God be present among us and to bless us as we continue to do God’s work. The bishop then led the session in prayer for David and his new ministry.

Greetings from Mayor of Baltimore: Bishop Schol introduced Baltimore City Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake, saying that we are blessed to have a mayor with whom we share a common heritage and commitment. Mayor Rawlings-Blake thanked the conference for the invitation to join us in our celebration of radical hospitality. She thanked Bishop Schol for his kind words and for his spirit and expressed appreciation for the partnership between the City of Baltimore and The United Methodist Church.

Mayor Rawlings-Blake extended a welcome, on behalf of the city, to those gathered and reminded us of the historical force of spiritual development and social action the church’s leadership has had in Baltimore. The UMC continues to put faith into action through such efforts as those of Rev. Eric King, pastor of New Life-St. Matthews Cooperative Parish in East Baltimore. Rev. King has shown what can be achieved when faith groups and neighborhood associations collaborate, she said. Mayor Rawlings-Blake reminded the session of the words of theologian Howard Thurman who said, “Community cannot for long feed on itself; it can only flourish with the coming of others from beyond — the unknown and undiscovered brothers.” In ministries such as New Life, the church has gone beyond the walls of the sanctuary directly to where people live. We should be proud because together we are making a difference. The mayor concluded her remarks by thanking the church for being a leader in rallying together people from various backgrounds in support of critical common causes. She asked that we continue to keep the City of Baltimore in our prayers.

Bishop Schol led us in prayer for Mayor Rawlings-Blake, asking that God sustain her in the difficult challenges she faces and reward her with grace and mercy and that the city might prosper with justice and righteousness.

Cokesbury Presentation: Denise Karau, manager of the Cokesbury Bookstore at the Conference Mission Center, addressed the annual conference. She talked about enhancements to the Cokesbury website and the new pricing for items that makes them competitive with Amazon.com. She drew our attention to such resources as MinistryMatters.com, *Extravagant Generosity* by Michael Reeves and Jennifer Tyler, and the newly published Worship and Song. She expressed regret that Cokesbury has needed to suspend its long practice of making an annual donation to the denomination's Clergy Pension Fund.

Presentations to Beverly Schol: Mrs. Schol was escorted to the stage. Nancy Randers-Pehrson, president of Conference UMW, presented Mrs. Schol with a prayer shawl and a UMW Bible. Kelly Robier and Nick Poole of CCYM gave Mrs. Schol a flip camera for her use when she travels with the bishop.

Special Guests from Zimbabwe: Conference Lay Leader Delores Oden introduced special guests Kennedy Nhondoro from the Zimbabwe East Conference and Betty S Katiyo from the Zimbabwe West Conference. They sang "Amazing Grace" in Shona. Afterwards, Ms. Katiyo addressed the conference. She relayed greetings from the two Zimbabwe Annual Conferences and from their episcopal leader, Bishop Eben Nhiwatiwa. She said that our conference theme, "Connect as One," comes at an appropriate time. The world is in need of great transformation. This will be achieved if we, as Christians, connect as one and pray in one accord so that the Lord will yield the land as promised in 2 Chronicles 7:14. Ms. Katiyo reminded us that in Acts 1 we hear of the disciples being united as one and devoted to prayer. She reminded us that the words "*with one accord*" are used several times in the book of Acts. This unity kept the early disciples going. She challenged us to stay connected with God and with one another.

In Africa, they are in an era where growth within the church is high, just as it once was in America. However, Ms. Katiyo said she often reminds her colleagues in Africa that history repeats itself and they must continue to be diligent in ministry. Currently in Zimbabwe, as they strive to serve the Lord in all aspects of ministry, with a particular focus on education, health, agriculture and evangelism. She expressed appreciation for the partnership between the Zimbabwe Annual Conferences and the Baltimore-Washington Conference. She thanked Bishop Schol and Lay Leader Delores Oden for inviting Mr. Nhondoro and her to our annual conference session. She concluded by saying that, as Rev. Alfreda Wiggins said in the sermon during opening worship, "There's still more room at the table. Let's all go out there and bring more to Christ."

Conference UMW President Randers-Pehrson presented Ms. Katiyo with a prayer shawl made by women from the Annapolis District and UMM President Darren Hebron gave Mr. Nhondoro several books of biblical readings.

Bishop Schol then reviewed the agenda, explaining that the clergy needed to meet again in executive session to continue voting for delegates. Ms. LaSander Sanders gave the closing prayer using American Sign Language. She thanked God for the annual conference, all the accomplishments of the day and for the spiritual leaders of the conference. She also asked that God lead us and fill us with the same joy we experienced when we first accepted God into our lives.

SECOND CLERGY EXECUTIVE SESSION

Thursday evening, May 26, 2011

Ballroom

After the departure of the laity, the bishop called the clergy session together for continued balloting for delegates to General Conference. Mark Smiley reviewed the voting procedures. The clergy needed to elect three additional delegates. On the third ballot of the evening, JW Park and Joseph Daniels were elected. Joan Carter-Rimbach was elected on the fifth ballot of the evening, thus completing the clergy delegation to General Conference.

Clergy then commenced the balloting for Jurisdictional Conference. Chris Holmes and Ianther Mills were elected on the first ballot, Joye Jones on the second ballot, and Mary Kay Totty on the third ballot. Balloting was then suspended and the bishop turned to Joye Jones, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, for the completing of the BOOM Report. Questions 72 (concerning diaconal ministers who have been granted leaves of absence) and 80.c (regarding those appointed to other valid ministries under the provision of ¶344.1d) were approved. Joye Jones then moved adoption of the entire BOOM Report. The motion carried. Rev. Jones thanked all those who helped complete the report and Bishop Schol thanked Debbie Albrecht for providing staff support on the report. Then the bishop dismissed the clergy session with a blessing.

SECOND LAITY SESSION: BALLOTING

Friday morning, May 27, 2011

Grand Ballroom

The laity gathered before the scheduled plenary session and the balloting began. There was no election on the first ballot. On the following ballot, Jen Ihlo was elected, thus completing the lay delegation to General Conference.

Balloting began for Jurisdictional Conference. Darlynn McCrae and Michael Parker were elected on the next ballot; Chris Schlieckert and Delores Martin were elected on the next ballot; and David Hosey and Sylvia Simpson on the ballot that followed. With only one remaining delegate to elect, Ralph Williams was elected on the next ballot. One more ballot was taken and the laity elected the following as alternates to Jurisdictional Conference: Adam Riddell, Sarah Ford, Tim Donaldson, and Maxine Jenkins.

THIRD PLENARY SESSION

Friday morning, 8:15 AM, May 27, 2011

Ballroom

Bishop Schol greeted the body and asked whether those present had had a good night's rest. He also announced that the Laity had completed their balloting. He reminded us that today was a special day, a day of remembrance and looking to the future as we anticipate the Services of Remembrance and Ordination later that day. He talked about the power of symbol and how symbols help us look beyond and see something more. Then Faith Lewis offered the Opening Prayer, asking that God harmonize us as one body and sustain us.

Connect As One Report and Address: The Bishop introduced the Connect as One Report by repeating the Scripture from Philippians he had cited the previous day in his Episcopal Address:

“Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal;
but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own.”
–Philippians 3:12

The Bishop continued by saying that the Apostle Paul’s message to the Philippians challenged them not to rest on what they had received or accomplished, but to strive toward the greater goal that was before them. For such a time as this, God’s goal for us is to press on to connect with the non-religious and nominally religious people in our communities and share with them the hope we experience in Jesus Christ. It is not to ignore the technical problems of our congregations and our daily faith lives, but it is to recognize that the greatest hindrances to growing more vital congregations in The United Methodist Church are:

- The lack of trust within the church.
- The need for more turn-around leaders.
- The fear of metrics – setting goals and sharing in mutual accountability.
- The inability to connect with the people in our communities that share different values and ideas.

We overcome these challenges by rediscovering the hope in God’s Word, the hope that flows from going out into our communities and telling the Gospel story. Yesterday we shared examples of congregations and individuals in the Baltimore-Washington Conference telling that very story and changing lives as a result. We are achieving and we are transforming. God is active among us. Today though, we urge you with the words of Hebrews 12:1, to run the race that is set before us with perseverance. We must run that race looking to Jesus, the pioneer of our faith. We must not waste energy and valuable gifts, but use every bit of God’s gifts and life to reach the goal. We must press on.

Bishop Schol continued by stating that this morning our conversation will be a bit different than yesterday. We will talk candidly with one another about some of the opportunities before the Baltimore-Washington Conference and our congregations. We will talk about what it will mean for us to lean forward into our adaptive spiritual challenges — to press on toward making disciples of Jesus Christ. And we will talk candidly with one another about some of our technical problems as an annual conference. That includes the metrics and the numbers that do not always warm our hearts but are a reality with which we must grapple as one connection united in God’s love.

As we proceed into our conversation, it’s important we remember that we become more like Christ when we call, equip, send and support spiritual leaders out into the world. That must be our priority. As we build on our past, we will become the great commandment and commission, a great disciple. Let us proceed together to:

- Worship passionately
- Make new disciples
- Grow faith through small groups
- Serve like Christ through justice and mercy mission
- Give generously to mission

The following people took turns presenting the address: Robert Slade, Chairperson of the Discipleship Council; Delores Oden, Lay Leader; Charlie Moore, Chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration; Katie Bishop, team leader for young adult ministry; Tony Love, Chairperson of the Board of Trustees; Joye Jones, Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry;

Paul Eichelberger, Treasurer and Chief Financial Officer; and Will Burnett, a former Conference Council Youth President.

Yesterday Bishop Schol highlighted a finding from the UMC “Call to Action” report that as a denomination, we are adverse to “metrics” and the measurement of the fruits of our discipleship. Yet measurement is crucial to congregations, and indeed vital to annual conferences. Today, every United Methodist congregation around the world is called to set goals for the next quadrennium by the end of the year in the following five areas:

- Worship attendance
- Professions of faith
- Number of small groups
- Number of disciples engaged in mission
- Amount of money given to mission

The goals of each of our congregations will be gathered with every other church’s goals in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. Then Bishop Schol will take our goals to General Conference and, with every other bishop, offer these goals as a gift to the work of Jesus Christ by United Methodists for the next quadrennium. Imagine churches in Mutare, Zimbabwe; Washington, D.C.; Veronezh, Russia; Smith, Bermuda; Manila, Philippines; Tuscaloosa, Ala.; Paw Paw, W.Va; and Baltimore, Md. each serving in their communities and yet linked by the common goals of pressing on.

Imagine the world transformation that is possible if each congregation commits to lean into the wind—to grow worship, make new disciples, grow disciples in small groups, engage disciples in mission, and increase how much we are giving to mission. It will be a powerful testimony to the ministry of Jesus Christ and a powerful witness to the world of a UNITED Methodist Church -- united in common heritage and united in a common life-changing ministry that makes disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Often, we don’t like goals because of our dislike of numbers. But these goals are not about numbers, they are about souls. Souls discouraged by mortgage foreclosures, souls bound by addiction, souls alienated by rejection, souls desperate over homelessness, souls weakened by malaria, souls torn apart by war, souls burdened by poverty, and souls lost by alienation from a loving, compassionate, grace-filled God.

Make no mistake, your “numbers” mean something. Where there is decline and a lack of imagination of how to reach non-religious and nominally religious people or a lack of passion to serve our communities, it is a soul that is separated from the powerful adventure we share. These goals are about saving souls – not a new business model or a church growth program or some “save-the-UMC” initiative. We are all expected to lose our lives so that we gain life; to sacrifice for our church and ministry so that someone else might be resurrected. We must have congregational goals to challenge us to reach non-religious and nominally religious people. To paraphrase the Apostle Paul, we become like the non-religious and nominally religious that we might win souls for Jesus. We become one with the homeless, the addicted, those whose homes are foreclosed, and those in prison that we might, one person at a time, transform the world.

Today, we the leaders of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, pledge to become one with you, to come alongside of you and serve with you so that you become more vital in your ministry. As the Bishop said yesterday, we focus so much on our own congregations – what makes us unique and different – that we sometimes fail to focus on what unites us as United Methodists. That is our joint heritage, and our commitment to respond to God’s goal for us ... as one connection ... one people.

But even as we endeavor to face what the Bishop explained as our “adaptive spiritual challenge,” we cannot pretend that our technical challenges do not exist. When one or more of our congregations face a profound technical challenge, we all do, across this Annual Conference, because we all are one. Just as vitality has no bounds, a church’s struggle transcends geography, race, history and other factors. As many of you know, there are congregations in our annual conference that are struggling. They are...

- Not paying their full apportionments.
- Not growing in worship.
- Not making new disciples.
- Not doing needed repairs to their building.
- Not maintaining appropriate reserves.
- Not living within their means as building and/or debt expenditures are higher than other churches of their size.
- Not paying clergy pension and health benefits. Currently, our benefit arrearage is more than \$55,000 a month, which will accumulate to more than \$750,000 in 2011.

Indeed, these congregations are at profound risk. Their future is uncertain. They need our prayers, our support, and our love. The reality is, we have approximately 50 congregations whose situation is so serious that it could well take more than \$2,000,000 a year for a number of years to turn them around. It is a daunting challenge. Data and statistics suggest that they may not survive.

But we have seen other congregations in these challenging circumstances face their technical problems and apply adaptive spiritual approaches that has led to vitality:

- Some merged with another congregation and became stronger.
- Some became a campus of a vital congregation.
- Some repurposed their building, reduced building costs and became more mission focused.
- And yes, some closed and their assets are being used to start a new congregation.

We are committed to partnering with churches in crisis but you need to take a step to be a turnaround church by connecting in a new way.

We have another 50 congregations that will find themselves in the same situation in five to 10 years if they do not take immediate steps to change their situation. Later this year we will send letters to the congregations that are at risk of closing or have risk factors that put them seriously at risk of closing. We will work more closely to turn around churches that prayerfully and seriously want to change. While 10 percent of our churches face serious challenges, most of our congregations are making new disciples, striving toward the Acts 2 fruit, and engaging in life changing ministry in the community. Ames Church in Baltimore has not completely turned their situation around, but they have taken steps in the right direction and are making good progress. This was a congregation faced with significant building problems, declining worship and unpaid apportionments, pension and health benefits. Today, they are growing, paying off their pension and health arrearages, completed some of their building repairs, and reinvigorated their Shalom ministry in the community. How, you ask? Prayer for sure, but also a commitment of lay leadership working with a new turn-around pastor. They are engaging with the community, connecting with non- and nominally religious people, beginning more small group studies; their laity are growing in faith and their ability to lead and they are enlivening worship.

In the 29th chapter of Jeremiah, the prophet told the exiled people in Babylon that “God has plans for you, plans not for your destruction but for a future of hope.” The exiled people pressed on and planted gardens, built new homes, began to have families, and sought the *shalom* of the community in unfamiliar surroundings and circumstances. God blessed them with a future. When we embrace the love and hope presented to us by Jesus Christ, we accept the power to inspire and rejuvenate.

We accept the power to be the Great Commandment and Commission in the world. It is the commitment of the Baltimore-Washington Conference to help our struggling congregations transform as we help our thriving congregations lead the way for our denomination in pressing on to make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Let us tell you about eight key ways that the conference is committing to meet the needs of the passionate congregations committed to overcoming challenges and pressing on toward Jesus' goal for us.

- We are committed to assisting you in setting metrics or goals. A planning document has been developed that many will use across the denomination. This summer and early fall, our guides will be holding workshops for churches to help them set goals that are appropriate to their context and based on their gifts and accomplishments.
- We are committed to assisting you in developing a comprehensive leadership development program. We will thus strengthen the spiritual leadership of our laity and clergy. We will have a plan in place by the end of 2012 that will build on the Discipleship Academy, leadership days, certified lay ministry training, Discipled groups, and coaching. We want to have one of the best clergy and lay development programs in the world so that we can be the best for the world. The program, while being comprehensive in nature will also take into account church size, church location, ethnicity and style of ministry when providing resources for your congregation.
- We are committed to reducing the benevolence factor from 19.5 to 16 percent. We will recommend to the Baltimore-Washington Conference strategic planning team to adopt goals to reduce the benevolence factor to 16 percent by 2017. That will be a 35 percent reduction in the benevolence factor since our peak rate of 24.8 percent in 2005. With a benevolence factor of 16 percent, the apportionments will be approximately 10 percent of the total income of our congregations. In other words, by 2017, we want the apportionments to be equivalent to a tithe of the grand total of our congregations' total income. We believe a tithe is appropriate for a disciple's giving and should be appropriate for our apportionments. We plan to do this while we increase conference mission and ministry by 3 percent or more a year. We can do this because we have stabilized operational costs, reduced costs through technology, increased the apportionment collection rate, and are better stewards with the resources you share with us. We are committed to assisting congregations with repurposing their buildings for mission and ministry. We recognize that some of our congregations have buildings that were built for a former generation, but now we need to be wise stewards and re-imagine and re-size our buildings for a new generation of ministry. We have done this with Mt. Vernon Place in Washington and will repurpose the Casa Calvary building in Washington. This building will become 79 units of permanent supportive housing for the homeless and it will offer space for a new church start for mission-minded disciples with an evangelical spirit.
- We are committed to personal and social holiness as we transform the world. This project will focus on ministry with homeless veterans. We will begin with veterans because they have served our nation valiantly and now that they need someone, we the Church need to step forward and offer grace.
- We are committed to supporting your growth through Immersion series resources. We will create or identify Immersion Series that will make and grow disciples, increase worship attendance and small groups, and engage disciples in mission. We also pledge to train congregational leaders in how to use the Immersion Series for maximum disciple making. There are several immersion series that are available to you online which include A Welcoming Life, Green Church, Fully Alive and others. Today we also announce to you a Faith-Based Finances resource which will assist you with fall stewardship campaigns.

- We are committed to strengthening the Gateway system to make it easier to use and to identify trends in your congregation. Gateway has enabled us to be better stewards of the resources you have shared with us. We understand it is not as user-friendly as we would like but we are working to make this a seamless system for you that will help you with providing necessary reports, accessing valuable information about your church, and understanding discipleship ministry.
- We are committed to helping you improve stewardship in your congregation. Through our new Mid-Atlantic Foundation, we are providing vehicles for growing your investments and are now working on resources that will improve stewardship in your congregations.
- We are committed to starting 20 new congregations over the next 10 years. Starting new congregations has been demonstrated as the best way to make new disciples. On July 1 we will launch a new congregation in Anne Arundel County that will focus on reaching young adults and engaging them in small groups and mission. We are inviting congregations throughout the conference to partner with us. As a partner, the conference provides salary and benefits for an associate pastor to your congregation for 18 months. During that time, the associate pastor is starting new small groups, starting a new worship service and connecting with new people in another community. After the 18 months, the associate starts a second site ministry and your congregation seeds this second site with 10-20 disciples from your congregation. We are also looking for clergy and laity with the gifts for starting new congregations. You can learn more about being a new church start champion by contacting Andy Lunt, Director of Congregational Development.

Your congregation is not alone. None of us are. We are diverse strands of thread and textures and colors. But our strength, our capacity to comfort and transform the world around us, only comes from us being woven together like a tapestry. We become this tapestry as we unite in our mission, trust one another, and support each other in achieving ministry goals. Let us all commit to pray for and work side by side with all of the congregations and communities throughout the Baltimore-Washington Conference, in hope that we all succeed in experiencing the joy of passionate worship, radical hospitality, and spreading God's extravagant grace.

One of the ways we grow our ministry with you is through our budget. Our budget is a theological and missional document that is a road map for how we plan to be like Christ as we call, equip, send and support spiritual leaders to make disciples and grow vital Acts 2 congregations for the transformation of the world. Today we present to you the 2012 apportionment budget of \$15.1 million (\$15,154,223) and an overall budget of \$18 million (\$18,484,406). This is an increase in the apportionment budget of 2.4 percent.

Between 2010 and 2011, the apportionment budget did not increase and in 2009 we reduced the apportionment budget by 10 percent. We have sought to be faithful with you and we want to keep as much money in the local church as possible so that you can faithfully carry out mission and ministry at the local level. We know that in order for you to meet the Bishop's charge to face our adaptive spiritual challenges, you must have the resources to do vital mission and ministry through your congregation. We want to help.

The 2012 budget represents an 18 percent benevolence factor, down from 19.5 percent. As already mentioned, we are recommending that we continue to reduce the benevolence factor to 16 percent by 2017 but grow mission and ministry by at least 3 percent a year. This will be possible, as we:

- Stabilize, and as appropriate, reduce operational costs. For instance, our new mission center costs less than the previous conference center.
- Grow the apportionment collection rate from 91 percent to 94 percent.
- Grow our apportionment base by 3 percent through healthy local church stewardship. In

- the last two years during difficult economic times we grew the apportionment base by 10 percent.
- Practice good stewardship and focus our resources on growing vital Acts 2 congregations that make disciples and engage disciples in the transformation of the world.

We present to you a budget that we believe is courageous and forward leaning. It is in alignment with our mission and is faithful to the gifts that you generously give through your apportionments. It is a budget that will enable us to press on for the high calling that is before us. Among the highlights are:

- 3 percent increase in salaries and benefits.
- 4.9 percent increase in mission and ministry.
- 18.6 percent of our budget is for general church apportionments.
- 13 percent is for retiree health benefits.
- 16 percent of our budget is for operational costs.
- \$304,000 to support a self-sustaining process for starting 20 new congregations over the next 10 years.
- \$250,000 to provide associate pastors to four African American congregations: Westphalia in Prince George's County, Asbury in Shepherdstown, and John Wesley and Epworth Chapel in Baltimore. We have no African American congregations with a full-time associate appointment. Our goal is to grow four congregations over 400 and eventually 500 in worship.
- \$110,000 for urban ministry, particularly for Baltimore as we rebuild our United Methodist ministry in Baltimore.
- \$208,000 for youth ministry, in addition to the funding for our camping ministry. These resources are generated by and support ROCK, our winter retreat for youth that makes new disciples and trains youth and their leaders for stronger youth ministry in their congregations. We will begin additional ROCK experiences in each region during the summer and there are new online services through our youth ministry. Our youth ministry is one of the largest and most successful in the denomination.
- \$90,000 for lay ministry that will assist in training laity, recruiting and developing the lay speaking ministry, hold Days Apart with the bishop, and grow our certified lay ministry. We continue to grow vital Acts 2 congregations through lay ministry. Throughout the denomination, United Methodist Men have committed to making prison ministry a priority and United Methodist Women support women empowerment and ministries with children and youth in poverty. Today we thank God for the laity who press on to strengthen our congregations and engage in mission around the world.
- \$38,000 for young adult ministry. The young adults have organized themselves to strengthen ministry in our congregations and now publish a young adult magazine called Shift.
- \$182,000 for recruiting, assessing and developing new clergy for ministry.
- \$110,000 to be placed in a maintenance fund for the Conference Mission Center. We are on a pace to develop a fund that will maintain and replace equipment and property so that we will never have to raise the apportionments or have special appeals for our building. The Conference Mission Center is a gift to the present and future ministry of the conference as it will save us money. It will do so while broadening our witness and generating income through the Cokesbury Book Store and the African Art Museum of Maryland. These mission partners further our values and generate income for ministry.
- Also in 2012, there will not be an increase in health benefit costs to local churches. We hope this relief during 2012 will strengthen your resources for ministry.

In your churches, you have witnessed fellow disciples who have experienced financial challenges which has impacted your congregations. Also, in the midst of rising costs, declining membership,

annual conferences, and the entire General Church is under strain, not just for a season but this is now a new way of life for us.

At the conference level, we are forced to make tough administrative decisions that no one wants to make. Yet we must be filled with hope that tough decisions serve only to strengthen our resolve to press on to make a difference with the resources we have. So, today we present a recommendation that we eliminate the retiree health care benefit for any clergy or conference lay staff who begin serving the conference starting in 2012. This recommendation is made by our Board of Pensions in recognition that few retirees in society receive such a benefit today and that if we continue to offer this benefit we will have an unfunded liability of \$1.5-\$2.0 million and that the retiree health benefit will grow to 20 percent or more of our budget in the future. All clergy who are presently serving the Baltimore-Washington Conference will not be affected. They will receive a retiree health benefit based on their years of service when they retire.

Finally, we present to you the nominations report. We recommend a group of disciples who have demonstrated that they press on as leaders and models of faith in Christ. They have demonstrated their ability in local church ministry, community ministry and service to the conference. They represent every region of our conference and together with those who have been elected in previous years, they represent the ethnic and congregational diversity of our conference. They have agreed to serve and look forward to strengthening our ministry in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. All of the great ministry over the last two days shared in the State of the Church report is because you have given yourself faithfully to the ministry of Jesus Christ here in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. You have grown in your faith, given generously, and taken risks to further the cause of Jesus Christ.

Thank you for being faithful and fruitful United Methodists. As we seek to serve and resource your congregation, we need the following from each of our congregations and each United Methodist disciple.

- Save souls. To be bold in engaging with the nonreligious and nominally religious souls in your community and connect them with the transforming love of God that we experience in Jesus Christ. To save souls by engaging with the homeless, the addicted, those in prison, the poor, and the children and youth in our communities and love them until their souls are healed and strengthened for the great Discipleship Adventure we share.
- Grow mission. We are called to live outwardly, to see the community as our mission field. This year on October 8-10, during our Change the World event, we will have the opportunity to reach out to our communities when we unite to do mission across the region. Imagine 15,000 United Methodists, all lending hands and hearts to change the world.
- Grow spiritual leaders. As you grow the faith, skills and number of the leaders in your congregation you create greater opportunity to provide more and better ministry to save souls. We need both lay and clergy spiritual leaders to take responsibility for growing their gifts to better serve the church and the world. As in nature, when plants and trees are not growing they not only stop producing fruit, but they are more susceptible to disease. Laity and clergy that are not growing and sharpening their skills are making their congregations susceptible to conflict and decline.
- Grow disciples. Biblical illiteracy is unacceptable in mature Christians. Faith that is not grounded in Scripture, tradition, reason and experience is an immature faith that weakens the ministry of the Church and the power of the body of Christ in the world. What is your system for growing disciples? Are you increasing the number of small groups that study the Scriptures and engage disciples in mission? Do you offer Disciple Bible study? Do you make deep faith and participation in worship, Bible study and mission a prerequisite for

- leadership in the congregation? Until you do, you limit the transforming power of God in your congregation and reduce your ability to save souls.
- Grow your congregation. The heart of The United Methodist Church is its congregations. But congregations that do not see growing the quality and number of people in worship have lost sight of the great commission, lost their connection with the Psalms, lost a vision of the great worship on the day of Pentecost. In the last five years, more than 70 percent of our congregations grew worship attendance in at least one of those years. That is commendable. But the world needs you to be consistent in growing and making new disciples. We recognize that there will be some years without growth, but over five years, we expect growth. We know growth occurs as you provide spirited and quality traditional and contemporary worship that connects with the non-religious and nominally religious people in your community.
- Give generously. In 2010 we collected \$14.8 million in apportionments and an additional \$1 million was collected through the Advance and other mission giving, of which \$647,000 was directed to Haiti Relief efforts. This is a 90.51 percent collection rate, which has continued to rise over the last several years. Apportionments strengthen our ability to provide quality services in the Baltimore-Washington Conference and to do justice and mercy around the world. Most of our congregations have been exceptional in their giving. We now have more than 80 percent of our congregations paying 100 percent which is up over 10 percent six years ago. We recognize that a congregation may encounter a difficult year which impacts their budget but it is not acceptable to not commit to pay 100 percent of your apportionments. We also can no longer appoint clergy to churches that do not pay all of their pension and health insurance. It is not being faithful to our shared ministry and to one another when a church does not pay its obligations. We have and will continue to merge and close churches and not appoint full-time clergy to churches that are not meeting their obligations.
- Practice the Wesleyan Means of Grace. Courageous and forward-leaning mission congregations practice spiritual disciplines. Our vital work is a spiritual adventure based on John Wesley's means of grace. John Wesley taught that God's grace is unearned and that we are not to be idle waiting to experience grace but we are to engage in the means of grace. The means of grace are ways God works invisibly in disciples, hastening, strengthening and confirming faith so that God's grace pervades in and through disciples. As we look at the means of grace today, they can be divided into works of piety and the works of mercy.
 - Works of Piety – reading, meditating and studying the scriptures, prayer, fasting, regularly attending worship, sharing in the sacraments, healthy living, sharing our faith with others, Christian conferencing (accountability to one another), and going to Bible study.
 - Works of Mercy - doing good works, visiting the sick, visiting the prisons, feeding the hungry, seeking justice, ending oppression and discrimination (for instance Wesley challenged Methodists to end slavery), and addressing the needs of the poor.

The bishop concluded the report by telling the gathering that over the next year we will work with you to set and accomplish goals, make disciples, grow your congregations, seek justice and serve your community. As we humble ourselves, rely on the Holy Spirit and run the race that is set before us, God will bless our ministry and our congregations. We know we are calling you to a greater challenge, but these are challenging times that require deeper faith and greater acts of service. This is a time to give ourselves to a higher calling and increase our commitment so that we become like Christ as we make and engage disciples for the transformation of the world.

We must lean into the wind. We must press on. Not that we have already obtained it or have already reached the goal; but we press on to make the goal of making disciples, growing vital Acts 2

congregations so that we transform the world, because Christ Jesus has made us his own.

Bishop Schol thanked those who had shared in the presentation of the report. He then asked those present to share with a neighbor what they had heard over the past two days. There was a buzz across the ballroom as people conversed with one another. After regaining the attention of the assembly, the bishop then asked for those in the room to turn to another and talk about one thing they had heard that was hopeful. The process was repeated, giving everyone an opportunity to share on thing that was a challenge or concern within our conference.

The bishop invited people to come to the microphones and briefly offer one thing that had been discussed. Mark Schaefer, campus minister at American University, asked where campus ministries fit into the report. He reminded us that campus ministry is about developing young adult leaders. Audrey Saunders of Queens Chapel UMC in Beltsville raised the issue that if the conference is not going to offer retirement benefits in the future, how is it going to get new pastors? Frank Gould, chair of the Board of Pensions and Benefits, clarified that the budget proposal to eliminate health benefits to retirees does not include the elimination of those benefits while people are serving. The proposal only applies to those pastors ordained when they retire — those particular pastors would not receive the supplemental retiree health benefits (to Medicare) now provided. Churches are encouraged to help new pastors establish accounts to save toward meeting this expense when they retire.

Kirk Van Gilder expressed concern that reducing the conference benevolent funds reduces the conference's ability to provide for ministries, such as deaf ministry, that local churches cannot provide. Kelly Oden of North Bethesda UMC responded in saying that we had heard that conference youth are doing remarkable things without apportionment dollars. Rita Green of Fairhaven UMC in Gaithersburg reminded the body that local church United Methodist Women groups are small ones. She encouraged pastors and lay leaders to continue to support local church UMW units. Katy Richards, who teaches senior high Sunday school at Deerwood UMC, lifted up a concern that members of that class have told her that many of them do not invite their friends to their church because they are ashamed of the [official] position of their church regarding homosexuality. Frances Stewart of Friendship UMC in Damascus said she was impressed with the conference's emphasis on saving souls and a young adult from First UMC in Hyattsville expressed gratitude that Jesus Christ is still in the miracle making business. A member of Jackson Chapel in Frederick asked whether the conference will be providing training for local church leaders involved in a merger with another church. The bishop responded that the conference is planning the establishment of a comprehensive leadership development program and that that issue would be one of the pieces included. Geraldine Whitley of Christ UMC expressed her appreciation for the conference Bible study and noted how crucial it is that we embrace the people within our communities.

The bishop stood before the assembled body and commented that several people have asked what is a "nominally religious" person. He said that he wanted to share about one nominally religious person he knows, his daughter. She believes in God, but doesn't always find God in the church. She finds that the church is trying to keep people out instead of bringing people in. She hears the church talk about things but doesn't see much action; she sees that the church cares more about its edifices than about God's environment. She finds that the church wants to change her, rather than inviting her to help the church change. And, it breaks his heart that his daughter doesn't go to church every week. She is mission-minded and helps raise money for women in developing countries. She believes that she is doing the work of God. Once, while doing so, she had a conversation with someone who is a member of a United Methodist church in our conference. She found God more in that conversation with that person than in sitting in church.

Bishop Schol reminded us that he's talking about our kids and our grandkids, our neighbor's kids

we see in our community. Many of them think that we've already made up our minds, that we'll not be open to what they have to say. They're interested in those who are open, who will help them try to work on their "life stuff." We [the church] are not connecting. We need a church that connects, that doesn't put up barriers. When we are so concerned about how to maintain the structures and institution, we are really leading other people away from the church.

The bishop said that sometimes he thinks it's not his daughter who needs to change; but himself. We need to search our hearts. We need to be asking the question, "How can this person enrich me and my journey?" How do we help to love people right where they are? If we think that church is simply about some new fangled thing that will get more members in the church and more people in the pews, we've missed what it's all about. What we need to figure out is how to get people out of the pews and into the streets. What would it look like to open our doors to those who wanted to practice? These reports that we have heard really say that we have some tough challenges ahead of us and we've got to change.

After the bishop ended his remarks, Mark Miller and band led in the signing of "God Is Able [When You've Fallen into Despair]." Bishop Schol led us in prayer, asking God to help the church to change and to heal our pain and disappointments. He asked that God would move across our conference and have God's way with us.

As we turned our attention to the business of the day, the bishop commented that we have these high spiritual moments and then we move to the mundane: "We talk about this stuff like it's planning for the end of the world." We need good conversation, but the decisions we make just keep the gears greased, so that we can keep the conference running. He said that God doesn't jump up and down because we passed a budget or figured out who we'll going to elect, but, as the Scriptures tell us, God rejoices when one person finds their way home.

Gay Green-Carden, chair of the Nominations Committee, and Evan Young, director for Spiritual Leadership and assistant to the bishop, came to the podium to present the Nominations Report. The following people were added to the existing report: M. Shelly Owens, Commission on DisAbility and Rev. Jackson Day, Board of Pensions. With those additions, the Nominations Report was approved by the conference.

Charlie Moore, Chair of CFA, then took a moment of personal privilege to thank the bishop for opening up his heart and sharing what's inside. Mr. Moore said he was certain he spoke for the vast majority present who are truly proud and privileged to work beside Bishop Schol as we make disciples for the transformation of the world. Mr. Moore reminded the body that we are about the ministry of administration and that the budget is nothing more than a "dollarization" of our vision and values. He drew our attention to the preconference booklet (pages 60 and 61) that outlined six recommendations from CFA:

1. The proposed budget of \$18,484,406 shall be adopted for 2012, including an apportionment budget of \$15,54,223. This represents an increase of 2.4% in the apportionment asking over the 2011 budget. (The collection assumption for 2012 is set at 91.0%.)
2. The Benevolence Factor (BF) target for 2012 shall be 18.0%.
3. As required by *The Book of Discipline*, the ratio for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be set as follows: 33% for World Services and 67% for Conference Benevolences and other General Church Benevolences with fine adjustments being made between Conference sessions by CFA.
4. The selection of an independent auditor to audit the conference Treasurer's financial records for 2010 pending the results of a multiple vendor Request for Proposal (RFP). The Audit Committee

will complete the process in time for the selection to be announced at Annual Conference. Note: CFA selected Ellin and Tucker of Baltimore as auditors and that the audit is for the 2011 records, not 2010.

5. The date for closing of the 2011 books shall be set at January 17, 2012, with all payments to be received by the Treasurer's Office no later than January 17, 2012.
6. The Baltimore-Washington Conference grants authority to the Council on Finance and Administration, in consultation with the Bishop, to act on financial matters between sessions of Annual Conference.

Mr. Moore moved the adoption of the six recommendations and the budget that was summarized on page 61 of the preconference booklet.

A couple of people posed questions regarding the proposal that those appointed or hired after Dec. 31, 2011, would not be eligible for Conference funded retiree medical insurance. The bishop emphasized that this proposal does not impact the 2012 proposed budget. Rev. Charles Harrell inquired about the status of future health benefit reserves: Where do we stand? What is the cycle of evaluation re the reserve fund for future medical insurance liability? Frank Gould, Chair of the Board of Pension and Benefits, said that he thought that account totaled approximately \$17 million but that he did not have the data in front of him.

A vote was taken and the budget and the six recommendations were approved.

Service of Remembrance

The Bishop, Cabinet and honored guests processed in to the singing of "For All the Saints." Jessica Statesman led the Call to Worship. The Scripture lesson came from Revelation 7:9-17. Mark Miller and band led in the singing of "Amen" and "This Little Light of Mine." Bishop John Schol introduced the guest preacher, the Rev. Dr. Emora Brannan, lead pastor at Grace UMC in Baltimore City. Rev. Brannan has been a gift of this conference, including his ministry of history.

Rev. Brannan introduced his sermon, "A Heap of Living," by reading from Edgar Guest's sentimental poem, "Home." Rev. Brannan said that "those we pause to celebrate and remember this day, I would suggest, are those who have done a heap of living — clergy and their spouses and lay members of this conference who have known the joys and the challenges of life in the church, and have "sort o' wrapped their souls around everything." Rev. Brannan continued by saying that in the passage from Revelation that we just heard, the faithful are said to have "come out of the great ordeal," or as the King James Version of the Bible puts it, they "have passed through the great tribulation" and they "have washed their robes in the blood of the lamb."

The great ordeal for the writers of the Apocalypse was persecution by the Roman Empire. For those whom we honor, the one thing they all had in common was that they were all members of the Annual Conference. They have served God's people. They have known the honest truth that God's people can be both a joy and a tribulation ("Say it ain't so, Joe," but it is!).

One of the little known facts about himself is that Rev. Brannan has a fondness for country music. He likes country music because it is often concerned with the joys and tribulations of everyday life — just like the church. Rev. Brannan recalled the advice from Kenny Rodgers' song "The Gambler": "If you're gonna play the game, boy, you gotta learn to play it right. You've got to know when to hold 'em, know when to fold 'em, know when to walk away, know when to run. You never count your money when you're sittin' at the table. There'll be time enough for countin' when the dealin's done." Those we honor in this service embodied these truths. Each of us who knew, loved and respected them witnessed over and over how they knew when to hold, fold, or walk (maybe even run) away.

“It has been ever thus among God’s people.” Tucked away in his library, Rev. Brannan told us, is a little book by the famous Puritan preacher, Cotton Mather (1663-1728), entitled *Manductio ad Ministerium: Directions for a Candidate of the Ministry*. Once we get over Mather’s insistence that such candidates need to know several languages, he actually has some really useful advice, which Mather called maxims. First of all, consider yourself a dying man, but be a long liver. In other words, “it takes a heap of living.”

It may not be amiss to have two heaps — a Heap of Unintelligibles and a Heap of Incurables. Every now and then you will meet something or other that may really distress your thoughts. The surest way with vexations will be to throw them into the heap they belong to, and be no more distressed about them. There will be unaccountable and incomprehensible things, particularly in the conduct of people. Throw those into the Heap of Unintelligibles and be done with them. When you meet unpersuadable people, no council or reason will affect these obstinates. Throw them into the Heap of Incurables. Let not the crooked things that cannot be made straight encumber you.

While Mather was writing for candidates to ordained ministry, lay members also know all about Unintelligibles and Incurables. We can all make good use of our “heaps” as we seek to do a heap of living.

Our loved ones have come through the great ordeal. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the center of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes (Rev. 7:16-17). Rev. Brannan gave thanks to those who had come to remember their loved ones. He thanked them for giving us their loved ones to serve the church. He also thanked God for enabling those beloved dead to do a heap of living so God’s church could be our home.

After the sermon, Cassandra Kellam, accompanied by Mark Miller and the rest of the band, sang “Give Me Jesus.” Then the Conference Secretary read the names of the honored dead, beginning with thanksgiving and celebration for the remembrance of a bishop, James Mathews. She then read the names of the other deceased clergy: Charles Holton Acker, Jr., Thomas Ahn, Janet Brewer, Zacarias Juan Cardoso, James Clemons, John Wesley Coleman, Edward R. Dickel, Patricia Ann Haynes Drake, Steward H. Frazier, Jr., Harold Garrett, Leron Stoney Graham, John G. Hamilton, Donald T. Howard, Charles Albert Johnson II, Willie Otto Kent, Jr., Bruce Miller II, Eric Peacher, Richard S. Roper, William D. Sampsele, John Raymond Thomas, and Kenneth Aubrey Tyson.

The roll of honored clergy spouses included: Wilma Artis, Leonard Blagmond, Louise Pyke Bowling, Teresa A. B. Calvin, Shirley Griest, John Holliday, Melvin Jones, Eileen Justus, Varnie-Belle Kannenberg, Elizabeth Kepperling, Gail Kimmell, Elizabeth Kuschel, Sarah Moore, Sarah Munney, Charles Oliver, Marjorie E. Perry, Lillian Pferdeort, Shirley Rohrbaugh, Irma Scamehorn, Margaret Sylvester, Gladys Twigg, Virginia Wilson, and Louise Winters.

The Conference Secretary then read the names of lay members of the conference who have died: Raymond Cain, F. Duncan Cornell, Cliff Hughes, Flavia Kaufman, Miriam Phelps, Hazel Robey, Joseph Schwartz, Larry Stein, Annie R. Thompson, Dorothy Walsh, and Josephine Young. After the reading of each grouping of names, the congregation responded by singing “Thank You, Lord.” Bishop Schol offered a Prayer of Hope and led us in the Lord’s Prayer, followed by the singing of “Great Is Thy Faithfulness.” The bishop led the Sending Forth of Light and the conference responded with the singing of “Jesus, the Light of the World.” After the dismissal, those leading worship recessed to the singing of “We Are Gong to See the King.”

Clergy Balloting

The clergy reassembled in the ballroom for additional balloting. The bishop asked that we enter into a time of prayerful discernment. Three additional delegates needed to be elected for NEJ Conference. There was no election on the first ballot. Two delegates were elected on the second ballot: Victoria Starnes and Roderick Miller. On the next ballot there was no election. Evan Young was elected on the following ballot. The alternate delegates, John Rudisill, Donna Claycomb Sokol, David Simpson, and Karin Walker, were elected on the final ballot. The bishop expressed appreciation to Mark Smiley and his team for their good work. The Rev. Mandy Sayers led the blessing for lunch.

FOURTH PLENARY SESSION

Friday, May 27, 2011

Grand Ballroom

The laity and clergy entered the ballroom for the afternoon session as Mark Miller led the singing of “Allelu, Allelu, Praise Ye the Lord.” The gathered body also sang the Zimbabwean song, “Njalo!” The bishop greeted the members. Linda Warehime began the opening prayer by singing “Lord, Listen to Your Children Singing.” We come, she said, connecting with children of all ages throughout the world who are in need. She lifted up the children of Zimbabwe who are in homes and orphanages and those children in our own communities who lack, from the beginning of their lives, the basic necessities. She gave thanks for Marian Wright Edelman and for such advocacy programs as the Children’s Defense Fund.

Bishop Schol announced that the afternoon would focus on children and the importance of children in society. Tony Small, artistic director for the Boys’ and Girls’ Clubs of Greater Washington, greeted us and introduced three children who shared two musical numbers: “I Can Be All God Says I Can Be,” and “Blessed Coming In and Blessed Going Out.”

Marian Wright Edelman Address. The bishop introduced Marian Wright Edelman. He delineated some of her accomplishments and awards, such as the Presidential Medal for Freedom, which she received in 2000. However, he said, her greatest achievements are the young people who have graduated from college, law or medical school because they had a head start and a healthy start because of the Children’s Defense Fund. After a video from the Children’s Defense Fund, “What About the Children? Faces from the Cradle to Prison Pipeline,” Ms. Edelman addressed the body. She expressed her affections for the United Methodist Women, without whom we would not have a Child Care Block Grant in our country. She also expressed appreciation for the United Methodist Bishops’ Initiative on Children and Poverty.

Ms. Edelman said that she believes this is “one of the most dangerous times this country has ever faced. We need to talk about justice,” she said. Ms. Edelman is convinced that “the greatest threat to our national security is not from without. It’s a failure to invest in our children,” she said. She quoted theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer, “The test of the morality of a society is how we treat our children.” America, and its churches, are flunking this test, she said. “If we believe every child is sacred, we must be out there fighting for every sacred child.”

Edelman said that black children are facing their “worst crisis since slavery,” pointing to a low quality of education and high rates of youth incarceration. “I believe incarceration is becoming the new American apartheid,” she said. “How can six and seven and eight-year-old children be arrested and handcuffed on school grounds for offenses that used to be handled in the principal’s office, and there’s not a huge ruckus from the community of adults?”

According to Ms. Edelman, black males are six times as likely to be incarcerated as white males. A black boy has a one-in-three chance of going to prison at some point in his life. “Our country and our states are spending, on average, three times more per prisoner than per public school pupil. That’s the dumbest public policy I can think of,” she said. According to Ms. Edelman, these crises are not acts of God, but choices that must be changed. The church ought to say so. “Where is our voice?” she asked.

As a summary towards a solution for the nation’s minority children, Ms. Edelman highlighted a biblical story. “Everything our nation and all of us need to know about life can be learned from Noah’s Ark,” she said.

Lesson one: don’t miss the boat. The United States is going to miss the boat to lead and compete in our globalizing world because we are not preparing a majority of our children for the future. Every 11 seconds of the school day, a child drops out. A majority of children of all racial and income groups, and over 80 percent of black and Hispanic children, cannot read or compute at grade level in fourth, eighth or twelfth grade. God did not make two classes of children. Every single one deserves a quality education.

Lesson two: we are all in the same boat. Many Americans may not like or think they have any self-interest in assuring a fair playing field for other people’s children, especially poor and minority children. But black, Hispanic and other minority children will be a majority of our child population in 2023.

Lesson three: plan ahead. It wasn’t raining when Noah built the ark. Tomorrow is today, and children have only one childhood.

Lesson four: remember that the Ark was built by amateurs; the Titanic was built by professionals. Feel your own power. Use your own power. Don’t rely on experts.

The last lesson: build your future; build our children’s future and our nation’s future on high ground.

For those wishing to more deeply encounter God by becoming advocates for children, Ms. Edelman recommends beginning study groups in local churches to explore Michelle Alexander’s book *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness*. She also encouraged the celebration of a Children’s Sabbath.

“The wealthy man didn’t go to hell because of his wealth,” Ms. Edelman told the gathering. “He went to hell because he didn’t recognize that his wealth was his opportunity. He went to hell because he allowed his brother to be invisible. The real question before us is ‘Do we have the will?’” Edelman said. “We must take the first step, keep moving, and let God do the rest.”

Black College Fund Representative. Following the completion of Ms. Edelman’s address, the trio from the Boys’ and Girls’ Clubs sang a classical piece entitled, “Bless Your People.” Then Sandy Ferguson, Social Justice/Mission Director for the Conference, introduced Charlie Walter Coleman III, the son of two United Methodist pastors. Mr. Coleman is a student at Dillard University, a historically black liberal arts college in New Orleans that is affiliated with The United Methodist Church (and the United Church of Christ). Charlie was recently elected president of the student body and maintains a 3.8 GPA. He said that the best opportunity his collegiate career has afforded him so far is to represent The United Methodist Church and the eleven historically black colleges of the denomination. He stated that all 16,000 students who attend those colleges and universities appreciate our continued

support. "You are equipping spiritual leaders for the transformation of the world and are enabling college students to lead transformed lives," he concluded.

Bishop Schol asked the three young people from the Boys' and Girls' Clubs to join Charlie and him on stage. Then he prayed for their future and the future of all children and youth. Mark Miller offered a musical interlude of "We Shall Overcome."

The bishop shared that the Baltimore-Washington Conference has now paid 100 percent of its apportionment for the 14th year in a row. In a brief video, Bishop Lindsey Davis (Kentucky Area), president of the General Council on Finance and Administration, thanked our conference for paying our apportionments in full. On behalf of the GCFA, Charlie Moore, who serves on the Council as an at-large member from the Northeastern Jurisdiction, presented a plaque of appreciation to the bishop and conference for our continued payment of 100 percent of our apportionments.

Stewardship Legislation. The bishop called upon Charlie Moore to complete the Stewardship Report. Mr. Moore updated the conference on the status of the retiree medical plan. There is somewhere between \$17,000,000 and \$18,000,000 in reserves with an estimated liability of \$55,000,000. This means that there is approximately \$38,000,000 liability that is unfunded. This liability continues to grow. Mr. Moore also said that, over the years, the conference has accumulated a variety of reserve accounts. CFA, along with Conference staff, is currently in the process of reviewing these accounts to determine that the intended use of each account is still an initiative that is currently "on the table." There is a likelihood that some accounts have become dormant. Some of the funds from those accounts will probably be used to set up a contingency reserve that will handle unexpected consequences from various legal and human resources matters.

The bishop then turned our attention to page 77 of the pre-conference booklet, and the proposal that "Any people appointed or hired after December 31, 2011, would not be eligible for Conference-funded retiree medical insurance." Also to be considered were the nine recommendations from the Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

Two speeches were made against the proposal concerning conference-funded retiree medical insurance, while three people spoke in support of the proposal. An amendment was introduced to strike lines 4 and 5 of the Recommendations from Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits (i.e. the proposal concerning the Conference-funded retiree medical insurance). After two speeches for the amendment and two against, the question was called. The amendment did not pass.

Another amendment was proposed :to strike the word not on line 4 and to change the language to read: "Any people appointed or hired after December 31, 2011, would be eligible for Conference-funded retiree medical insurance only if they pay 100% of the premium." Another motion was made to refer this proposal to the Board of Pensions to see if that amendment to the original proposal is a viable option.

There was a request to divide the question so that the conference consider the proposal regarding conference-funded retiree medical insurance separate from the nine recommendations delineated on page 77 in the pre-conference journal. The bishop tested the house and the body approved this request. A motion was made and seconded to suspend the rules. The motion did not pass. The proposal to refer the amendment to the Board of Pensions passed.

Since the body had voted to split the questions, the bishop then directed our attention to lines 4 and 5 of the original proposal: *Any person appointed or hired after December 31, 2011, would not be eligible for Conference-funded retiree medical insurance.* A motion was made and seconded to strike this proposal from the Recommendation from Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

The question was called. That motion passed. The body then voted whether to strike lines 4 and 5 of the original proposal from the report. It did not pass and the lines remain in the report. The next vote was on whether or not to approve lines 4 and 5: *Any person appointed or hired after December 31, 2011, would not be eligible for Conference-funded retiree medical insurance.* Rev. Barry Hidey (Bel Air UMC) made a motion to refer lines 4 and 5 to the Board of Pensions for further study and recommendation. After two speeches for and two against the motion, a motion to call for the question was made, seconded and approved. The motion to refer lines 4 and 5 back to the Board of Pensions also passed. The Board of Pensions will study the matter further and report back to the Annual Conference when it gathers in 2012.

The bishop then turned our attention to the numbered recommendations (1-9) found on page 77 of the pre-conference booklet. A vote was taken and the recommendations passed. The body then turned to the matter of Resolutions Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Clergypersons of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, found on pages 77 and 78 of the pre-conference booklet. Those resolutions passed without debate.

The bishop thanked the body for its diligence and reminded us that as the Body of Christ we work to reach consensus on these matters. He expressed gratitude for the way we work through these proposals and recommendations. After several announcements, Jason Jordan Griffin gave the benediction, asking God's continued guidance and direction for our conference as we seek to draw the circle wider.

ORDINATION

Bishop John Schol, Bishop Forrest Stith, Bishop Gerard Knoche of the ECLA, the Cabinet, clergy and those to be ordained and commissioned processed in to the singing of "God of Grace, God of Glory," and "Marching to Zion." Rev. Lena Marie Dennis led the Call to Worship followed by the greeting and opening remarks given by Bishops Schol and Stith. Charles Shacochis and Lisa Jordan led the unison Opening Prayer. Bishop Schol said that ministry is the work of God done by the people of God. In celebration of our common ministry, he called upon all present to "remember your baptism and be thankful."

Delores Oden, conference Lay Leader, and Joye Jones, chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, presented the candidates for commissioning and ordination. As Stacey Cole Wilson, Board of Ordained Ministry Registrar for Provisional Members, read the names of those to be commissioned, they came forward to the chancel area: Kathy Altman, Daniel B. Andrews, Bernadette A. Armwood, Michael R. Beiber, Emily C. Berkowitz, Cynthia Marie Skacel Caldwell, Kelly Linette Grimes, Lisa Ann Jordan, Joseph Andrew Love, Samuel W. Marullo, Linda Motter, Bonnie Elisabeth Scott, David Christopher Shank, Jason Nathaniel Shank, James Allen Sherrod, and Julie Marie Wilson. Three of those presented, Joseph Love, Sam Marullo, and Julie Wilson, are to become Provisional Deacons; the others will become Provisional Elders. Charles Joseph Shacochis, Jr. was recognized as an Associate Member.

Mark Smiley, Board of Ordained Ministry Full Member Registrar, read the names of those to be

ordained. Donald Joseph Hohne and William Creighton Jones were presented to be ordained as Deacons. Those to be ordained as Elders included Patricia Allen, Sarah Babylon Dorrance, Jennifer Lynn Fenner, David Paul Graves, Jennifer Ann Karsner, John Bentley Rudolph, and Robert Eric Snyder. Lena Marie Dennis' orders were recognized.

The bishop asked the congregation for its assent to the commissioning, ordination and recognition of the orders of those named. The congregation assented and vowed to uphold those presented in their ministry. The bishop then examined the candidates. The Conference Choir, lead by Mark Miller, sang an anthem, "What Does the Lord Require of You?"

James Sherrod read the Scripture Lesson, 1 Timothy 4:6-16. In the sermon that followed, Bishop Schol said to those being ordained and commissioned, "In you, God has seen something. God believes in what you have to offer. Don't let anybody else pull you down because you haven't lived their life. God has given you your life to live and your ministry to do." He encouraged all those being commissioned and ordained to use the gift that God has given them and to pursue the pastor's craft, which Ralph Waldo Emerson defined as "converting life into truth." "Immerse yourselves in real life, and dare to connect with real people with words that are real. When you put those robes on, some of you think you need to be somebody different," Bishop Schol told the ordinands and those to be commissioned. But the Scripture tells us we have to be real, to live a real life. "If the Word and the gift in you mean anything," the bishop continued, "if it's going to connect with anything, it had better be real." The bishop concluded, "God is going to use you." After the sermon, an offering to benefit the homeless ministries throughout the conference area was collected. The offertory hymn was "Victory in Jesus."

Bishop Schol introduced H. Gerald Knoche, Bishop Emeritus of the Delaware-Maryland Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Each person to be commissioned came forward and knelt as Bishops Schol, Stith, and Knoche laid hands upon them and Bishop Schol said the words of commissioning. Bishop Schol also welcomed Charles Shacochis as an Associate Member. The Musical Response was "Njalo," which the congregation passionately and joyfully sang.

Bishop Schol explained the duties of a deacon and then prayed for those about to be ordained Deacon, Donald Joseph Hohne and William Creighton Jones. Then each of them came forward as the bishops laid hands upon them and they were ordained Deacons. Then Bishop Schol detailed the duties of an Elder. After praying for the Elder candidates, each came forward for the laying on of hands and the accompanying words of ordination. Lena Marie Dennis came forward and the bishop welcomed her into The United Methodist Church as her orders were recognized. The congregation responded with the singing of "This Is My Story." Afterwards, the congregation also welcomed and affirmed those who had been commissioned and ordained by greeting them with loud and long applause.

Bishop Schol stood before the congregation and said, "You may have come here to watch an ordination but there have been prayers for you gathered here, prayers that God may have something more for your life and that God needs you for ministry in the church. Maybe God is speaking to you to make the church real. Maybe God wants you to come forward tonight." The bishop invited those in the congregation to come forward. "It's time, he said, "to make the commitment as the Holy Spirit works in our lives." The newly ordained and members of the Board of Ordained Ministry greeted those who came forward as the congregation sang "Take My Life and Let It Be," "Sanctuary," "Open the Eyes of My Heart, Lord," and "Draw the Circle Wide." Afterwards, newly ordained Deacons Donald Hohne and Bill Jones gave the closing prayer and dismissal with a blessing. The sanctuary buzzed with joy and excitement as the bishops and clergy recessed to the singing of "We Are Marching."

FIFTH PLENARY SESSION**Saturday Morning****May 28, 2011****Grand Ballroom**

Laity and clergy members of the annual conference gathered in the Grand Ballroom on the last morning of annual conference as Mark Miller and his band sang “You Know My Ways” and “Jesus, I’ll Never Forget What You’ve Done for Me.” Bishop Schol greeted those assembled and, in reviewing the local Major League Baseball scores from the previous day, remarked that the Orioles need prayer. Bishop Schol continued his remarks by sharing how many had come up to him and told him that his story regarding his daughter was also their story. He reminded us that indeed we are in this together, that we do not travel alone. What happens to one of us happens to all, because we are the body of Christ.

Rev. Jennifer Fenner offered the invocation in both Spanish and English. She asked that God continue to transform us. She prayed for the family and congregation of John Farris of Great Cacapon UMC who had died the previous day.

The bishop then talked about Robert’s Rules of Order, which originated with Henry Martyn Robert, whose interest in parliamentary procedure began in 1863 when he was chosen to preside over meetings at the Baptist Church to which he belonged. (The associate director of the Mid-Atlantic Foundation is a nephew of Henry Robert, but Frank claims to know nothing about Robert’s Rules of Order.) The bishop explained how we apply Robert’s Rules to our conference proceedings and how we handle motions, amendments and speeches for and against. He reminded the body that his role is to help us, the conference, make the decisions we want to make.

Then the bishop called upon Mark Smiley, chair of the Elections Committee, for a report on the election of clergy and lay delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Rev. Smiley first acknowledged his associate on the committee, Lynn Glassbrook, and then asked the others on the committee to stand and be recognized. He then read the results of the clergy and lay elections. The bishop expressed appreciation for Rev. Smiley and the election team and the conference applauded them.

Service of Passage: Bishop Schol said that life is a series of transitions that form us and make us who we are. He said that today we would celebrate the transitions of some people who have shaped us and others. The bishop told the conference, “The people you see before you are in the midst of transition just as Jesus moved out of the wilderness and into his ministry; all these transitions are opportunities.”

Mark Miller and his band led in the singing of “Be Thou My Vision” as the service began. Rev. Maria Andita Barcelo led the Call to Worship and those who were retiring, the newly ordained and commissioned, and local pastors responded. Bishop Schol read the names of the retirees and asked that they stand and be recognized. They included: Donald Atkinson, John William Bennett, Emora T. Brannan, C. Lee Brotemarkle, William Jack Bussard, Ronald Lee Collier Sr., Vicki S. Curry, Tunde E. O. Davies, George F. DeFord, John F. Footen, Douglas Fox, Richard G. Gray, Jr., William Richard Harden, Linda Healy, James Morgan Hunt, Frederick N. Iser, Richard K. McCullough, Robert McKinley III, Michael A. H. McKinney, Walter Middlebrooks, Eloise Newman, Conrad D. Parker, Kristina Peterson, Charles E. Slaugh, Holly Slaugh, Kelly Steven Sparks, Horace Lee Wallace, Alfreda L. Wiggins, Jeremiah G. Williams, and Carol Cosens Yocum. The conference applauded the retirees.

The bishop addressed the retirees, telling them that they had “lived a life of passion.” He noted that they had done many things that seemed beyond their power. He entreated them not to lose sight of the many ways in which God had used them and the great good that God had wrought through them.

As the retirees took their seats on the platform, the Rev. Joye Jones, chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, read the names of those who had been ordained the night before. They included: Patricia Allen, Sarah Babylon Dorrance, Jennifer Lynn Fenner, David Paul Graves, Jennifer Ann Karsner, John Bentley Rudolph, Robert Eric Snyder, Donald Hohne, and William Creighton Jones. The candidates formed an arc across the stage after each had laid a cord on the altar. The bishop then asked the Ordination Class of 2012 the historical questions of John Wesley. The bishop reminded the members of the Ordination Class and all those gathered that “We are bound to God and each other through our covenant with God’s covenant to us. We are bound to the past, bound in the present, and bound in our commitment to work for God’s future. These ties are made in Christian love, holding us up, carrying us along and pulling us forward.” Holding up a cincture, the bishop continued, “When you were baptized, the love of God bound you, the Lord embraced you and called you ‘disciple.’ And so today, once again, the love of God is binding you, and the Spirit of God is embracing you as you are bound to the special work for which God has called you.” Wearing a cincture, the bishop reminded the ordinands, is reminiscent of God’s covenant with God’s people. Then the retirees came forward and bound the ordinands with the red cinctures. The congregation responded with the singing of a stanza of “Blest Be the Tie That Binds.”

Rev. Stacey Cole Wilson, Provisional Member Registrar for the Board of Ordained Ministry, invited those who were newly commissioned to the stage as she read their names: Kathy Altman, Daniel B. Andrews, Bernadette A. Armwood, Michael R. Beiber, Emily C. Berkowitz, Cynthia Marie Skacel Caldwell, Kelly Linette Grimes, Lisa Ann Jordan, Joseph Andrew Love, Samuel W. Marullo, Linda Motter, Bonnie Elisabeth Scott, David Christopher Shank, Jason Nathaniel Shank, James Allen Sherrod, Julie Marie Wilson, and Charles Joseph Shacochis, Jr. Once again, retirees came forward to bind those in the Commissioned Class of 2012. The congregation responded by singing another stanza of “Blest Be the Tie That Binds.”

After the congregation sang “How Great Thou Art,” the bishop invited the local pastors to come forward to the platform and be recognized. They included: Pat Abell, Dauba Adams, Melvin Bond, Zelda Childs, Sherri Comer-Cox, Gerald Elston, Andrew Greenwood, Raphael Kodkoi, Daniel Kutrick, Kermit Moore, Robert Orrence, Twanda Prioleau, Michelle Thorne, and Wendy van Vliet. Once again, those gathered affirmed the local pastors by singing a stanza of “Blest Be the Tie.” Then Bishop Schol asked Rev. Lena Marie Dennis, whose Elder’s orders had been recognized at the Ordination Service, to stand and be greeted by the conference. The congregation warmly received Rev. Dennis.

Bishop Schol then read the names of those who had served faithfully for 50 years of ordained ministry: Lon Chestnutt, R. Frederick Crider Jr., Norman Kuehnle, Don Lowe, William Nelson and John Shirkey. The congregation affirmed by applause these faithful servants. Likewise, the bishop read the names of those who have served for 25 years in ordained ministry: Phillip Ayers, John Baker, Robert Barnes, Jr., Arlene Rose Carr, Gregory Coats, Tunde Davies, Susan Duchesneau, Victor Harner, Bernard Hillenbrand, Mildred Holliday, Kathleen Kohl, Vivian McCarthy, Ken McDonald, Charles Parker, Pat Pride, Doug Sands, Charles Simms, Dorothea J. B. Stroman, James Edward Swecker, and Obie Wright Jr. Those present stood and were greeted with applause from the congregation.

The bishop read the appointment of Rev. David Cooney as assistant to the bishop and Rev. David Argo

as Director of Connectional Ministries. Then he turned to the Cabinet, who came forward and read the appointments for each region. The bishop then gave thanks for the transitions we had witnessed and for the lives of those whom we had recognized. He prayed that the Spirit would move over all of us and that in the days that lie ahead, laughter would be plentiful, tears appropriate, and that people would surround us all with love so that we will know we do not travel alone. The service ended with the signing of “Here I Am, Lord.”

The bishop came to the front and said that he would like to take a moment to recognize the team that would be going to Zimbabwe to continue our Zimbabwe experience. He asked Charles Moore to come to a microphone. Mr. Moore lifted up two individuals, Neil Moores and Jim Gurley, for their work in Zimbabwe. Then the bishop prayed a blessing on the team going to Zimbabwe and gave thanks for how our partnership with Zimbabwe has enriched us in the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

Legislation: Bishop Schol then turned our attention to the legislative matters at hand. Rev. Rachel Cornwell, pastor of Silver Spring Cooperative Parish, made a motion that we suspend the rules so that we can limit debate to three minutes. The motion to suspend the rules passed. Then Rev. Cornwell made the motion that we limit debate to three minutes per speech for all matters requiring a vote for the remainder of annual conference. Chris Holmes, superintendent for the Annapolis District, moved to amend the motion to two minutes per speech. The amendment passed.

Rev. Laura Schultz, pastor of Howard Chapel in Ridgeville, asked whether those items that had been requested to be taken off the Consent Calendar should not be considered first. The bishop replied that the Consent Calendar was on the Order of the Day and would be considered at 11 a.m.

He then directed our attention to page 79 of the pre-conference booklet, “A Resolution Allowing a Pastoral Response to Requests for Same Gender Marriages and Unions.” The resolution was introduced by Mittie Quinn, a lay member of Dumbarton UMC. After two speeches for and two speeches against the resolution, the question was called. The motion passed. Rev. Doug Hayes of Lexington Park UMC asked that since the resolution says that the BWC adopts the following resolution, would that mean that, if approved, we would immediately put it into action? The bishop clarified that, with the passage of this resolution, it would be referred to General Conference from our annual conference. Ralph Williams, a lay member from Foundry UMC, gave the concluding remarks in support of the resolution. The resolution passed. Dan Marshall of Glyndon UMC called for a division of the assembly. It did not pass.

The next piece of legislation was found on page 81 of the pre-conference booklet, “Petition for General Conference: Proposed Resolution: Aligning UMC Investments with Resolution on Israel and Palestine.” David Hosey of Dumbarton UMC made the presenting remarks. A motion to table the resolution did not pass. After alternating speeches — two for and two against — the question was called for. That motion passed and Mr. Hosey made concluding remarks in support of the proposal. The motion to refer the resolution to General Conference passed.

The conference then turned its attention to a resolution, Wesley Nexus, Inc., found on page 83 of the pre-conference booklet. Rev. E. Maynard Moore, a retired clergy, presented the resolution. He asked that we give consideration to the website that Wesley Nexus had established, which has been in operation for the past 18 months. An inquiry was made if Wesley Nexus presented diverse opinions and included such points of view as Intelligent Design and the Creationist model. Rev. Moore responded that Wesley Nexus is not an advocacy group and includes links to a wide variety of resources. A motion was made and seconded to amend line 28 of the resolution to include in a parentheses after the word salvation, *recognizing Scripture as primary*. The amendment passed. Rev.

Matt Pool, pastor of Glen Mar UMC, asked if Wesley Nexus profited in any way and Rev. Moore assured him that Wesley Nexus adheres strictly to the policies Maryland has in place for operation and practice of non-profit organizations. Rev. David Simpson, pastor of Bethany UMC in Ellicott City, proposed an amendment that would eliminate the quotation marks around and the capitalization of the words *sound science*. The amendment was considered friendly and the conference voted to approve the amendment. After concluding remarks by Rev. Moore, the resolution was presented as amended for a vote and it was approved.

Sharon Leatherman, chair of the BWC Board of Church and Society, presented “A Petition to the 2012 United General Conference on “Continuing Peace and Justice Sunday.” After introductory remarks by Ms. Leatherman, the bishop asked if the assembly was ready to vote. It was and the petition was approved.

Rev. Roderick Miller brought before the body “Four Petitions Which Will Be Submitted to the 2012 General Conference by The United Methodist Task Force on Disability Ministries.” Rev. Miller explained that one aspect of these petitions dealt with matters of language -- changing the word *incapacity* to *health* when describing leave when members of an annual conference are unable to perform their duties because of health matters. Rev. Miller pointed out that another aspect of the petitions provided opportunities for those moving through the leave process to request from the Board of Ordained Ministry access to support and have access to advocacy and consultation. The four petitions were approved by the annual conference and will be presented to the General Conference.

Approval of the Consent Calendar: The bishop then moved to the Order of the Day. He told the body that the required number of signatures had been collected (five conference members) and the following reports were to be removed from the Consent Calendar: Communications, Council on Finance and Administration, Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, Board of Trustees, and the Board of Ordained Ministry. The Conference Secretary moved that the Consent Calendar (found on pages 4 and 5 of the pre-conference booklet) be approved with the exception of the five reports the bishop had just named. The Consent Calendar was approved by the body.

Rev. Laura Schultz, pastor Howard Chapel Ridgeville, raised an issue pertaining to letters to the editor of the *UMConnection*, the Conference newspaper. After the Communications Report, found on page 59 of the pre-conference booklet, was approved, the bishop called upon Shaun Lane, conference Director of Communications, to come to the podium. Mr. Lane said that the *UMConnection* has never formally suspended printing letters to the editor, but that they had just not received any recently. He said that there is a policy in place regarding the publication of letters to the editor and that we could find a copy in any issue of the *UMConnection*. He then detailed the policy:

All letters to The *UMConnection* will be considered for the “Viewpoints” section, as space is available. You must send it two weeks prior to publication and include your name, church, daytime phone number and/or e-mail address.

Letters should be no longer than 250 words and are subject to editing for length and clarity. Letters beyond two per year by the same author will have lower priority for publication. Additionally, letters by the same author that reiterate previously expressed opinions may not be published.

Publication of a letter does not imply the Baltimore-Washington Conference’s endorsement of the views presented by the author. Letters that impugn a person’s character will not be published.

The bishop conveyed his appreciation for the Communications Department, telling the conference that he receives compliments from many people, including other bishops, regarding the publications

and other media work of our conference Communications Department.

The conference members then voted approval of the CFA Report, found on page 48 of the pre-conference booklet. Wanda Cockrell, lay member from Bethesda UMC, made a motion to amend the report from the Board of Pensions and Benefits Report so that lines 50 and 51 would be stricken from the report. That amendment was seconded and then passed. Then conference members voted to approve the report as amended. The conference also passed the Board of Trustees Report and the Board of Ordained Ministry Report. The body then took a stretch break as we sang, "This Is My Story."

Resolution to Discontinue Churches: District Superintendents Karin Walker, David Argo, and John Rudisill, on behalf of the Appointed Cabinet, presented the following resolution: "Upon the recommendation of Paragraph 213 Committee for Discontinuance, we would like it known that the Baltimore-Washington Conference expresses thanksgiving to God for the Christian ministry rendered across the years by the members and pastors of Albright Memorial in Washington, D.C., John Wesley on Trimbell Road in Joppa, Md., and Mahnes Chapel in Bentley Springs, W. Va. And be it further resolved that the Baltimore-Washington Conference does hereby discontinue the aforementioned congregations as United Methodist churches pursuant to ¶ 2548.3 of *The Book of Discipline* 2008 and that all real and personal property currently being held in the name of the aforementioned congregations be transferred or sold by the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference Trustees after consultation with the respective district superintendent and the Director of Congregational Development in order to determine the best option for the use of said real and personal property. And, be it further resolved that the remaining members of the aforementioned churches have the privilege of moving their membership to the church of their choice with the membership role being deposited with the respective district superintendent."

Rev. Joseph Daniels of Emory UMC in Washington, DC offered an amendment to the Cabinet's resolution. He made a request on behalf of Emory in Brightwood that "we be given an opportunity to revive and revitalize the Albright Church that is seven blocks down from Emory." The motion was seconded. Rev. Daniels spoke to his proposed amendment, saying that Emory would like to be allowed to have an 18-month opportunity to work with the people of Albright to revive and revitalize that church. He said that 20 years ago Emory was in a situation similar to what Albright now faces and that Emory was almost closed twice. Past offers of help on Emory's part had been ignored. Someone on the floor asked if there had been a ¶213 Committee. Rev. Michael Szpak, chair of the ¶ 213 Committee for Albright Church, delineated that the deterioration of Albright's finances and lack of financial record, the many repairs needed to the building needed to make it safe, and the decline of attendance all convinced the committee that Albright needed to be closed. Furthermore, Albright has an unsustainable debt of \$259,000 to the General Board of Global Ministries. That loan has been called because there have been no payments on the loan since 2007.

Rev. Chris Homes, superintendent for the Annapolis District, asked if Emory became responsible for Albright would it have to assume Albright's debt as well. The answer was yes, if Emory assumed responsibility for Albright, it would immediately have to assume responsibility for the debt or renegotiate, if that were possible, the conditions of the loan. Rev. David Simpson, lead pastor of Bethany UMC in Ellicott City, asked why Emory was not part of the conversation regarding the closure of Albright. The reply was that the committee felt that it would be unfair to burden others with the poor building conditions and debt of Albright. Michael Monk, a lay member from the Baltimore Suburban District, spoke in favor of the motion and said that he would make a donation to help pay the debt. Rev. Katie Bishop, pastor of New Hope UMC in Brunswick, asked if there were any way we could separate the debt from Emory's assuming responsibility for Albright. Rev. Laura Easto, lead pastor at Westminster UMC, proposed that Emory assume responsibility for Albright but

that the annual conference become responsible for the debt that Albright has. She said, “We have an opportunity to transform a little corner of the pie and I want to be a part of it.” To an inquiry about whether if Emory had responsibility for Albright it could sell Albright’s building and keep the assets, the answer was affirmative. The bishop reminded the conference that if we passed the amendment it would be an automatic referral to CFA because it would have budget implications.

Rev. David Argo, superintendent for the Greater Washington District, in a point of order, asked if an annual conference could vote on a merger given the fact that the Discipline requires a certain procedure. At the bishop’s request, the Conference Secretary read Rev. Daniel’s amendment: “That Emory UMC be given the opportunity to bring revival and revitalization to the Albright Church over an 18-month period in partnership with the Baltimore-Washington Conference.” Then Rev. Easto’s amendment to the first amendment was read: “Emory Church would become responsible for Albright and the annual conference would assume responsibility for the debt.” Rev. Argo stated that he would like to make a motion to refer this to the Washington Regional Team. The bishop expressed desire that we try to untangle all this and get to the heart of the matter.

A point of order from the floor asked if Rev. Daniels could speak again. Rev. Daniels was allowed to speak to Rev. Easto’s amendment. He said that what was being asked was an opportunity to be able to revitalize, in particular, a black church at a time when we are saying we want to see the black church revived. Here, he said, are opportunities to do it and we’re not even at the table to be able to dialogue. He expressed a passion and desire to see revival and revitalization happen not only to Albright but also to other churches in that part of the city so that we might have a strong United Methodist presence in the city of Washington, D.C.

The bishop explained that issues around merger, alignment and appointment are the responsibility of the Cabinet and that, technically, a vote at annual Conference contradicts the *Book of Discipline*. He suggested that the conference might consider referring this matter back to the Cabinet. Someone from the floor made a point of order that, according to Robert’s Rules, we must deal with the amendments before us. The bishop concurred that the point or order was well taken.

Rev. Mark Venson, Ebenezer UMC in Lanham, asked about the ¶213 Committee’s process. Had there been representatives from other churches and the community involved? It seemed to him that part of the process had been ignored or not handled properly. Rev. Szpak responded that the committee had looked at the possibilities for future ministry of Albright: Given the configuration of the community, where did Albright fit? The committee considered such factors as the condition of the building, the involvement of the present congregants, and the difficulty in obtaining financial records because of a break-in. Jen Ihlo, a lay member from Dumbarton UMC, made a motion to refer the entire matter back to the Cabinet for further consideration, including that further conversations be held with Rev. Daniels and church members about how best to make the situation work. The motion was seconded. When voted upon, it carried. Afterwards, the bishop thanked Rev. Daniels for his willingness to step in.

The conference then turned its attention to the original resolution as we considered the two other churches to be closed. Matthew Monk, lay member from Wiseburg UMC, asked if there were any way we could talk about keeping congregations alive even though the buildings are closed. Rev. Karin Walker responded that this is actually covered in the resolution. Each congregation has the ability to move as the Body of Christ and partner with another congregation. When the motion was put before the body, it passed. Afterwards, Rev. Rudisill prayed for the congregations of John Wesley UMC and Mahnes Chapel UMC. Rev. Sandy Taylor, pastor of Mount Harmony UMC, suggested that churches within the conference send VIM teams to help Albright with repairs.

Sharon Leatherman, chair of the conference Board of Church and Society, presented a Petition to General Conference to amend ¶171.f in the Book of Discipline. Peck Foster, a lay member from the Baltimore Suburban District, spoke against the petition. A student from American University spoke in its favor. Matt Sickie, a lay member from Wesley UMC in Hampstead, spoke against the petition. A call for the question was made and seconded. It passed. Rev. Ken Hawes, pastor of Hughes UMC and chair of the conference chapter of the Methodist Federation for Social Action, presented the closing remarks on behalf of the makers of the petition. Rev. Katie Bishop asked if we could pray and the bishop called upon her to lead us in prayer. The vote was made and the petition passed.

The bishop then came to the front of the platform to address the conference. He reminded us of the difference in approaching church issues as technical problems or as adaptive spiritual challenges. What we just did represented the technical problems approach. He shared how the conference had tried to create dialogue around the issue of the language found in ¶171.f and issues of a similar vein by offering forums, but that nobody signed up to participate in these conversations. He said that the church can never fully be the Body of Christ until we are willing to grapple in conversation with the hard issues. Doing so does not mean that people will change their minds but it might mean that they change their hearts and the way they treat one another. We can hold in our mind an opinion or idea but we can love in our hearts in a way that accepts one another even though our minds don't agree. We will never become fully the body of Christ until we can get to a place where our hearts start to become one. The world can't understand how the church can't be of one heart. Bishop Schol encouraged us to find ways within our churches and between our churches to talk about our adaptive spiritual challenges.

The bishop then directed the assembly's attention to page 89 of the pre-conference booklet, "Resolution Regarding Our Unified Christian Witness to the World." He explained that the maker of the resolution, Rev. Bob Barnes, was unable to be present and had requested that the resolution be withdrawn. Technically, however, this resolution now belongs to the house because it has officially been presented through its publication in the pre-conference booklet. The bishop tested the wishes of the house and the body voted to withdraw the resolution.

The body then turned to the legislation on page 90 of the pre-conference booklet, "Resolution Concerning Usury." Some of the makers of the resolution, the Revs. Delyne Hinton, Mark Johnson, and Wanda Duckett, came to the platform. Mark Johnson introduced the resolution, noting that "ten percent is enough for God and it should be enough for bankers." Charlie Moore, lay member from the Annapolis District and president of CFA, said that CFA had reviewed the resolution and fully supports the interests, intents and concerns raised. However, CFA does have reservations about the requirement, or perceived requirements, it would put on churches or other organizations. He then moved an amendment to the resolution, replacing lines 42 to 52 of the published resolution with the following: "Be it resolved that CFA shall provide to each Baltimore-Washington council, board, local church and affiliated organization, the following list of financial evaluation standards to be used when considering a banking relationship."

Rev. Mark Johnson opposed the amendment, saying that the intention was "to know the banks we do business with." Rev. Steven Ricketts, pastor of Providence UMC in Fort Washington, spoke in favor of the amendment. The Conference Secretary asked Mr. Moore to read the amendment again. A vote was taken and the amendment passed.

A lay member from Foundry UMC spoke in favor of the resolution as amended. Curtis Ehrgott, pastor of Wesley UMC in Hampstead, spoke against it. Bonita Williams, lay member from Mt. Zion UMC in Laurel, spoke in favor. Rev. Charles Parker issued a point of order, clarifying that we are debating the original resolution, not the amendment. A Call for the Question was made and seconded. It carried.

Rev. Bob Hunter, pastor of Centre UMC in Forest Hill, asked if this resolution were binding on the churches or a suggestion of practices to follow. Rev. Hinton responded that it is a suggestion, not binding on the churches. Matt Sickle, lay member from Wesley in Hampstead, pointed out that we had only had one speech against. There were no other speeches against so Rev. Hinton offered closing remarks on behalf of the makers of the original resolution. The resolution as amended was brought before the conference. It passed. Rev. Sheldon Reese, pastor of Hollywood UMC, asked if the resolutions we pass, when forwarded to General Conference, have the recommendations from the Connectional Table included. The bishop replied that they do not.

Members of the Conference Committee on Hispanic/Latino Ministries presented the resolution found on page 91 of the pre-conference booklet, "Opposing Immoral Immigration Laws in Maryland." Peck Foster, lay member from Cedar Grove UMC, offered the following amendment: Strike the title of the proposal and insert, "Support for Comprehensive Immigration Reform;" insert as line 52 on page 91, "in keeping with these timeless words we urge support;" delete all of page 92 and lines 1 through 13 on page 93; and delete "continue to work" on line 14 of page 93. The motion was seconded.

Rev. Edgardo Rivera, Adventure Guide for the Washington Region, proposed an amendment to the amendment that would strike the word immoral from the title of the original proposal but would retain the rest of the language in the original resolution. The bishop pointed out that the amendment presently under consideration had altered the entire title. Rev. Riviera withdrew his amendment and spoke against the Foster amendment. A point of order was issued, asking that the resolution be read in its corrected form. Bishop Schol pointed out that would take quite a bit of time and assured the body they would know what was before us when time came for a vote. Rev. John Yost, pastor of St. Lukes UMC in Martinsburg, spoke in favor of the amendment. Rev. Jen Fenner, pastor of Epworth UMC in Gaithersburg, spoke against it. A Call for the Question followed, was seconded, and then passed. The Conference Secretary read the proposed amendment, asking those in attendance to follow along in their copies of the pre-conference booklet. When voted upon, the amendment did not pass.

The body then turned to the original resolution. Matt Monk, lay member from Wiseburg UMC, made a speech in support of the resolution. Matt Sickle, lay member from Wesley UMC in Hampstead, made a motion to amend the original proposal by deleting the word immoral from the title and changing it to read, "Opposing Immigration Laws in Maryland Similar to Arizona." After it was seconded, Mr. Sickle spoke in favor of his amendment. When the vote was cast, it was determined that the amendment had failed. A request for division of the house by Frank Robert did not pass. Another amendment was offered: to add two sentences to the existing resolution: (1) To encourage migrants to learn to speak, read and write English and (2) To encourage migrants to obey all local, state and federal laws. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Carol Levitt from Patapsco UMC put forward the following amendment: on line three, on page 92, to move the word immoral from before the word Arizona to after the word Arizona. In that way, the word immoral would modify the law [SB 1070] and not the state of Arizona. The motion was seconded and Ms. Levitt's amendment was passed by the body. The original resolution as amended was brought before the body and approved by vote of the conference.

The bishop then called the worship team forward. Rev. Carletta Allen spoke on behalf of the team. She said that it had been a privilege to serve during this session of annual conference. She shared some of the various ways throughout the conference that we have shown our being "Connected as One": the Communion bread provided by the Asian Ministries, the quilts being made during annual conference by the United Methodist Women, which will be shared at the UMW School of Mission, and the prayer shawls intended for the elected delegations to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. So many prayer shawls were made that those who were ordained, commissioned and had their

orders recognized also received a prayer shawl. Rev. Allen said that during the Service of Passage, the ordinands had brought a cord with them when they came to the altar. Those cords were knotted together to form a cincture for the bishop, a gift of connectedness from the ordinands. The bishop thanked the worship team.

The bishop called up the staff who has been working behind the scenes to make the conference run smoothly. They received a standing ovation and cheers from the body. Bishop Schol thanked them for their gifts and their dedication. He then turned to

Rev. T.R. Chattin, superintendent for the Frederick District, who announced that one appointment had been omitted when the appointments were read, that of Jason Shank as associate pastor to the Mt. Carmel/New Market/Christ Church Cooperative Parish in Frederick. Then the Conference Secretary made some announcements, including that Campus Ministries should be added to the list of Conference Advance Specials found on page 52 in the Conference Booklet.


Mark Miller led in the singing of “God Who Began a Good Work in You” and “God Be with You until We Meet Again.” Wearing the ordinands’ cincture, the bishop then asked the General and Jurisdictional Delegations to come forward. Conference Secretary

Mary Jo Sims read the following motion: *I move that the 227th annual session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference stand adjourned following commissioning of the delegates and alternates to General and Jurisdiction Conference and the closing prayer, and that all reports printed in the Pre-Conference Booklet or distributed in the Conference Packet, that are not otherwise acted on, be considered received by the Annual Conference, and that any unfinished business be referred to the appropriate Conference agency for consideration and action, and reported at the next session of the Annual Conference.*


Further, that the 228th annual session be convened at the call of the Presiding Bishop on May 30, 2012, at the Waterfront Marriott Hotel in Baltimore, Maryland. Further, that the Conference Discipleship Council, the Conference Connectional Table and the appropriate Boards, Commissions, Councils and Committees be instructed, authorized, and empowered to handle all appropriate business or emergencies between meetings of the Baltimore-Washington Conference according to the structure of the Conference, provided the requirements of the 2008 edition of The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church are not violated in any given situation.

The Conference body approved the motion. The bishop commended the Annual Conference: “Another great conference!” Then the bishop turned to the delegation on the platform and told the members that they were commissioned to go to be guided by the Holy Spirit, to go and listen for the Holy Spirit, to go with the heart and mind of the people of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, to help infuse the [General and Jurisdictional] Conferences with who we are and what we are about, to make sure that diversity of our conference comes through at the General and Jurisdictional Conferences and that the delegation work as a team to help influence the future of the church. Bishop Schol then offered a Prayer of Commissioning, asking that the delegates discern the Holy Spirit, that they go and be this conference, in its commitment to justice and mercy and to an evangelical spirit that transforms lives.

At the conclusion of the prayer, Mark Miller led in the singing of “Some Glad Morning.” Michael Parker led the closing prayer, thanking God for the day, for every good and perfect gift, the gift of the bishop and Cabinet, the laity and clergy. He gave thanks especially for the presence of the Holy Spirit among the conference. (Editorial note: Amen!)

Overview of Connectional Ministries (CC)

Moving Forward – Baltimore-Washington Conference Discipleship Area Ministries

Moving to our new Conference Mission Center offers an apt metaphor for the discipleship ministries of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

In August, we said goodbye to our former Conference Center in Columbia, and moved to a beautiful new facility, known as the BWC Mission Center. Centrally located in the Maple Lawn community, half way between the two beltways, the new Mission Center efficiently brings conference staff and resources together to equip spiritual leaders to transform the world.

Just as we changed locations, we also re-focused our energies in the discipleship area. Discipleship ministries are now grouped under four areas: Spiritual Leaders, Missions, Disciples and Congregations. Conference Discipleship Area boards and agencies each relate to one of these four teams. Each of these teams is also being served by a director, who is a member of the conference staff. Grouping our ministries in this way provides for mutual visioning, strategizing, goal setting and ongoing support. We are excited already to see how these teams are moving forward. Ministries and resources are being prepared and offered, which are helping us all take the next step in faithfully living into our call.

We also want you to know that in 2011, the Baltimore-Washington Conference will be engaging in a visioning process. Our current vision, mission and strategy outlined in the Strive for Five document takes us to 2012; our emerging vision will look forward from here and will be known as our 20 X 20 vision. This process will engage us in observing where we are and looking ahead together to where God is calling us. We anticipate various ways to participate in this process as it unfolds.

We give thanks for the pastors, laity and friends who are assisting in many large and small ways to further the Discipleship Ministries of our conference. We give thanks for the faith, fire and fruits that are evident in you and for your commitment and passion to serve God here in the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

GROW CONGREGATIONS

Overview of Grow Congregations (CC)

The Grow Congregations area includes ministries that seek to plant and grow new faith communities and to provide resources to help existing congregations grow and become revitalized. Groups related to the area include the Committee on Parish and Community Development and the Commission on the Small Membership Church. These ministries represent the Baltimore-Washington Conference's response to the critical adaptive challenge identified by the Call to Action issued by the

Council of Bishops.

- *To redirect the flow of attention, energy and resources to an intense concentration on fostering and sustaining an increase in the number of VITAL CONGREGATIONS effective in making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.*

In particular, the Grow Congregations Team sees its role as one of providing leadership for the effort to turn around the decline in worship attendance that the Rev. Lovett Weems calls our “worship recession.”

To achieve this goal, the focus of Grow Congregations has centered, and will continue to center, on two strategies:

Plant and grow new faith communities by implementing these multiplication strategies:

- Starting new congregations as conference strategic church plants;
- Helping vital congregations parent a new church;
- Helping vital congregations extend to additional sites for worship and ministry;
- Helping vital congregations restart ministry by taking over the building of a non-viable congregation and infusing it with a core group and the DNA of a vital Acts 2 congregation;
- Helping vital congregations start new worship services targeted at attracting new believers or those who have been turned off by the church.

Provide resourcing to grow and revitalize existing congregations by:

- Providing access to and training for Mission Insite;
- Providing technical consultation for local congregations;
- Sponsoring workshops and training for local church teams;
- Creating mentoring partnerships among congregations;
- Providing scholarships to events such as Exponential and Church of the Resurrection Leadership Institute;
- Offering consultations to help congregations overcome attendance barriers.

Actions/projects/programs sponsored by Grow Congregations over the past year include:

- Providing \$100,000 in grants to support a new church start in Harford County;
- Providing more than \$500,000 in multiple grants to local congregations to support ministry development throughout the conference;
- Providing more than \$78,000 in Equitable Compensation Grants;
- Providing scholarships for attendance at the School for Congregational Development, Exponential Conference, Church of the Resurrection Leadership Institute, and New Church Leader Institute;
- Joining with Path One, the Virginia Annual Conference and Wesley Theological Seminary to train the first group of Hispanic/Latino lay missionaries, who will be deployed to help new church starts;
- Working with regional teams to develop strategies for new church starts in Harford County, Baltimore City and Anne Arundel County;
- Contracting to purchase Mission Insite in order to make demographic data available to every congregation;
- Holding Mission Insite training for all regions in May;
- Sponsoring the Prodigal Worship event with focus on growing worship attendance and participation.

Plans for the coming year include:

- Hosting a New Church Leader Institute Nov. 15-17, at Glen Mar UMC in Ellicott City;
- Offering Grow Members training for teams of pastors and laity November 19-20 at the conference Mission Center;

- Continuing to provide training and support for local church utilization of Mission Insite;
- Designing online tools and podcasts to help congregations implement growth strategies;
- Providing training in multiplication strategies for teams of pastors and laity from seven to 10 congregations with high growth potential from each region.

- Support the BWC goal to plant two new churches a year.
- Develop partnerships with other churches, Christian organizations and networks with successful experience in planting, developing and revitalizing churches, faith communities and multi-site ministries.
- Promote our initiatives.
- Fund our initiatives.

2011 Objectives

- Develop a comprehensive strategy to help our conference start new worship gatherings and multi-site campuses, and plant new churches/faith communities. This strategy will focus on the following:
 - Identifying potential leaders, partners and locations;
 - Equipping those leaders and partners;
 - Launching new worship gatherings, multi-site campuses, and church plants/faith communities;
 - Evaluating and assessing those new starts/leaders/partners;
 - Multiplying those new starts that are healthy and vital.
- Purchase an annual contract with Mission Insite (a demographics software company) by Jan. 15, which will aid us in identifying potential locations for new worship gatherings, multi-site campuses, church plants and faith communities.
- Host training on the Mission Insite software.
- Continue offering scholarships to select conferences and workshops that focus on starting new worship services and multi-site campuses, and planting new churches and faith communities.
- Host the 2011 New Church Leadership Institute at the BWC Mission Center.
- Host Prodigal Worship in April.
- Offer church planter assessments in the spring.
- Develop new church growth incentives to be presented at the annual conference session.

- Promote giving to the Orchard Fund by further marketing it around the BWC, specifically at annual conference.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2010

- Transitioned from Matt Poole to Andy Lunt as the BWC staff leader for our committee.
- Identified five potential planters of new churches/faith communities.
- Funded more than \$11,000 worth of scholarships to help send 18 people (many of whom were our potential planters and partners) to pre-selected training events and conferences.
- Provided demographic software tools to the BWC through Percept.
- Built on our partnership with Path 1, our denomination's church planting consulting organization.
- Developed and marketed the Orchard Fund – a conference Advance Special that will help to raise money for starting new worship services and multi-site campuses, and planting new churches and faith communities.
- Developed proposed policy that would allow expenses incurred in starting new worship services and multi-site campuses, and planting new churches and faith communities to be exempt from the apportionment formula for the first two years. The proposal was forwarded to the Council on Finance and Administration for implementation.

GROW DISCIPLES

Overview of Discipleship Ministries (CC)

The Vision: Growing disciples for Jesus Christ.

The Mission: To engage, equip and empower people in their spiritual formation.

The Goal: To increase professions of faith by 1 percent each year.

The Strategy: To work with our expanded Grow Team, as well as related boards and agencies, to create learning opportunities and resources for transformation.

Accomplishments:

- Aligned staff and resources to increase the number of professions of faith and to grow disciples of Jesus Christ.
- Expanded the Grow Disciples team to include clergy and lay people who serve as Christian educators to provide insight and support as we develop a comprehensive strategy, resources and programs focused on call and commitment to Jesus Christ. We will partner with the Conference Board of Discipleship to accomplish these goals.
- At the Early Childhood Educators conference in August, 276 educators participated in relevant workshops and received CEUs to satisfy their training requirements. This event resulted from a partnership with Christian Educator's Fellowship and Early Childhood Educators Director's Roundtable.
- ROCK had more than 5,000 participants in 2010 who were engaged in transforming worship and engaging breakout sessions. The Sunday offering was close to \$30,000 for Haiti relief. The "After ROCK" video series, based on Stephen Gallaher's presentations, is offered for free on the conference website.
- CCYM meets monthly to plan activities like ROCK, produce video resources like the Green Church Immersion Series and After ROCK, and design regionally based leadership events for conference youth workers and youth.

- In 2010, 9,851 people (320 groups) visited West River, Manidokan and Harmison for retreat, renewal and transformation. Retreat and Camping Ministries partnered with the Hope for the City team and the Board of Child Care to host 52 children and youth for a week at camp. Some significant improvements were done on the facilities, including renovating West River's former dining hall to create meeting and office space. The West River Camp staff planned and hosted two Older Adult retreats with a total of 250 participants.
- Our campus ministers at American University, Frostburg University, Howard University and the University of Maryland led worship, retreats, Bible studies, leadership training, and service projects in their respective communities this year. Their activities focused on spiritual and vocational development. Rev. Kim Capps celebrated 20 years of service in campus ministry. (See the Board of Higher Education and Ministry report for more details.)
- Our Young Adult Council hosted 18 Korean young adults this summer for a two-week stay. Their annual retreat, held at West River Camp, had 50 participants. The Young Adult Council also published three issues of Shift Magazine, including an online Advent devotional guide. (See the Young Adult Council report for more details.)
- Other resources published by the Grow Disciples Team this year include the Adventure Devotional Guide (sold 6,577 copies), and three Immersion Series studies: Fully Alive (sold 290 copies), A Welcoming Life (sold 48 copies) and Green Church, which is available for free on the conference website.

The year 2010 has been one of transition for the Grow Team, but we have been blessed by gifted and committed leadership and participation of deeply passionate people who are filled with the Spirit and called to make disciples for Jesus Christ.

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (CC)

Purpose: The conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry interprets and promotes the United Methodist ministries in higher education that are specifically related to the Baltimore-Washington Conference. (Book of Discipline, para. 634)

Other General Responsibilities: The board oversees the management of the conference program of campus ministries at American University (AU), Frostburg State University, Howard University and the University of Maryland at College Park (UMCP). Members of the board work with local churches to increase awareness of United Methodist Student Day and to encourage annual conference and local church support for the BWC campus ministries. In accordance with guidelines from the Office of Loans and Scholarships at the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the chair meets with the conference-level Joint Scholarship Committee and, when funds permit, awards merit scholarships to students enrolled at United Methodist-related colleges who have been active members in BWC churches or campus ministries.

Role in the Discipleship Process: The campus ministers welcome students into the campus faith community, encourage their professions of faith, nurture them in Christian living and equip them to go out into the world as "disciple-making" disciples. Campus ministries are effective training venues for future clergy and lay leadership.

Specific Accomplishments:**Faith Celebrations**

Campus ministry sites provide diverse worship experiences at student-friendly times. Frostburg offers Wednesday evening worship at 9 p.m., after the last class of the day. UMCP students attend Sunday morning services at the University UMC, while students at Howard attend the ecumenical Sunday worship service coordinated by the Office of the Chapel. The chaplain at AU delivers sermon series that attract an average attendance of 43 students to Sunday night worship at the Kay Spiritual Life Center chapel. AU had its highest Sunday worship attendance of 66 people on Aug. 29, 2010, while attendance at its Thursday night healing service has an average of 18 worshippers.

Faithful Connections

Hundreds of students interact with campus ministers and ministry participants during orientation or welcome week. All campus ministries utilize traditional and contemporary forms of social networking to create authentic community whereby strangers become friends in Christ. The Frostburg campus has 102 students on Facebook, while the College Park ministry has increased its use of the Facebook Fan Page and added a Twitter account. Fellowship dinners continue to be effective magnets that draw at least 20 students to University Church in College Park and 40 at AU. One hundred students came out to the “stress free eating zone” hosted by UMCP during the spring semester exams. Meaningful relationships also developed during retreats held by each of the four ministries. Students at Howard traveled with their campus minister to the national Student Forum in Shenandoah, Va., and to Exploration in Dallas, Texas. The leadership development component of campus ministry also strengthens relationships. Fifteen AU students (or approximately one-third of the worship attendees) participate in the United Methodist Student Association, which holds a weekly leadership meeting. They, and their counterparts on the other campuses, develop deep camaraderie as they plan worship, Bible study and outreach programs.

Faith Development

Weekly Bible study is thriving at all campus ministry sites. The Frostburg chaplain hosts Sunday night Bible study as well as Huddle Bible Study for Christian athletes. The students are not simply searching for information; they have a hunger for engagement and a divine encounter. UMCP combines Bible study with dinner for undergrads or with lunch for grad students. Howard holds small group prayer meetings and varied devotional methods with Bible studies. The thematic approach to Bible study works well at AU where small group study is offered during the summer, as well as during the academic year. The AU chaplain has held membership classes and witnessed the fruit of his efforts as two students were baptized into membership in The United Methodist Church by profession of faith.

Faithful Service

At all four ministry sites students effectively combine Christian faith with Christian service, social justice and advocacy. Projects range from walks for the homeless, preparation of meals for shelters to mission trips to Louisiana and other states. Howard’s campus ministry traveled to the Dominican Republic under the leadership of members from Westminster UMC.

Faith Sharing

Students in campus ministry are challenged and equipped to share their faith informally and formally. Harmony’s Cross, the UMCP student singing group, visits churches proclaiming the Good News through song. UMCP has also formed intramural sports teams that increase visibility and reach students previously untouched by the campus ministry. Peer ministers, dorm deacons and other student ministry officers realize the importance of evangelism and genuine hospitality as they share their faith in ways that attract rather than alienate. In short, their actions reflect their theology and first-hand knowledge about the wideness of God’s grace and the depth of God’s love.

Plans for Continuing the Adventure: The board will support the Campus Ministry Strategic Plan and will encourage meaningful interaction with local churches as they seek to attract young adults to the discipleship journey. The board will also accelerate efforts to connect with and provide resources for higher education committees in local churches.

Committee on Retreat and Camping Ministries (CC)

Retreat and Camping Ministries experienced a year of ups and downs in 2010. In spite of strong participation and dedication of the 240 volunteer counselors and directors there was a 6 percent decrease in enrollment at the summer camps.

On the plus side, both Manidokan and West River hosted the third year of Camp Life, a summer camp program for children and youth from Baltimore City who have experienced violence in their communities. The staff of Retreat and Camping Ministries is extremely grateful to Tom Curcio, the Board of Child Care and the Baltimore Metropolitan District churches for their partnership and support in this endeavor. Camp Hope, a summer week-long experience for children who have a parent or family member in prison, was held for the fourth year under the leadership of the Rev. Tim Warner. Both Camp Life and Camp Hope have shown to be valuable and transformational experiences for the children and youth participating.

Manidokan hosted the first Encounter, an outdoor Christian music festival, during the summer. We hope to build on the experience of this first event so that it becomes a premier opportunity for youth in the Baltimore-Washington Conference to connect, share, celebrate and develop their faith.

Retreat usage continued to grow at all three sites: Harmison, West River and Manidokan. Manidokan had a startling 40 percent increase in income from retreats. Camp Harmison continues to partner with Camp Joy for two weeks each summer to provide much-needed home repair for the communities in West Virginia and the Western Maryland regions.

There was continued facility improvement at the sites to better meet the needs of the people and congregations of the Baltimore-Washington Conference. The much needed upgrades to the Meadow Pavilion kitchen and bathhouse at Camp Harmison were completed. At West River, more than 60 groups and individuals contributed funds and 20 volunteer work teams pitched in thousands of hours of labor for the renovation of the old dining hall into much needed meeting space, offices and a camp store and gift shop. On Oct. 10, the building was dedicated as the Rev. Thomas B. Ehlers Memorial Hall. Rev. Ehlers was a key leader in the acquisition and development of the West River site into a place where all persons can experience Christ.

I would like to take a moment of personal privilege to express my thanks to staff of Retreat and Camping Ministries who work so very hard to share Christian hospitality, plan the programs and prepare and maintain the facilities. Also, my appreciation goes out to the countless volunteers who serve as summer camp counselors and directors, help with maintenance and upkeep and prayerfully support this ministry. Their efforts undergird the effectiveness of this ministry and are a true blessing to me.

Council on Youth Ministries (CC)

Recognizing that youth are a vital part of the body of Christ, the Conference Council on Youth Ministries is committed to:

- Focusing on joyful Christian discipleship;
- Developing programs and events that promote Christian fellowship, growth and unity;
- Encouraging and empowering youth leaders;
- Being both a forum and an advocate for youth of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

It is our prayer that God will continue to use CCYM to focus our youth ministries on the transforming power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, that we will be emboldened by the Holy Spirit to be agents for renewal in our church, and that we will continue to grow in Christian servanthood.

God continues to bless the CCYM. We gather together monthly from every corner of the conference to worship, share, plan and have fellowship. It is not unusual for more than 75 United Methodists, young and “not so young,” from city, suburban and town and country churches – many coming from more than two hours away – to be part of what has become an exciting, energetic, productive, disciple-making body.

The cornerstone event of CCYM is the ROCK Retreat held each January in Ocean City. The team that organizes and puts on ROCK is student-led. It is a joy each year to work with new young leadership. In addition, we have a strong and committed group of adults who are in leadership and provide mentoring, as well as chaperoning, for these young disciples.

While concert attendance nationwide dropped 40 percent this year, we are blessed to have once again not only filled the large hall on the first floor of the Ocean City Convention Center, but also to have more than 900 in “overflow,” in what we call our “Upper Room.”

Each year we strive to make the Upper Room more and more the “complete experience” that is felt downstairs. This year, for the first time, one of the Main Stage presentations by Bishop Violet Fisher was held in the Upper Room, as well as having “live” emcees, bands, drama and Communion.

CCYM plans all year for ROCK and, as a result, the youth are growing in leadership skills, fellowship and discipleship. It is a joy to watch. Another important youth ministry is CCYM News, the award-winning media ministry.

New Resources –

“LIFE AFTER ROCK” video series for local churches

This year we created a four-part video youth ministry resource series. Each video is available online for free at the conference website, www.bwcmc.org. We also will have each video available on DVD for \$10, (To purchase, contact Pam Bowen at pbowen@bwcmc.org.) The purpose of this video series is to give local churches a resource to use to deepen the experience they had at the ROCK retreat and to strengthen the connections and commitments made that weekend. It has been a powerful experience for me to relive that weekend as part of the

preparation of this resource. We've gotten some wonderful feedback on this project and have heard it has blessed youth groups that have used it.

CCYM developed this new resource with the ROCK 2010 speaker, the Rev. Stephen Gallaher, who is an Elder in the Central Pennsylvania Conference and has been doing special work in youth ministry for more than a decade, including working with Wesley Seminary and Messiah College to strengthen their youth ministry offerings, as well as leading "Salt N Light Ministries."

Each of the four resources actually includes three distinct video portions – one is a Main Stage session with Stephen Gallaher at ROCK 2010; one is a resource for youth workers to prepare them for using the youth portion and also to strengthen them in their understanding; and one is a video specifically for youth. In addition to the three videos, each of the four sessions also includes downloadable instructions for the youth group leader to assist them in using the resource.

Regional training and rallies

We are working together with district youth leadership, local churches, Messiah College and Salt N Light Ministries to provide a unique one-day experience for youth and youth leaders in the summer of 2011. This one-day event will include afternoon sessions with training for youth leaders (both beginning and veterans) and an evening session of worship including music, drama, dance, video and a message from Stephen Gallaher.

We are grateful for the blessings God has bestowed upon us and look forward with enthusiasm to all that lies ahead. Thanks be to God!

Young Adult Council (CC)

The Young Adult Council has been meeting monthly and working hard to revitalize young adult ministry in the conference. In 2010, we worked on building connections by offering quarterly training and fellowship gatherings at the Conference Center. More than 75 young adults participated throughout the year as we worshipped, studied and ate together. We also continued to build our relationship with the Korea Annual Conference by hosting a team of young adults from Korea. These young adults were hosted by churches throughout the annual conference and participated in a retreat with young adult leadership from our council. In 2010, we also hosted a retreat at West River Camping and Retreat Center with more than 50 young adults participating. It was a time of rest and renewal as we focused on the way God sets our feet upon the rock, drawing us out of the mud.

The Young Adult Council also published three Shift: Re-Imaging Young Adult Community magazines. The first edition was published for the 2010 Annual Conference and focused on the topic of "Creating Sacred Spaces." September's Shift Magazine discussed "Breaking Barriers," and December's focused on the topic of "Sharing Your Story." We also produced an "online-extra" Advent devotional, written by young adults from our conference called "Shift: One Night in Bethlehem." Print copies were mailed to every church in our conference, and downloadable PDF files can be found on the website: www.bwcumc.org/shift. Subscription information can also be found on the Shift website.

In 2011, the Young Adult Council seeks to live out our calling to make disciples by following this simple process: love God, love others and love the world. This statement embodies our method for living out the five aspects of the Discipleship Adventure within the Young Adult Council. We will

celebrate, connect, develop, serve and share by loving God, others and the world. This statement also reminds us how disciples are made; our love for God leads to love of each other; our love in community flows into our love for the world.

The Young Adult Council has set goals for 2011 based on this process:

Love God: We believe creating relevant worship experiences for young adults to celebrate and connect with God is critical in bringing effective young adult ministry to our conference. To that end, we plan to:

1. Provide one retreat-style worship and spiritual formation opportunity in 2011 and plan a conference-style worship and spiritual formation opportunity event for 2012.
2. Produce and publish Shift Magazine, a quarterly, printed training resource for local churches with practical ideas for young adult ministry, specifically focusing on developing young adult-friendly worship services.

Love Others: We affirm that spiritual formation happens not in a vacuum but in the context of healthy community. In order to address some of the challenges of creating these groups for young adults to connect with each other and develop their faith we will:

3. Develop and utilize an online networking tool for young adults to connect regionally in small groups.
4. Provide quarterly small-group curriculum designed specifically for young adults in our conference found in the Shift Magazine.

Love the World: We recognize that we are called to take our faith out into the world. In order to empower young adults to share their faith and serve the world we plan to:

5. Gather quarterly as young adults in worship, training and service to the world.
6. Provide one annual conference level cross-cultural/mission experience.

To achieve these goals, the Young Adult Council will be meeting quarterly, every other month, at the conference Mission Center with all people interested in young adult ministry. GROW MISSIONS

Overview of Mission Ministries (CC)

Mission is that extraordinary focus of the church in which the world can see God's love in action as we serve as Christ's hands, voice and heart in our communities and across the globe. In the mission arena, the Wesleyan focus of uniting the holy with social action comes to life in interesting and meaningful ways as disciples work to transform the world.

This year a reorganization of our structure brought many of the mission efforts of the Baltimore-Washington together in new ways and revitalized the work of several conference committees. As we grow together, our on-going vision is to equip local church leaders so that they can enable at least 95 percent of those in their congregations to serve in mission and justice ministries.

The spectrum of our work spans from A to Z – literally – from Annapolis to Zimbabwe, making an impact in every part of our lives, our culture and beyond. Among the highlights this year:

- United Methodists responded with amazing generosity to assist victims of an earthquake in Haiti.
- The conference sent out at least 140 Volunteer in Mission teams as short-term missionaries, putting “love into action.” This was a 17 percent increase over 2009.
- People of faith spoke out for social justice in local, state and federal arenas, addressing such issues as gun violence, gambling, human trafficking, energy, tax reform, immigration, the death penalty and health care reform.
- United Methodist Community Services, a conference Advance Special, launched an online human services directory to serve the poor and marginalized in this region.
- We explored ways to deepen our partnerships with United Methodists in the Central Black Soil District in Russia, in Zimbabwe, and with young adults in South Korea.
- Parish nurses helped create new health ministries in several local churches.
- The Commission on Disability Ministries provided a number of resources for churches, seeking to be inclusive and remove the boundaries that limit participation of people in the church.
- The Committee on Native American Ministry provided reading materials to inmates in area prisons and reached out to Native American students at American University.
- United Methodists in Strengthening the Black Church for the 21st Century, the Young Adult Council, Baltimore-Washington Area Reconciling Ministries (B-WARM) and other groups joined to co-sponsor several workshops on inclusion, titled “Bridges to Wholeness.”

As the church makes disciples, we are mindful that our faith calls us not only to promote personal growth, but also equips and mobilizes us for mission and service to the world. Mission is our response to the gift of God's grace. We serve by Christ's example and in the name of Jesus. The Grow Missions Team invites all United Methodists to explore and discover where God is calling them to serve. The conference website (www.bwcumc.org) provides a rich resource of ministry opportunities. During the year ahead, we'll be sponsoring a day of service that brings together all people across the conference for a time of mission. It is our prayer that together we will enable one another to serve as Christ did – with humility, power and great joy.

Advocacy Report (CC)

Advocacy gives the local church opportunities to raise its collective voice to seek justice for everyone. Goals for the year included outreach to engage local churches and participation in a variety of social justice issues based on United Methodist Social Principles. In an effort to build a stronger advocacy network, I, as advocacy consultant, worked with Church and Society members to reach out and connect with United Methodists who want to engage in advocacy ministry. We made phone calls, wrote e-mails, visited churches and offered advocacy training. The work has been paying off as our Baltimore-Washington Conference Advocacy Team continues to grow.

Advocacy training in the Baltimore Region and the Western Region allowed church members to review the Advocacy Toolkit and to learn how to effectively engage in legislative advocacy through letters, phone calls and visits with decision-makers. Resources were also provided to help participants build a social justice group within their congregations.

As new advocates became engaged, the 2010 Maryland General Assembly Session offered opportunities to get involved. The Maryland Interfaith Legislative Committee agenda supported legislation that focused on energy, housing, children and income support. On behalf of our conference, I submitted testimony for the Unemployment Insurance Modernization and Tax Relief Act to support those who are unemployed. This passed and became law. I also submitted testimony to support preserving legal services for poor people. This bill also passed. In the area of housing, we joined other faith groups to support an effort to eliminate discrimination based on the source of income. Because this bill was defeated, we will be renewing efforts to get similar legislation passed during the next session.

United Methodists also spoke out to support and oppose other bills. Bishop John Schol and the Rev. Douglas Sands testified during a Senate hearing for the SB 645 Firearm Safety Act of 2010. This bill was defeated in the House Judiciary Committee. Due to a growing awareness and concern for victims of human trafficking, John Coleman spoke for United Methodists when he testified in support of legislation that would require posting information about the National Human Trafficking Resource Center in key locations. This bill was amended and did pass. The Rev. Byron Brought testified in support of legislation that would prohibit slot facilities from being located within 1,000 feet of a church, community center, playground, school or shopping center. This bill did not pass the committee vote. However, efforts to expand gambling were defeated. United Methodists also joined other faith groups to oppose efforts to re-expand the use of the death penalty. All efforts to expand the use of the death penalty were defeated in committees.

This past year, United Methodists not only showed support for social justice through their voices, but also through their presence. On March 21, United Methodists throughout the conference joined advocates in Washington, D.C., to rally for immigration reform. Ten days later, United Methodists gathered with other faith groups in Annapolis to celebrate the new federal health care reform.

Our work for social justice is ongoing. As we consider future opportunities for advocates to become active, we anticipate showing support for our prison ministry by advocating for “banning the box” in Washington, D.C. The Returning Citizen Public Employment Inclusion Act of 2010 bill would make it illegal for a government employer to ask about an applicant’s criminal record until after it has extended an offer of employment and can rescind the job offer only if the criminal record is necessarily related to the duties of the position.

In Baltimore, local churches have the opportunity to participate in advocating for preventing gun violence. We are asking gun shop owners to adopt a code of conduct in an effort to reduce straw

purchasing.

New legislation being drafted in Annapolis will provide additional opportunities for involvement. We will again speak out for justice on behalf of those who are poor, those who are vulnerable and those who are hurting.

It is a blessing to serve with advocates in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. Thanks to all who have made a phone call, written a letter, stood at a rally or spoken to a decision-maker in an effort to advocate for social justice for all. A special thanks to Sandra Ferguson and Sharon Leatherman for their ongoing support and guidance.

Board of Church and Society (CC)

The vision of the Baltimore-Washington Conference Board of Church and Society is “that all conference local congregations be connected with the community in which they serve and are involved in pro-active Discipleship Adventures through justice ministries and advocacy for the transformation of the world.”

The board’s mission is “to equip and support local congregations to be involved in pro-active justice ministries through education and advocacy.”

Our goals for 2010-2011 program year are:

To provide information and resources on justice ministries for local churches by:

- Maintaining the Church and Society webpage with relevant information and links to resources for justice ministries,
- Building small coalitions around justice issues,
- Maintaining a list of resource persons trained in specific justice ministries, and
- Encouraging the use of the Social Principles for small group study and for sermons.

To maintain partnerships with interfaith, ecumenical and secular groups addressing similar issues by:

- Supporting the position of conference advocate,
- Working with other faith and secular groups on our priority issues for education and advocacy,
- Participating in activities and programs of the General Board of Church and Society.

Since the last report to Annual Conference the board has:

- Built a broad coalition around the “Bridges To Wholeness” forums. Three of the four forums have been held with great success. The forums addressed the issue of exclusion-inclusion in the areas of gender, race and sexuality, worship and young adults. The fourth forum on the global church is tentatively set for Saturday, March 11, 2011. Coalition members represent BWC Board of Church & Society, Ethnic Local Church, Black Methodist for Church Renewal, Baltimore-Washington Reconciling Ministries, and Young Adults.
- The conference advocacy consultant and members of the Board of Church and Society are building a network of advocates around several justice issues. (See the Advocacy report.)
- Meetings continue with the leadership of the Maryland Initiative on Health Care For All.
- Working with the General Board of Church and Society and the Hispanic Ministry Team, the board is building a coalition of churches interested in or engaged in ministry with immigrants.
- Prison Ministry is moving forward under the leadership of the Revs. Sonja King and Brian

Jackson.

- Relationships with the Maryland Interfaith Legislative Committee, the Appalachian Ministries Network, and the Quality of Life Retreats continue to address justice issues like poverty, environmental concerns, human trafficking, domestic violence, HIV/AIDS, immigration and homelessness.
- In cooperation with the Communication Department, the issue of immigration was featured in the December 2010 issue of the UMConnection.
- The Church and Society webpage is being reformatted and will provide resources for local churches to engage in education and action around justice ministries. Ministries that will be accessible (linked) from the page are: Advocacy, Peace with Justice, Prison Ministry, HIV-AIDS, General Board of Church & Society, Health Care, Drugs and Violence, and other agencies with whom the Board of Church and Society cooperates on justice ministries.
- Worked closely with the Peace with Justice Coordinator to develop greater support for the Special Sunday offering, engagement of local churches in peace and justice ministries, and development of an informative webpage.
- Provided speakers for local churches' educational forums on justice ministries.

The board wishes to express appreciation to leaders who have assisted in forums this year: Rev. Gilbert H. Caldwell and Rev. Lillie Mae Henley who led the forum on race, gender and sexuality; Rev. Erin Hawkins, General Commission on Race and Religion, who led the worship workshop/forum; panelists for the young adult forum, Joanna Choi, Orlett Haskett, Michael Parker and moderator Darius Butler; Rev. Rodney Watson and his sons, and Rev. Dred Scott and musicians for providing dynamic music at the forums.

We are especially grateful for the staff who have provided support to the Board: Rev. T. R. Chattin, Rev. Karin Walker, Sandy Ferguson and Oliva Gross.

Recommendations:

- That all churches of the conference celebrate Peace with Justice Sunday through participation in the offering, study and action.
- That laity and clergy identify ways that the local church might engage in study and action around justice ministries within their communities.
- That laity and clergy engage in advocacy on policy issues at all levels of government – municipal, county, state and national.
- That local churches study the Council of Bishop's letter "God's Renewed Creation, Call to Hope and Action."

Commission on Disability Ministries (CC)

The Commission on Disability Ministries for the Baltimore-Washington Conference plans to hold its organizing meeting in early 2011. After that meeting, we plan to conduct much of our business by conference call since transportation to a central location in the conference is not always accessible to its members.

As a result of conversations with conference staff person Sandy Ferguson, the commission has developed the following tentative agenda:

- We plan to make our contribution to the Conference Grow Mission Team's goal of providing resources for local church ministry.
- We will put information on the conference website that may be helpful to all who might be encouraged to widen their welcome to people with disabilities that are physical, cognitive, or mental-illness related.
- We also hope to provide materials to help churches understand the attitudinal barriers and stigma that their churches may project to people with all sorts of disabilities that are hindrances to their full inclusion in the life of the church.

The commission also plans to make contact with the State of Maryland to help local churches direct employed people with disabilities to adequate health insurance coverage and other services to which they are entitled.

The commission will have representation to a national group of United Methodists with disabilities who are making plans for revising current legislation in the Book of Discipline and creating new legislation to propose to the 2012 General Conference which will strengthen the church's ministry with people with disabilities.

We plan to place worship resources on the conference website to assist local churches in planning an annual service that celebrates the gifts of people with disabilities in the life of the church and

challenges worshippers to do all that is possible to welcome such people into the full life of the church. Resources about conducting an accessibility audit for new and existing church buildings and parsonages will also be found on the website. As new resources, conferences, theological and biblical studies that could inform this topic become available, our section of the conference website will so inform local churches.

- Continued presence, advocacy, and outreach programs in Beltsville, Frederick, West Virginia, Baltimore and Oxon Hill;
- The completion of a Ministerial Action Plan (strategic plan) in each of the current H/L ministries;
- The pilot program from PATH 1 that graduated a class of 15 lay people from our conference to aid in planting new congregations;
- The union into one congregation of Camino de Vida and Epworth in Gaithersburg. We are grateful to the leadership of both congregations for making this a reality;
- The work and collaboration that continues to take place at Hughes / El Buen Samaritano in Wheaton;
- The appointment of Braulio Torres as an associate pastor at Millian UMC and the great outreach ministry that is taking place in the surrounding community; and
- The support received from the annual conference staff.

We want to thank all of those who have supported this ministry and look forward to the continuing opportunities that God is placing before all of us this coming year.

Committee on Native American Ministry (CC)

The Committee on Native American Ministry (CONAM) continued our mission to make disciples for Jesus Christ by supporting Native American ministry and outreach; promoting awareness of these ministries and of the Native American community residing within the bounds of our annual conference; and developing leadership among the Native community and among those giving leadership to Native American ministry.

Our CONAM is very active in the Northeast Jurisdictional Native American Task Force (NEJNATF). One of the purposes of the task force is to help establish and maintain CONAMs in all of the conferences in the Northeast Jurisdiction. In 2010 three members of Baltimore-Washington CONAM traveled to Vineland, N.J., to attend the 2010 annual meeting of NEJNAMTF. As in the past meetings, it was a chance to learn from other CONAMs in the jurisdiction how to better carry on the Lord's work in each of our conferences and the jurisdiction. The highlights of the event were a dinner with the Nanticoke/Lenape community: Susan Haejo gave a report on the mascot problem; Mary Phillips reported on GCORR and the jurisdiction, and Bishop Felton May and Mrs. May shared in this experience.

There are two outreach ministries that we support. The first is a prison ministry in which we send subscriptions of "Indian Life Ministries," a Native American Christian newspaper, to four prisons in Maryland, three that house males and one that houses females. The second major outreach ministry is the continued support of the WINS program, which is sponsored by American University in Washington, D.C. The program offers classes and internships for qualified Native students during the fall, spring and summer sessions. CONAM provides support during orientation for each session by attending them and welcoming the students to the area, presenting them with an appropriate book, and serving as their mentors and contacts away from home. For the summer of 2010, we had the honor to sponsor one of the students, Lori Carpenter (Pit River). We also had representatives at their Pow Wow, special luncheons and dinners and other activities. CONAM also provides an emergency fund for students who may have to return home for a while or who need money while in the D.C. area.

One of our goals for the 2011 year is to have at least one contact person from every church in our conference to receive the ongoing information about the Native Americans in our conference. We will continue to voice concerns and to support the Native American community within the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

CONAM is small but hardworking and would welcome anyone who would wish to join a mission-driven committee. With the help of our new extended Cabinet representative, Sandra Ferguson, we hope to do even more in 2011.

We give thanks to the Great Spirit for all the opportunities we have been given and eagerly anticipate building on what we do. Please continue to support the Native American Ministries Sunday Offering, half of which supports the ministry that we do in the Master's

name.

Communities of Shalom (CC)

Communities of Shalom (or Shalom Zones) are faith-based empowerment zones encompassing a certain geographic area ranging from four-square city blocks, to a neighborhood of one-square mile, or an entire rural community where *shalom* work is active. This is a grassroots, faith-inspired community development network in the United States and Africa.

- Initiated by the General Conference of The United Methodist Church in Los Angeles in 1992, it quickly spread to other cities and areas, to form other Shalom Zones. Local congregations and community groups work together with representatives of all faith traditions and community organizations to create economically and ecologically sustainable communities of peace, justice, hope, healing and wholeness in which all God's people experience shalom.
- Shalom Zones are coordinated and equipped by Drew University Theological School in partnership with the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference has a goal – as part of the Hope for the City 10-point plan – to create three new Shalom Zones in the Baltimore area each year beginning in 2008. In 2010, the three Shalom Zones that were trained and commissioned were from Martin Luther King, Jr. Memorial UMC; St. Matthews (Baltimore) UMC; and New Life UMC. These churches join Shalom Zones in Baltimore from St. James, New Covenant, Mt. Zion, Mt. Winans, Christ, Ames Memorial, Unity and Christ Church of the Deaf, in addition to Emory Beacon of Light in Washington, D.C. and Westminster Community of Shalom in Westminster.

A variety of community-focused ministries are carried out by these Shalom Zones including: developing youth leadership, furthering community health, advocating for decent housing, holding after-school programs and summer enrichment programs, providing disaster relief training, and converting a defunct community elementary school into a multi-use center in one of the city's most needy areas.

Shalom Zones' six-point approach to community transformation can easily be remembered by the letters of SHALOM:

- S** = systemic and sustainable change
H = healing, health, harmony and wholeness
A = asset-based community development
L = love for God, self and neighbor
O = organizing for direct action
M = multicultural, multi-faith collaboration

Committee on Deaf Ministries (CC)

The Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church provides an outreach – unique throughout United Methodism – to the Deaf, Deaf-Blind, and hearing impaired communities. There are four facets to this ministry.

Christ UMC of the Deaf in Baltimore was organized in 1895 and has several emphases. Christ UMC of the Deaf provides culturally appropriate, indigenous worship. It builds community through weekly fellowship lunches after worship as well as numerous all-church parties. Christ UMC of the Deaf also seeks to strengthen the connectional church with trips by the Sign Choir to other churches, and joint worship services with other United Methodist churches and ecumenical groups. The church empowers its membership to become servant ministers and works to remain an Acts 2 congregation. Evidence of this can be seen in the welcoming of two new members by profession of faith, one baptism, worship attendance of 110, fully paid apportionments and an emphasis on the membership serving others in mission.

Christ UMC of the Deaf has an extensive outreach ministry to Maryland School of the Deaf, Foxwell Apartments and Springfield Hospital. It further participates with affiliated ministries such as the Baltimore Area Deaf Blind (BADB), the Deaf Youth Camp, ROCK, Deaf Blind Camp and the Deaf Walk to Emmaus. The church also serves the community through opening its doors for Chinese classes, mentoring Sign Language students, and welcoming community parties and events.

Magothy UMC of the Deaf was established to serve the Pasadena area of Maryland. Magothy UMC's work toward being an Acts 2 congregation is evidenced in two new members by profession of faith, a baptism and continued participation in worship, as well as fully paid apportionments. The church continues to plan and implement mission work outside the walls of the church to grow the congregation.

The Deaf Shalom Zone in Baltimore ministers to the needs of the Deaf, Deaf-Blind and hearing-impaired communities by providing a food pantry, advocacy services (ADA rights, consumer skills) and other social services. The Deaf Shalom Zone also hosts Volunteer in Mission groups that wish to serve the Deaf community.

Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C., is a ministry within the walls of the only liberal arts university in the world for the Deaf. Regular Bible study, with up to 10 attendees, is the mainstay of this program. Various outings throughout the year are also part of this ministry.

Deaf Ministries has several opportunities for growth in the coming years, including exploring the opportunities for the creation of a Deaf worship service in the Silver Spring area and hosting an immersion experience for seminary students.

Disaster Response Committee (CC)

The Mission of an Early Response Team (ERT) is to provide a caring, Christian presence in the aftermath of a disaster.

This team is neither a first-response group of emergency workers, nor a recovery, rebuild or repair team; rather it fills a specific need in the early days after a disaster to establish the presence of The United Methodist Church. While there are specific tasks assigned to the early response teams, no task is more important than the people it serves.

Early Response Teams were first created by The United Methodist Church in the mid-1990s. It began, as it remains today, as a cooperative effort between the United Methodist Committee on Relief and the United Methodist Volunteers in Mission. In early 2007, a covenant was formed between these two groups and a new protocol was established.

It is important to understand that Early Response Teams are trained primarily to respond within their own communities. Your team does not need an invitation to respond in your own community. Your team may be asked to respond to another district, conference, or jurisdiction. This requires an invitation by the affected community.

This year, the Disaster Response Committee was able to establish regional coordinators for each of the four regions in the conference. They are listed below with their contact information.

A conference Disaster Plan was created and is now in place.

There were four new instructors added, which gives the Conference Disaster Team seven early response instructors for the four regions.

There were eight training classes conducted this past year. From these classes, there were 80 new people added to the list of trained Early Response Team members. That now gives our conference a total of 139 trained and certified ERT members.

At the request of the Tennessee Conference of The United Methodist Church, we sent our first Early Response Team there to help out with flooding.

As conference coordinator, I attended meetings with Maryland Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters (MDVOAD), and the United Methodist Men's executive committee to encourage them to promote this mission opportunity to United Methodist Men throughout the conference. Many churches were visited to give insights on what the Disaster Response Team in the conference is doing to prepare for a disaster in our own conference.

This coming year, the plan for the Disaster Response Team is:

- To continue to grow our numbers of trained Early Response Team members;
- Be able to respond to a disaster when called upon to do so in our conference or in another conference at their invitation;
- To begin planning to equip four trailers for the Disaster Response team to use in a disaster;

- To train four more trainers to assist our current trainers; and finally,
- To always be of a Christian presence.

Parish Nurse Ministries (CC)

In the Wesleyan tradition, which uplifts health and wholeness for all, the General Board of Global Ministries asks each conference to identify churches that have a parish nurse/health ministry program and to compile a directory of people serving as parish nurses/health ministers in our United Methodist churches. Parish nursing, also known as Faith Community Nursing, is defined by the American Nurses Association in “Faith Community Nursing: Scope and Standards of Practice,” as “the specialized practice of professional nursing that focuses on the intentional care of the spirit as part of the process of promoting wholistic health and preventing or minimizing illness in a faith community.”

A committee of parish nurses is working with Sandra Ferguson, conference social justice and missions director, to identify the faith community nurses or health ministers serving in churches within the conference. Each church in the conference was sent the questionnaire (Contact Information for Parish Nurse/Health Minister) requesting the name and contact information for the parish nurse or health minister. This form also asked if a church is interested in setting up a health ministry program. Approximately 50 completed forms have been returned to us.

We were invited to exhibit an information table about parish nursing at the 2009 and 2010 annual conference sessions. Members of our committee staffed the exhibit to answer questions, and later, follow-up phone contacts were made to those indicating interest in learning more about parish nurse ministry.

The committee is working closely with the conference webmaster, Lesley Carter, to improve the page layout and user friendliness of the parish nurse webpage. Communications is consulting with us too on establishing a database to organize a directory of persons who responded to the Contact Information questionnaire and are involved in parish nursing/health ministry. Russia Covenant Partnership (CC)

The year 2011 sees the Baltimore-Washington Conference entering into the fourth year of our covenant partnership with Russia; specifically, the Central Black Soil District (BSD), one of the two districts in the South Russia Provisional Annual Conference. This partnership, begun with relationships between laity and clergy here and fellow believers in Russia, dates back to the early 1990s. It was formalized with an agreement signed by Bishops Schol and Växby (Moscow Area) at St. Simon’s Island in 2008.

The Black Soil District is a geographically large district, about the size of Texas (or France). Though it has but a small number of churches (about 17), this district is often called the “nursery of pastors,” since it has produced so many leaders for the Russian conferences. Three of the churches are in the

main urban center, Voronezh. There are also some exciting new outreach ministries emerging from existing congregations, as they plant new Bible studies, which become fellowship groups and some, eventually, new congregations.

We are in ministry together with the Black Soil District in several ways. Currently, several congregations in the Baltimore-Washington Conference have partnerships with local churches. We are always looking to expand this church-to-church, shared ministry. There are congregations in the Black Soil District that would be open to, and very much desire, to be linked to a “sister” church here in our conference. We also support the work of the Russia United Methodist Church’s camp facility, “Kristall” (Crystal) near Voronezh – the only church camp facility for the Russian United Methodist Church and one used ecumenically. Another critical ministry is the outreach to youth and young adults through an annual event called “Camp Anthill.” This year, the Rev. Rod Miller, director of connectional ministries for the Baltimore- Washington Conference, participated at Anthill, and we look forward to bringing some of the organizers of that ministry to our area in the winter to experience ROCK and share their insights about ministry with young people with local churches here. We also maintain strong ties with the United Methodist Theological Seminary in Moscow.

Teams go to Russia for ministry almost every year from our conference – either UMVIM teams or smaller groups which help to build the relationships that form the bond in Christ between us and our United Methodist brothers and sisters in Russia. This past year, a multi-church team visited Moscow, Voronezh, Camp Kristall, and a partner church at Orel in southwestern Russia. In the coming year, we anticipate at least two groups going to Russia. The first will be a “familiarization” trip for pastors and church leaders, visiting Moscow, St. Petersburg, Voronezh, and other church communities and ministry sites in the Central Black Soil District. This is scheduled for July, working in partnership with the Russia Initiative Ministry of the Virginia Annual Conference. The other is to be a mission team visiting Camp Kristall (to work with a disability camp, and possibly to do repair and refurbishing work) and to visit with partner churches, including one in St. Petersburg. This team will travel in August.

Joint meetings are held using Skype between stewards of the Russia covenant in our conference and our counterparts in Russia, approximately every month to six weeks. We have found these to be a great way of continuing the conversation and building the relationship. This has been all the more so since the Russian conferences have adopted a “Road Map” to take greater ownership of the future of their ministry, and we have been discussing ways in which we as a conference, and as individual congregations, can be in support of their ministry.

Our conference, through its churches and contacts, also maintains strong ties with the Russia Initiative of The United Methodist Church, one of the strategic initiatives of our General Board of Global Ministries. In April of 2011, there will be a Russia Initiative Consultation – a conference for churches and leaders involved in, or interested in, the work in Eurasia (Russia, Ukraine, Moldova, etc.). It will be held in Oklahoma City. Later in the year, a mini-consultation has been proposed for our area, and will likely be held within the bounds of our conference.

There are several churches currently exploring getting involved in ministry with Russia. There are many ways to do so. For more information, to have a speaker come and share with your congregation, or to learn about the familiarization, mission trips, or other aspects of this ministry, feel free to contact Olivia Gross (ogross@bwcmc.org), the Rev. We also hold periodic meetings to discuss our relationship and strategy going forward in ministry together, which you are welcome to attend. Contact us for more information.

Strengthening the Black Church for the 21st Century (CC)

We continue to be in partnership with BMCR and Young Adult Ministries. Once again, we co-sponsored a forum “Begging for R. E. A. L. Church” to challenge our young adults and to empower them to be in the ministry of Jesus Christ.

We have not forgotten our ministry to the poor; Emory UMC and many of the other churches in the area have sent health kits and monetary donations to Haiti. Our year has been successful and we are relying on the Lord, because we have heard the Lord clearly say, “I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?”

United Methodist Community Services (CC)

The goals of the United Methodist Community Services are to:

- Establish a conferencewide program that, on behalf of people living in poverty, provides information about outreach ministry resources being offered by United Methodist Churches, interdenominational and community organizations, non-profit and government agencies by means of an online Human Services Directory. Information is also provided through the UMCS Communications and Referral Center.
- Locate UMCS Service Centers throughout the conference where services, (e.g. food, clothing, temporary housing, counseling and reliable referral information) can be made available.

- UMCS encourages partnerships in which one or more churches covenant to engage in a supportive relationship with a Service Center or another church, performing significant assistance ministries.
- Provide financial resources in support of Service Centers and local churches engaged in outreach ministries by securing grants and conducting fund-raising activities.
- Create district/regional UMCS leadership teams.
- Conduct UMCS assistance ministries training workshops.

New Online UMCS Human Services Directory

The new UMCS Human Services Directory is a useful guide for pastors and others when there is a need to recommend health and human resources to persons in need. Searchers can locate resources according to zip code, city, county or state. Users may locate the Human Services Directory by going to the conference website at “www.bwcumc.org,” then, under the “Ministries,” dropdown menu, clicking on “United Methodist Community Services.”

The site provides links to a comprehensive number of available human resources in West Virginia, Washington, D.C., and Maryland. In addition to providing other resource information, the Search section includes information about outreach ministries being offered by 90 local United Methodist churches. We invite every church engaged in one or more outreach ministries to share details of their services by entering descriptive data in the Directory. You will have the option of making these services known to the public or, if you prefer, only to other local churches. The UMCS Centers

The Communications and Referral Center makes referrals to people seeking assistance, contacts local churches and agencies to acquire and update outreach ministries information and conducts necessary UMCS administrative work.

The UMCS Service Centers provide pantry foods, hot meals, clothing, limited funding for temporary housing, prescriptions, and transportation and referral information. UMCS provides financial support to each Service Center on a quarterly basis, supporting the outreach ministries. Volunteers at the centers witness to their Christian faith. Recipients of assistance are invited to join in worship and other fellowship gatherings in the church.

Psalm 139 is a personal favorite of mine. As I complete my first year as president of the Baltimore-Washington Conference United Methodist Men, this prayer serves to remind me how important it is to equip district and local UMM leadership to “enable men’s spiritual growth to maturity as disciples of Christ.” God has called us to serve and commit to the spiritual growth of every man of all the churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. Our journey will not be short, nor will it be easy. Challenges to men’s ministry are abundant but as Psalm 139 says, “You hem me in, behind, and before, and lay your hand upon me.”

I will lead the blind by ways they have not known; along unfamiliar paths I will guide them. I will turn the darkness into light before them and make the rough places smooth. These are the things I will do; I will not forsake them. Isaiah 42:16

Jesus commissioned his disciples to reach the world with his message. Then, as only Jesus could, he gave them the power needed to succeed. He promised them the Holy Spirit, who would work through them to achieve God’s plan. Jesus gave extraordinary power to live a life of fullness and abundance, the power to be Christ-like in our everyday lives.

Conference Journey in 2010

This year has been a year of empowerment.

In the Frederick District, Mark Claybon stepped up and agreed to organize and create an active fellowship ministry for the local churches of the Frederick District. God led Charles Mosey to be the disciple leader for Cumberland-Hagerstown District. Charles Stewart stepped down as leader of Maryland Central District and Johnnie Walker was elected to be Maryland Central District president. Phillip Ferguson, the conference’s United Methodist Men’s treasurer, died. Sherman Harris was elected to complete his term.

In October 2010, a new Business Economy checking was established. BWCUMM has a nonincorporation charitable tax-exempt bank account for 680 Baltimore-Washington churches. We also received nontaxable authorization from the State of Maryland. In March, Darwin Hebron attended the National Association of Conference Presidents meeting in Nashville, Tenn.

In July, the BWCUMM held a Greet and Meet event with General Commission on United Methodist Men leader, Gil Hankie, and Larry Coppock, the national director of Scouting ministries.

In August, a team of BWCUMM participated in the Northeast Jurisdictional annual meeting. During the month of July, we were visited with Maryland Amachi program staff. Phillip Ferguson received the Society of John Wesley award, Maryland Central District, the highest honor in UMM ministry. Each district presented their named man of the year. Annapolis District Doug Ripple received the Conference's Man of the Year award at the October BWCUMM 2010 annual meeting at St. Mark's United Methodist Church.

The conference's Prayer Center continues to serve thousands of callers who need a word of comfort. The center's leader, Curtis Warren, has a vision that includes using technology to expand this ministry to local churches.

At our November meeting, Sandra Ferguson, conference director of Social Justice and Mission, and Britt Weber, the conference disaster response coordinator, discussed the conference's green plan and Disaster Response (ERT) training as a possible ministry for Conference UMM participation.

Under the leadership of Malcolm Clory, Sr., BWCUMM vice president, 25 UMM volunteers from four districts were assigned as safety monitors in support of the 2010 ROCK Youth Retreat, which hosted 6,500 participants in Ocean City. The UMM continued this commitment for the 2011 event.

District Journey in 2010

In 2010 the Annapolis District, Central Maryland District and Baltimore Metro District United Methodist Men sponsored a Meals For Millions potato drop to needy families. With the help of more than 100 volunteers in each district, the UMM delivered 270,000 pounds of potatoes to needy families. With a partnership with the Maryland Bible Society, each family received not only a 50-pound bag of potatoes, but also were given a copy of the Gospel of John, the names and contact information of the United Methodist churches in their area, and a personal invitation to be part of a church family. The Society of St. Andrew, which gleaned and trucked the potatoes from Maine at no cost to the district, made the potato drop possible.

This year in Annapolis, Calvary UMM was formed. This group received the district's first John Wesley award for their achievements as a newly chartered UMM. In one year, they elected officers, established two Covenant Discipleship groups for men, and planned two mission projects for Appalachia and Mississippi. They created the Honey-Doers, a group of men that have skills in building and design to help church and community families, including partnering with John Wesley UMC to build a new commercial kitchen. They had a fundraiser for the entire community to raise money for Scouting and missions and joined with a local gleaning organization to harvest collard greens for distribution to needy families in Congress Heights in Washington, D.C.

The Maryland Central District UMM under the leadership of Charles Stewart contributed \$700 to the Katrina Project and \$100 to the Gideon Bible Society. They also collected more than 400 pairs of shoes and 100 pairs of socks for the Global Soles Project for Haiti. Seventy UMM attended their annual district meeting to celebrate the good news that three new churches chartered a UMM organization.

The Baltimore Metropolitan District UMM, which was established as a result of the 2008 conference redistricting, had four outstanding men volunteer to be the district officers for the next four years. Under the leadership of President Bill Weller they have established new clustered UMM groups and hold quarterly meetings – providing a time of fellowship, Bible study and leadership training. Their attendance is growing and will soon exceed 100 men.

Cary Montgomery, president of the Washington East District, held two outstanding prayer breakfasts as part of the district's plan to rebuild their men's ministry. The Greater Washington District held

a prayer district meeting, hosted by St. Paul UMM. They provided transportation to the bishops attending the Council of Bishops, worked with the Baltimore Area Scouting for a dinner and signed up a new chartered local UMM in the district.

My sincere thanks to all the UMMs who took this journey this year. While much remains to be done, God has truly blessed our ministries. Visit our website at www.bwcumm.org to follow our 2011 travels, which will highlight the 100th Anniversary of Scouting and the new GCUMM Amachi Program for disadvantaged urban youth.

United Methodist Women (CC)

The Baltimore-Washington Conference United Methodist Women is a group of generous women who are blessed with many talents, gifts and dedication to women, children, youth and those who are marginalized in the conference and throughout the world.

Our accomplishments for 2010 include:

- 150 people from the Baltimore-Washington Conference, including Bishop Schol, traveled to St. Louis to participate in the 2010 UMW Assembly, April 29–May 2.
- Increased social action activities included emphasis on immigration. We participated in a rally, wrote letters, signed petitions and visited our Washington legislators.
- Approximately five seminars were held in different districts to highlight the need for vigilance on the growing problem of Human Trafficking.
- The Baltimore-Washington Conference and the Northern Virginia United Methodist Women created a Learning Center for Wesley Seminary to highlight the importance of our work to The United Methodist Church. Julia Tulloch, Women's Division Leadership Development Coordinator, was the chapel speaker.
- The School of Christian Mission studies for 2010 were Mission and Evangelism, Joy to the World! Mission in the Age of Global Christianity; Spiritual Growth, For the Love of God, John's Letters; and the Beauty and Courage of Sudan. Approximately 150 people participated in the school under the leadership of Jane Witherite-Barss.
- In a period of economic downturn the Baltimore-Washington Conference UMW contributed almost \$400,000 to missions in 2009.
- Scholarships were awarded to 16 students in the amount of \$800.
- Epworth House awarded a \$10,000 scholarship to Tabea Muenz to study at Wesley Seminary.
- Thirty-five people traveled to New York, Dec. 13-15, to participate in custom-designed seminar on immigration. The seminar provided an in-depth, hands-on experience.
- The Baltimore-Washington Conference for decades has provided outstanding leadership for programs beyond our conference. In this tradition, we are proud that Sabrina White, of the Baltimore Metropolitan District, is currently president of the Northeast Jurisdiction. Jane Grays, of the Washington East District, is serving a two-year term as Dean of Regional School, a leadership program for the Northeast Jurisdiction.

The accomplishments of United Methodist Women are astounding. I feel privileged to serve for four years as president of a warm, strong, dedicated, caring, diverse community of women.

Volunteers in Mission (CC)

In 2005, the tragedy of Hurricane Katrina (and later Rita) had one beneficial result: it reawakened interest in Volunteers in Missions as hundreds of VIM teams from around the United States headed for the Gulf Coast to assist in the rebuilding effort. This mission is still, five years later, a work in progress; teams are still going to the Gulf Coast and more are needed.

In 2010, a second tragedy, the earthquake in Haiti, caused a similar response as our churches prepared unknown thousands of Health Kits and began to plan to send VIM teams there as well. Sadly, to date, the unstable nature of Haiti and the difficulties and expenses of international travel make a rapid and large scale response still awkward.

We will all need to be patient as these circumstances to send teams to Haiti are worked out that will allow more of us to respond. In the meantime, while we wait for more opportunities to go to Haiti, please consider sending teams to the Gulf Coast or other areas.

Many of you are already sending out teams. In the past year, Baltimore-Washington Conference churches sent at least 140 teams to meet the needs and to share the love of Jesus Christ. This is a 17 percent increase over 2009. We cannot provide an exact number of teams, however, because many teams do not register. This is a simple (and free) process, and can be done online through the VIM portion of the Conference website (bwcumc.org/microsites/f/vim).

We also want to take this opportunity to urge those forming teams to not only register the team with the Conference VIM Committee; but more importantly, we urge you to purchase insurance for your team members through either the General Board of Global Ministries or the Northeast Jurisdiction’s VIM Coordinator’s office. (Both can be contacted through the VIM portion of the conference website referred to above.) This insurance is inexpensive and can provide a vital safety net when accidents or sickness occur.

Scriptural Basis for VIM Teams

There are many reasons why we encourage you and our churches to participate. The most important comes directly from the teachings of Jesus.

Perhaps the main teaching of Jesus in this regard is in Matthew 25, where Jesus states, “Then these righteous ones will reply, ‘Lord, when did we ever see you hungry and feed you? Or thirsty and give you something to drink? Or a stranger and show you hospitality? Or naked and give you clothing? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you?’ And the King will say, ‘I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me.’” (See Matthew 25:37-40). Jesus calls us and expects us to meet the needs of those who are in need.

For more than 20 years, our Baltimore-Washington churches have been sending teams to meet such needs. We have seen countless answers to prayer; we have become more trusting in God’s promises as we see God at work as we work; we have been encouraged by seeing people whose lives we have

been able to touch and team members whose lives have been changed. And, we have seen churches become more alive by testimonies of returning team members.

For those of you who are not familiar with VIM (more accurately, UMVIM), let me share these words from the UMVIM Training Manual for Mission Volunteers; they will give you a sense of the team experience by reviewing these characteristics of UMVIM teams. These characteristics include the following:

- Are open to God's blessings;
- Radiate God's love;
- Share Christ's great spirit of kindness, acceptance and unity;
- Serve Christ and his people;
- Lift up God in all they do;
- Have a healthy prayer life;
- Think team, not self;
- Are flexible, patient and relaxed;
- Realize that people are more important than work results;
- Understand that cultures are different, not superior or inferior.

Who among us cannot understand the value of these characteristics and who could not benefit from a UMVIM team experience, and likewise, understand how it can change the local church as well?

The major objective of the Conference VIM Committee is to make reaching those in need more of a reality. To those of you who think, "I can't really do anything – I have no skills," we want to remind you again of the example of the Apostle Paul. In Acts 27 and 28, Paul found himself ship wrecked on an island and not in good physical shape. In Acts 28:3, Paul is gathering wood for a fire. If Paul, with his infirmities, could gather wood, it seems that everyone of us can gather wood, or paint, or sand, or pray, or offer a listening ear or perform some of the many behind- the-scenes jobs that enable others to do more skilled work.

The goal of our committee continues to be that every church will send out at least one team, even if it is in cooperation with another church.

Purpose of Volunteers in Mission

The purpose of Volunteers in Mission is to give United Methodists and others the opportunity to reach out locally, nationally and internationally with compassion, to those in need. It is a chance to share our gifts and talents from our gracious Lord, while at the same time helping our faith to grow in ways that can sometimes be a complete surprise to us.

UMVIM works closely with United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), providing teams as well as individuals, to assist in recovery from natural disasters and sometimes even violent conflicts. This benefits:

- Those who serve on teams because volunteers are truly changed and blessed by giving of their time and talents to those they serve;
- Churches who send teams because congregations are renewed as they become involved in this mission outreach;
- Others to seek this opportunity as they are inspired by volunteers sharing their VIM stories;

- Those who are the beneficiaries from the recovery efforts during their time of a disaster or conflict.

The Conference UMVIM team also works with the Conference Emergency Response Team when necessary for disaster response, primarily within the boundaries of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

Assisting the Church

The Conference UMVIM Committee assists local churches in responding to needs for teams. We have a dedicated team of volunteers, made up of coordinators for each region, who meet regularly to plan to better assist local churches with training for team leaders and to provide resources to keep them updated with new information. They are available to train those who want to lead teams and to share information for forming teams. They can also assist local churches to find speakers on UMVIM to inspire local church involvement.

The Conference UMVIM Committee is always open to new ideas on ways to better assist you in carrying out this ministry. You can contact the Conference VIM Coordinator, Rev. Accomplishments

In the past year, as noted above, Baltimore-Washington Conference churches sent at least 140 teams to meet the needs and to share the love of Jesus Christ. Many went (some for the second, third or more times) to the Gulf Coast to help with hurricane recovery. Many others went to other locations all over the United States. In addition, teams went to a number of countries, such as Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Honduras, Guatemala, Mexico, Nicaragua, Peru, Russia, Senegal, Uruguay, Ukraine and Zimbabwe.

Teams helped to build (or rebuild) homes, schools and churches. Hungry people were fed; medical needs were met; Bible schools were held to help children (and often their parents) meet our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Often teams return to the same location annually, building on relationships as they complete new work and assist in ongoing programs.

Training events were held several times around the conference to train people to lead teams. Enthused volunteer trainers brought life to the concept of volunteering.

The conference UMVIM Committee sponsored a conferencewide team leader training in October, and we updated an informational DVD about Volunteers in Mission, which is available on request from the committee. Local church representatives participated in the DVD by sharing their inspirational stories about their VIM experiences. Plans for the Coming Year

The UMVIM Committee's hope and goal, as stated above, is that every church will participate by sending teams or sending members to participate in teams from other churches. Our desire is to continue to be a resource to these teams and to provide the training needed for those who chose to lead a team. We are also working to more clearly define our role in assisting the conference and our churches in how to meet needs more effectively.

Christ called us to reach out to those in need. What better way is there to accomplish this mission than to be with other Christians to do this work to love our neighbor, not just in word, but also in truth and action?

You are encouraged to visit the Volunteer in Missions section of the Conference website (www.bwcumc.org/microsites/f/vim) as well as review the new VIM Models in Ministry page at www.bwcumc.org/models/vim. These sites provide information about upcoming events; volunteer opportunities, including upcoming teams that need more members; forms to register your team and obtain insurance; and links to other helpful UMVIM information.

It is our hope and prayer that God is speaking to you, urging you to get involved with a VIM team. I would like to encourage you to be open to the frequent needs that come our way to minister to “the least of these” and, when appropriate, take the opportunity these missions often provide for us to go and make disciples.

Consider these quotes from VIM team members: “You go expecting to give, but you come back receiving more than what you gave.” And this: “If you tell them that God loves them and don’t do anything for them, it has less impact. Poor people don’t understand that.”

Commission on Religion and Race (CC)

This past year the conference Commission on Religion and Race has continued to seek a fully inclusive United Methodist Church that is accountable and proactive in addressing prejudice and promoting inclusiveness. Working with the General Board of Religion and Race in Washington, D.C., we seek to build God’s beloved community through the church and the world.

Toward this end, we have worked with several individuals and groups, engaging in conversation, offering education and raising awareness about the sins of racism. We have been particularly focused on the immigration arena, promoting the national campaign to eliminate the “I” word – “Illegal” – from before the word immigrant.

We are also exploring how we might expand our role as monitors and advocates within the churches of the Baltimore-Washington Conference and their communities.

Quality of Life Retreats (CC)

The Quality of Life Retreats are a ministry under the Grow Mission Team of the Baltimore-Washington Conference. These retreats are a ministry for people living with HIV/AIDS. The retreats began in 1988 and now, in 2010, we have held 84 retreats and served more than 3,299 participants.

The objective of these retreats is to provide a safe, loving environment in which participants can be fully themselves, free of fears and inhibitions, and can deal openly with their deepest concerns. This is a supportive ministry to individuals who many times have experienced discrimination and rejection. It is a chance to get away, get together, interact, share and learn the techniques and attitudes that are effective in dealing with the journey and issues of long-term survival. The participants invariably say, in their evaluation of each retreat, that “it is so good to be with people who understand me and want to help me be who I am.”

During 2010, there were 102 registered HIV+ participants, with a leadership staff of 30. A demographics survey (all participants responded) indicated that attendees included 47 males, 48 females, and two transgendered individuals; 27 homosexuals (including one lesbian), and eight heterosexuals. Racial responses indicated 6.5 were Caucasian, 94 African American, two Latino and 2.5 Native American; the participants ranged in age from 20 to 69. Some young participants were born HIV positive. Due to inclement weather, the February retreat was cancelled the second day.

These retreats are an opportunity for personal growth and spiritual encounters. They are a learning opportunity, which involves both individual reflection and group exploration. The retreats are designed to address people affected by HIV/AIDS from a variety of faith traditions and of ethnic and cultural backgrounds, different genders and different sexual orientations.

The retreats are held four times a year for three days (February, June, September and December). They are held at The Washington Retreat House, West River Center and Camp Manidokan. A bond of community is established very quickly. Activities include plenary speakers, reflection groups, worship, healing service, crafts, bingo, festive dinner, a talent/no talent show, and sometimes there is a massage therapist and other professionals, such as lawyers and dance leaders.

We sent out introduction letters and a brochure to the Western Region, Central Maryland and Baltimore Metropolitan districts. Our strategic plan calls for us to educate the members of the Baltimore-Washington Conference about Quality of Life Retreats and we will be sending out this material to the rest of the conference to circulate to all churches. Raymond Shattuck, chair, and Lance Hogue, RN, secretary, have joined the State of Maryland Faith Based Advisory Board representing the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

Raymond Shattuck participated in the Lighten the Burden Conference III in Dallas, Texas, and spoke on “Stigma and HIV.” Loretta Anders and Raymond Shattuck attended “The Church Lights the Way Conference” held at Grace UMC in Baltimore.

Partnership with South Conference, Korea (CC)

This was an active year for the covenant partnership of the Baltimore-Washington Conference and the South (Nambu) Conference of the Korea Methodist Church. In April, a small delegation from the Baltimore-Washington Conference visited South Korea, attended the Easter sunrise service with 20,000 people at the square in downtown Seoul, and participated in their Annual Conference session held at Sansung KMC, in Daejeon, South Korea.

During that visit, an update of the Covenant Agreement was signed between our two conferences on April 10, 2010. This agreement states:

“In recognition of the global partnership begun by the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church and Nambu Yonhoe (South Conference) of the Korean Methodist Church beginning in 2002, and

“In gratitude for the efforts of leaders in both conferences who have continued to build this partnership through exchanges of youth, young adults, pastors and conference leaders, and

“In celebration of our common Wesleyan history, unique ministries, and a common calling to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and that our witness is made stronger through our expanding partnership,

“We covenant to deepen our relationship and further our witness through the one to one partnership of churches in both conferences in order to share in vision, mission, learning, and best practices through the exchanges of pastors, leaders and church members and

“To explore the possibilities of prayer partnerships with individuals and churches in each conference, and

“To plan joint mission opportunities in our countries and/or in a third venue in order to proclaim the reconciling love of Jesus Christ by being a model of his reconciliation in the world.”

At this time three of our congregations are in the exploration stage of developing one-to-one partnerships. Joint mission trips have been mentioned as one of the first joint projects between the churches. We are also looking at the possibility of hosting one or more pastors from South Conference as a part of the Prodigal Worship event.

In July 2010, the BWC Council on Young Adult Ministry hosted a delegation of young adults from Korea for a two-week visit. Participants visited local churches and met together for a joint meeting with the BWC Young Adults. Plans were initiated at that time for a mission venture in a third country, possibly Haiti. Young adult leaders from both conferences are hopeful that a joint mission trip will come to fruition in 2011.

Zimbabwe Partnership (CC)

Since 1997, the Baltimore-Washington Conference has been a ministry partner with the Zimbabwe Episcopal Area of The United Methodist Church. At the 2008 General Conference, the Baltimore-Washington Conference and the Zimbabwe Conference signed a new covenant that extends its working relationship through 2012. The covenant states that it will focus on issues such as theological

training, community and economic development, young adult ministries, preaching biblical studies and leadership in the Zimbabwe Episcopal Area.

In 2009, the Zimbabwe Partnership formed with the vision statement that says, “Our vision is to see a joyful, peaceful, prosperous, self-sufficient, empowered, healthy and reconciled Zimbabwean nation that works together in the spirit of “*chabadza*.” We will work ceaselessly and passionately along side other Christians to support efforts leading to sustainable living and freedom to grow in Christ for all Zimbabwean people.”

The Zimbabwe Partnership consists of laity, pastors and conference staff. The executive team has the following members:

The Zimbabwe Partnership was very active in projects and sending individuals and teams in 2010. There are also many opportunities for church members to be involved in various ministries in 2011 and beyond.

In 2010 there was momentum in acquiring VSAT satellite technology, which will allow the two Conference head offices, the twelve district offices, United Methodist schools, clinics and hospitals to access the Internet as well as communicate and coordinate with each other. There have also been major commitments from the Baltimore-Washington Conference, the United Methodist Communication Office (UMCOM), the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) as well as individuals, churches and anonymous donors to continue the installation and management of this vital communication technology. Improving communication was one of the top goals of the Zimbabwe Conference that was identified at the International Partners Summit held at African University in 2009. The Baltimore-Washington Conference has sponsored a Zimbabwe Pastor School every other year at Africa University for the past 13 years. The Pastor School has made great strides since 1997, when all the teaching and logistics were done by the BWC, to 2009, when 50 percent of the teaching was done by the Zimbabweans. The 2011 Pastor School has stretched out even further and teamed up with the Western Pennsylvania Conference, which will host the first Zimbabwe Laity School. These two schools will run concurrent at Africa University during June 2011. There is much anticipation as the Zimbabwe Annual Conference brings together both clergy and laity in a partnership of training and learning experiences. It is expected that there will be 600 Zimbabweans in attendance.

There was also progress on the girl's orphanage dormitory in Murewa, which is located on the site of the Murewa Mission Church. We expect the dormitory to be completed in January 2011, so that students will be able to stay there as they begin their next school term in mid-January. The Murewa girl's orphanage will be completed with the assistance of funds from the BWC, the United Methodist Board of Child Care, UMCOR and Community UMC in Crofton. This dormitory will also house the McDaniel College volunteer team in early January 2011. The McDaniel College team will be led by Charlie Moore and Jim Gourley and will consist of 15 students, faculty, alumni and friends of McDaniel. They will be taking the first concrete steps in developing the long term strategic partnership between McDaniel College and African University in Old Mutare. During their visit, they will be distributing 1,000 malaria nets to the Dindi Clinic, with funds that have been previously raised from the BWC Imagine No Malaria Campaign. They will also be installing two computer labs in the Murewa Primary and Secondary Schools and working side by side with Africa University students in repairing a primary school in the Mutare area. Please continue to support the Imagine No Malaria Campaign so that more vulnerable families will be protected from malaria and other mosquito diseases. A \$10 net can save lives. To learn more, visit www.bwcumc.org/imaginenomalaria.

In addition, the BWC Episcopal Office team sewed 120 school bags, which were filled with school supplies. Half of the funds for the supplies were donated by members of Locust UMC. The bags were delivered to the Murewa girls' orphanage during their visit to the Zimbabwe West Annual Conference in December 2010. The team also delivered 14 soccer balls to the Mission Center for the four age-level schools. These balls were donated by members of the BWC staff and the Rev. Karen Walker's girls' soccer team.

There was also a gathering of United Methodists who were interested in health issues in Zimbabwe in Chesterfield, Va., in October. The intent was to form a network of partners interested in building an ongoing relationship with Old Mutare Hospital and serving in its revitalization. Their next steps include communicating with the Zimbabwe Conference as well as with the UMC Zimbabwe Health Board in order to review a strategic plan developed by the hospital, developing a website and online calendar, developing a complete list of partners interested in helping with the revitalization, connecting with partners not currently represented, developing a surgical program at the hospital, repairing and modernizing their operating room and its equipment, training their staff, as well as coordinating shipment of a container with medical/surgical supplies, arranging for its doctor, Dr. Manyeza, to itinerate in churches in the USA, arranging training for the Hospital Administrator in India and finally leading a UMVIM team in July 2011 to Old Mutare Hospital. Other Baltimore-Washington Conference churches partnered together to ensure that the Old Mutare Hospital got its first operational x-ray machine facility. The Old Mutare Hospital serves a community of 30,000 people and has never had an x-ray machine, nor a safe facility to house the unit. This unit will also allow Africa University students to learn radiology. Many thanks to UMCOR who provided the initial \$10,000 grant. UMCOR then requested an additional \$8,000 from partner churches to complete the project. Grace UMC in Gaithersburg, St. Matthews UMC in Bowie, Baldwin Memorial

UMC in Millersville, as well as Carol Brian, Bob, Molly and Marlene Moores came together to complete this critical task. Dr. Tendai Manyez, the Chief Medical Officer at Old Mutare Hospital, said, "We are very grateful to the donors who made this long-time dream a reality."

The Munyarari United Methodist Clinic is an operational clinic that was designed and supported by Bel Air UMC. During 2010, studies were conducted in partnership with UMCOR to help the U.S. partners understand how to advance and become more involved in the future training, education and planning in partnerships with the Zimbabwe Annual Conference and Health Boards.

Also, individual UMVIM volunteers, Jim Gourley and Sue McCann, will be in Zimbabwe from November 2010 to April 2011 (except for a brief stint back to the USA for the holiday season). They will be providing critical on-the-ground logistical support for various ongoing and new ministries as well as coordinating with various incoming volunteer teams, including Community United Methodist Church in Crofton (CUMC). CUMC's next project will be the building of a new secondary school block in Hanwa. This follows their building of a primary school block in April 2009. CUMC is leading a team with members from four different BWC churches to Hanwa to arrive on March 14 and depart around April 1. They have already raised almost \$30K of the \$50K needed for this project.

As of Dec. 6, 2010, the Pastors Support ministry contributed more than \$7,000 to help subsidize salaries of pastors in Zimbabwe.

Several Annapolis District churches also provided funds for shoes and blankets for orphans in Mushunje in 2010 as a part of their ongoing support for the orphans. Similar orphan trusts are supported by CUMC in Nuweyembwa, Muchinjike, and Murewa as well as the Nyanyadzi AIDS Orphans Trust supported by Morgan Chapel UMC/Mt. Olive UMC.

There are also many other ministries, programs and projects being done by other churches and individuals in the Baltimore-Washington Conference that have not been highlighted here. Board of Laity (CC)

God's people called to love and serve

The laity of the Baltimore-Washington Conference continue to live out their ministry as God's people called to love and serve. We support the mission of our annual conference: seeking to be more like Christ as we call, equip, send and support spiritual leaders to grow Acts 2 congregations. As leaders, we continue to develop and promote programs and training that enable the empowerment and spiritual leadership development of local church leaders.

The final two of the four regional lay trainings with consultant, Joseph Robinson, Jr., on "The 7 Leadership Imperatives From a Wild Man," were completed in the Annapolis Southern Region and the Western Region. Also, for the first time, laity took a survey to help conference leadership

better comprehend their feelings and understanding of the direction of the conference, their local church involvement and training needs.

The first Bishop's Day Apart with Laity was planned and implemented very successfully with motivational preacher Olu Brown from Impact United Methodist Church in Atlanta, Ga. The Crossroads Praise Band and Joyful Noise youth choir provided music. The day proved to be very motivational, informative and thought provoking for the more than 200 participants.

Laity continue to lead, motivate and engage in ministry, training, praise and worship. We are visible and active with the Connectional Table, Discipleship Academy, Discipleship Council, boards and agencies, our local churches and communities.

We are involved as planners, teachers, associate deans and students in the Discipleship Academy, which continues to grow and meet regional needs.

The first Certified Lay Ministry class concluded studies last November and members have met with district boards of ordained ministry to fulfill necessary criteria for program completion.

The Lay Speaking Program continues to engage laity in discipleship through leading, caring and communication ministries. Under the leadership of the conference director, the district directors, the conference lay leader and grow spiritual leaders' staff, lay speaking classes and costs were unified on each district and region. Currently, all lay speaking classes are under the Discipleship Academy.

Across the conference, laity address the focus areas of the denomination through various ministries: by being involved in social and political justice with advocacy efforts; being active in community service and outreach endeavors; supporting drives/causes, such as Nothing But Nets and the Hope Fund, while faithfully supporting local church pastors, local church ministries and conference leadership.

In December, I, as conference lay leader, was a member of the team that journeyed to Zimbabwe to attend and participate in the Zimbabwe West Annual Conference, and visit the girls' orphanage sponsored by our conference, as well as distribute school materials and soccer and basketballs to the children.

The lay leadership of the Baltimore-Washington Conference will continue to engage local church laity in the ministries that faithfully connect United Methodists with the church, the world, each other and God as we help make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

Board of Ordained Ministry (CC)

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. Ephesians 4:11-13

The Board of Ordained Ministry is charged with the care of the current and future leaders of our church. We understand that every baptized Christian is in ministry and all of us are called to a life of Christian service. The time of discernment is not about whether one is called to minister but rather, how one is called to serve. Ordination is one way, but other ways include serving as local pastors, Certified Lay Ministers, lay speakers and committed lay people, each serving faithfully where God has placed them.

We have been implementing some of the new procedures adopted and begun last year.

This is our first full year using the newly developed “Handbook for District Committees of Ordained Ministry.” This has been a very useful resource in helping all district committees to work in the same way. A number of other annual conferences have requested copies of our handbook for use with their district committees as well.

We seek to identify candidates with the “faith, fire and fruit” needed in spiritual leaders. As candidates for ordination or licensing move through the process, the board, the district committees and the local churches are looking for *fitness, readiness and effectiveness*.

Our district committees are primarily involved with determining fitness for ministry. Our new procedures involve more evaluation by the local churches who identify and support candidates for ministry. Our district committees have been working to train SPRCs in ways of interviewing that will allow them to identify faith, fire and fruit in those seeking the church’s endorsement to follow the call of “set-aside” ministry for the church.

In our provisional-member evaluation retreat, the board seeks to determine readiness for ministry; for full-members, we are looking for effectiveness.

In January, we conducted our evaluation exam for full-member candidates using new procedures developed for that process. We identified a number of things that were good about the procedures and also some that needed to be reworked. We will use these revised procedures for the evaluations held in January and February 2011.

The board was directly involved with two of the “Requests for Declaratory Decision” made at last year’s executive session of annual conference; we provided briefs to the Judicial Council for their consideration. One of these requests led to a hearing before the Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church. The board was represented at this hearing by the chair.

During the year, we became aware of concerns around how we handle the issue of visas for candidates from other countries who are here on student visas and who wish to be ordained in the BWC. Also, we find we need to improve our procedures for tracking and caring for clergy who transfer from another annual conference or another denomination. We are working with the Cabinet to ensure that we have procedures in place so that nothing will slip through the cracks and that all information needed for making decisions is readily available.

I, as chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry, and Chair of the Order of Deacons, Janet Craswell, attended the annual gathering of Chairs of Boards of Ordained Ministry, this year held at a hotel at BWI airport. I also attended a session to consider the Ministry Report being developed for consideration by the 2012 General Conference. Board Secretary Rebecca Ianicelli and I attended a meeting with the Texas Methodist Foundation of Board Chairs and Bishops held in San Antonio. This meeting, also attended by Bishop Schol, focused on new and unconventional ways of doing ministry.

Under the sponsorship of the board, Rev. Lynn Glassbrook led our annual License to Preach School, held at West River Retreat Center May 16-23, 2010. There were 15 students from five different annual conferences: the Baltimore-Washington Conference, Peninsula-Delaware Conference, Western Pennsylvania Conference, Greater New Jersey Annual Conference, and the New England Conference. There were eight women and seven men; two African-Americans and 13 Caucasians. All 15 were high quality, competent candidates and all 15 successfully completed the course. We give thanks for this important ministry that we offer to the connectional United Methodist Church.

In addition, working with Frances Tagoe and the Office of Pension and Benefits, the Board sponsored our annual Pre-Retirement seminar. We encourage anyone who is considering retirement any time to attend this event.

The board and our district committees have very heavy workloads and I commend every member of the board and all committees for the spirit of commitment and generosity they bring to their work. A special thanks also to Debbie Albrecht, who serves as our administrative assistant, makes sure that centralized work and documents are handled appropriately, and sees to it that when our meetings run long, we receive refreshments.

We, the Board of Ordained Ministry, are committed to serving the church as best we can, and we continue to seek your prayers for our work. I thank the leaders and members of the board who give so generously of their time and work so hard to ensure that Baltimore-Washington Conference continues to have capable, committed leaders for our ministries.

Certified Lay Ministry (CC)

Discipler Groups (CC)

Discipler Groups are designed to grow spiritual leaders to lead Acts 2 congregations that are Spirit-filled, Spirit-led, sharing in authentic Christian community and bearing fruit. Each small group, with a Discipler Guide as facilitator, seeks to strengthen and support spiritual leaders to affirm their calling and support and strengthen their leadership. Discipler Groups have as their goal to enliven, engage and release spiritual leaders to do the ministry they are called to do.

Discipler Groups meet once a month at local churches in their region. Within the conference, there are 60 of these groups, with an average of 10-12 clergy in attendance. These groups completed their 43rd monthly session together in sharing and learning on some very challenging topics. Many of the

groups have gone on to form small covenant groups of clergy who provide guidance and support to one another as well. Topics covered during the 2010 year included: Connecting God with the World through Preaching; The Art of Worship Design; Sacred Boundaries: Healthy Relations and Self Care; Financial Issues and Sexual Boundaries for Clergy; Laity Empowerment: Integrate, Involve and Identify; Social Justice: Ecological Justice, Immigration, and Domestic Violence.

Fellowship of Local Pastors and Associates (CC)

The Fellowship of Local Pastors and Associates held its yearly meeting at the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference in May 2010. We were encouraged by a talk from George Harpold who has been a local pastor since 1978. The local pastors in attendance were also motivated by Bishop John Schol who stopped by the luncheon to let the local pastors know that their work is valuable to the health and vitality of ministry in the conference.

During this luncheon, the local pastors divided into regions to plan future regional meetings of local pastors and associates. Leaders were selected from each region to organize and plan gatherings, which will bring local pastors together to discuss their unique challenges, provide training in specific areas and share educational and lifestyle resources. In addition to the yearly meeting at the annual conference and regional gatherings, the local pastors are planning to hold at least one additional training session during 2011.

In October, leadership of the Fellowship held their annual meeting with Bishop Schol. Prior to the meeting, local pastors were asked to provide any questions or concerns for the bishop as we looked toward 2011. Questions ranged from the impact of Certified Lay Ministers to the possibility of local pastors serving on the District Committee of Ordained Ministry. The bishop, who served as a local pastor for two years in the early stages of his ministry, reiterated his message of appreciation for the local pastors who continue to sacrifice and serve well in their valued leadership positions throughout the conference.

In September, several members of the Fellowship traveled to Georgia to attend the annual gathering of The United Methodist Church National Fellowship of Associate Members and Local Pastors, which brought together local pastors and associates from across the country to discuss issues pertinent to this ministry. Members attended workshops and general sessions designed to provide information and education about the future of local pastors in The United Methodist Church. Pertinent information from the conference will be shared with members of the Fellowship.

The Fellowship will continue to make strides to meet, train and provide resources for local pastors to help them be more effective while handling the unique challenges of this ministry, which include those who are engaged in full-time or part-time employment or attending school while pastoring one or more congregations and understanding that congregations expect full-time performance for part-time local pastors.

2011 REGIONAL REPORTS

Annapolis Southern Region 2011 Annual Conference Report

The Annapolis Southern Region consists of two districts, Annapolis and Washington East, and has 45,263 members. The 144 congregations are served by 144 pastors. These churches, large and small, are making a major impact on their communities and the lives of individuals.

During the past year, the Annapolis District developed plans for a new church start in the Arundel Mills area which will launch July 2011. This new congregational initiative will reach young adults (ages 18-35), especially those who have fallen away from the church or those who have not yet seen the need or the importance of having the presence of Christ in their lives. This community will initially be built upon service opportunities engaging young adults and small groups for discussion, Bible Study, and social events. In order to most effectively reach young adults the community will engage in ministries for a generation that sees relevance first and then reverence. This new initiative is not an isolated effort but one we hope will create a model that can be replicated in other parts of the Baltimore area and the Baltimore-Washington Conference as we seek to reach more young adults.

During the past year, the Washington East District began exploring two new ministries: bringing the Common Ground 100,000 Homes Campaign to Charles County which has one of the highest incidences of homelessness in the Baltimore-Washington area and forming a partnership between the churches in Washington East and the Black Soil District in the Russian Annual Conference. The partnership with churches in the Black Soil District will build upon the ministry that has already been established by Trinity UMC in Prince Frederick, MD under the leadership of Rev. Charles Harrell.

The Annapolis Southern Region had 1226 professions of faith in 2010 as compared to 1208 in 2009. Average worship attendance for 2010 was 17,571, which was down from 18,066 in 2009. Our region paid \$3,758,890 in apportionments in 2010 which represented a payment rate of 94.7 percent – an increase from 93.52 percent in 2009.

Over 58 percent (83) of our congregations met the goal of 1 profession of faith for every 25 in worship. Over 33 percent (47) of our congregations met the goal of 2 percent increase in average worship attendance. Over 84 percent (120) of our congregations paid their apportionments in full. And the region celebrates that 69 percent (99) of our congregations are Acts 2 churches.

These are just a few of the signs and wonders of God's grace at work among the churches and pastors of the Annapolis and Washington East Districts.

Baltimore Region 2011 Annual Conference Report

The Baltimore Region continues to align around potential for making disciples and the best use of resources. In the suburban district, congregations are working cooperatively to share resources, staff and lay leader as they begin new worship communities and create new ways to connect with people of all ages. In the city of Baltimore, anchor churches are being identified so that there is the greatest potential for creating a significant impact on the key social issues affecting city residents including homelessness, poverty, addiction and crime. Key appointments have been made to further this strategy and two associate pastor positions have been created to help in this endeavor. The Ten Point Plan for Baltimore City, Hope for the City, continues to help congregations work together to provide a witness in deed and word to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The region saw the launch of the Vine, a new faith community, born out of Bel Air UMC, in the Abingdon/Emmorton Community and will be establishing a second new faith community in Baltimore City connected with a housing initiative by June 2012.

This past fall, the Baltimore Region sponsored a trip to New York City to see a “Housing First” program, called Common Ground, which provided housing for homeless with wrap-around services. Housing initiatives have been established in Harford County, Baltimore County, Baltimore City and Carroll County. A significant strategy in process in the region is the potential of re-purposing church buildings for housing units.

Sixteen congregations have plans to initiate new worship services in 2011 with the goal of reaching additional segments of the communities including young adults, Hispanics and the non-churched. All churches in the region have set a goal of at least two percent increase in worship attendance and at least one profession of faith in the year 2011.

In 2010, 50 congregations in the region (28 percent) experienced growth in worship attendance and 99 (49 percent) congregations had at least one profession of faith for every 25 worshippers. 137 churches paid 100 percent apportionments and the number of Acts II congregations increased to 28 (22 percent). The total professions of faith for the region was 1,024, down from 1,163 in 2009, and the average worship attendance was 15,905, down from 16,328 in 2009. 91 percent of congregations on the Baltimore Suburban District paid 100 percent apportionments and 58 percent of Baltimore Metropolitan congregations paid 100 percent apportionments.

Washington Region 2011 Annual Conference Report

The Washington Region consists of two districts, Central Maryland and Greater Washington, and has 47,418 members. The 144 congregations are served by 149 pastors.

The Central Maryland District celebrates the creative cooperative ministries developing across the district, both formal parishes and informal expressions of cooperation ranging from combined worship services and special fellowship events, to shared outreach ministries, to charges developing new ways of relating to each other and the community. The continued development of the Ellicott City Cooperative Parish is one such story where the Emory site has opened its doors to a Korean congregation of both Korean and English-speakers. The English-speaking part of the congregation, including the young children of second- and third-generation Korean Americans, worship with the Emory congregation while there is a Korean-language service for the “grandparents.” We also celebrate that since January 1, 2011, four new worship services have been initiated in the district, and we look forward to many more in the coming months.

During the past year, the Greater Washington District, inspired by the Common Ground Project, developed plans for the total renovation of the former Calvary United Methodist Church when Casa del Pueblo closed. In an effort to find a permanent solution to the serious need for housing homeless persons, the district is partnering with the Washington Interfaith Network to create 79 apartments to be known as Calvary Place and to renovate space for a new church start focused on the growing young adult population in that neighborhood. The start date has not yet been determined, as the partners are working on a final funding plan.

The Washington Region celebrates 1,239 professions of faith in 2010 as compared to 1222 in 2009. Average worship attendance for 2010 was 17,939 which was up from 17,181 in 2009. Our region paid \$4,948,193 in apportionments in 2010 which represented a payment rate of 89.72 percent – an increase from 86.7 percent in 2009. We are proud to announce that the GW District showed impressive increases in average worship attendance and professions of faith while the CM District showed the highest improvement in overall apportionment collection in the conference. Thank you to all of the churches that made these celebrations possible.

Over 52 percent (76) of our congregations met the goal of 1 profession of faith for every 25 in worship. Over 34.7 percent (50) of our congregations met the goal of 2 percent increase in average worship attendance. Over 72 percent (106) of our congregations paid their apportionments in full. And the region celebrates that 60.4 percent (87) of our congregations are Acts 2 churches. These are just a few of the signs and wonders of God’s grace at work among the churches and pastors of the Central Maryland and Greater Washington Districts.

Western Region 2011 Annual Conference Report

The Western Region consists of two districts, Cumberland-Hagerstown and Frederick, and has 43,764 members. The 190 churches are served by 145 pastors. The Western Region is a huge geographical region made up of seven counties, three in West Virginia (Jefferson, Berkeley, Morgan) and four in Maryland (Allegany, Washington, Frederick and Carroll) and several distinct cultures.

During the past year, the region has emphasized three areas: worship, young adult ministries and community outreach. For the second time, the region planned and sponsored Prodigal Worship. The theme of Prodigal Worship 2011 was “180 Degree Change: Transforming individuals, congregations and communities.” More than 400 people registered and attended Prodigal Worship at Glen Mar UMC in Ellicott City, to experience the ministries of Jennifer Smith to small member churches, Shane Claiborne about Living as an Ordinary Radical, Guy Berry demonstrating how to use multi-media to enhance ministry, Marvin Moss on preaching in the 21st Century and Paul Nixon on revitalizing congregations. The worship was experiential and we have designed continuing learning opportunities. Learn more about these opportunities and resources at www.bwcumc.org/prodigalworship or www.facebook.com/prodigalworship.

The Western Region has many young adults in ministry and has offered liaison staff support to the annual conference’s young adult ministry. The young adults, under the leadership of Rev. Katie Bishop from our region, produced a quarterly magazine as a resource for young adults and young adult leaders. The young adult council also provided training every other month for young adult leaders.

Churches in Morgan County joined forces to share in a mission trip to Guatemala. Through this joint experience, people from a variety of size churches, working together, accomplished God’s mission to those in Guatemala and grew in knowledge and support towards their neighboring church. Churches in Hagerstown and Frederick joined forces with other community groups to participate in the “Bikes for the World” program where in one day 500 used and under used bicycles were collected, cleaned and packed for shipment to people in Africa who will use their new bike for business travel, getting to work, to school and for providing income for their families.

The Western Region has 718 professions of faith in 2010 as compared to 822 in 2009. Average worship attendance for 2010 was 15,072, which was down from 15,341 in 2009. Our region paid 93.6 percent in apportionments in 2010 which represented a payment of \$2,633,083. The Cumberland-Hagerstown district paid almost 99 percent.

Over 40 percent (76) of our congregations met the goal of 1 profession of faith for every 25 in worship. More than 30 percent (56) of our congregations met the goal of 2 percent increase on average worship attendance. More than 89 percent (169) of our congregations paid their apportionments in full. And the region celebrates that 56 percent (108) of our congregations are Acts 2 churches.

This is just a sampling of the many signs and wonders of God’s grace at work on the Western Region. We give thanks for the faithfulness of our churches and pastors. We are the region that ROCKS.

STEWARDSHIP REPORTS

Council on Finance and Administration (CC)

The year 2010 will go down in the Conference record books as a year in which many long term strategic initiatives came to fruition. As our report below indicates, our Conference finances remain very strong and we have continued our long standing tradition of paying 100% of our General Conference apportionments. We have also made significant additional commitments to worldwide missional outreach and we are well positioned to continue reducing our benevolence factor over the next 4 to 6 years which will allow more funds to remain for ministry in our local churches. In 2010, more than \$11.2 million representing over 63% of the Conference budget went to missional outreach either through our General Conference apportionments or through BWC Conference funds being directed toward specific missional initiatives within our Conference.

Financial Results (Pre Audit):

During tough economic times, it is our pleasure to report the blessing that our total income for the year came in at \$18,140,848 which was \$333,165 (1.9%) better than the budget of \$17,807,683. This resulted from a collection rate of 90.51% of apportionment billings which was up substantially from our 2009 collection rate of 89.24%. This marked the highest collection rate for the conference since 2006. The collection rates for the past several years are as follows:

The expenses for the year ended up at \$17,776,328 which was \$29,396 (0.2%) under the budget of \$17,805,724. The overall net income prior to audit was recorded at \$364,520 which was favorable to budget by \$362,562.

The Council received this performance with a true sense of God's blessing. To achieve this level of expense control during a year of construction and moving staff was a sign of good cost control. We also want to acknowledge all of the local churches that decided that this would be the year for them to increase their apportionments to 100% or put plans in place to increase to 100% over time. Our connectional ministries are much stronger when all of our churches view their impact to the whole as we bring Christ to our neighborhoods and throughout the world. We thank you for the blessings of this year's efforts.

Other Initiatives:

New Conference Mission Center

The new Conference Mission Center was opened on August 23, 2010, to all staff with a formal ribbon cutting ceremony on August 24th. This was followed up with an open house and Consecration of the facility on October 19th. We were pleased to fill the Mission Center to overflowing as many people from our conference shared in the Consecration events.

The Council is pleased to report that the Mission Center project came in on time and on budget. We thank the efforts of the building executive committee led by the Rev. Deb Scott and our owner's representative, Jim Truby, for their hard work and dedication in working with Turner Construction and all the other contractors who were involved with the construction of our new home. We are also thankful to the Board of Child Care (BOCC) for managing the financial loan that enabled the long-term funding of the facility. The Conference has set up a schedule with the BOCC that will enable repayment of the 30-year loan to be completed in 23 years or less. The Conference also took steps this year to analyze the long-term repair costs of the Mission Center and then created a Capital Replacement Reserve Fund that will receive funds each year from the annual budget in preparation for funding major replacements of building systems, carpet, painting and furniture in the future. This fund will prevent the dramatic increase that can happen to a Conference budget when it comes time to perform major repairs on the facility.

The Mission Center is truly a blessing to all who serve and are served within the facility. Our partnership with Cokesbury is quite fitting for the common ministry that we provide. Together, we believe the organizations are stronger as we are now able to serve the Conference and community from the same location.

Statistical Data Reporting Process

It is noteworthy to mention the improvements and clarifications that were made by the Connectional Giving Committee over the past year in preparing for and implementing the 2010 statistical reporting process. These steps have significantly increased the credibility of the numbers and our confidence in preparing the proposed 2012 budget for review and approval at this year's Annual Conference.

Missions Support

Extraordinary commitments were met this year as the Conference donated \$500,000 to the Imagine No Malaria campaign. This gift is part of a \$75 million dollar effort by The United Methodist Church towards the elimination of malaria related deaths worldwide by 2015. We were also thankful to be able to combine donations with the Board of Child Care and the General Board of Global Ministries to complete an orphan girls' dormitory in Murewa Mission School in Zimbabwe that was ready to open in the school term beginning in May 2011. Both gifts are signs of sacrificial giving by our Conference and our local churches to address very specific needs of our brothers and sisters in Africa and around the globe.

Creation of the United Methodist Mid-Atlantic Foundation

July 2010 marked the formation of the new United Methodist Mid-Atlantic Foundation as the Baltimore-Washington Foundation merged with the existing foundation for Eastern Pennsylvania and the Delaware Peninsula. Rev. David Myers and the other foundations' board members are to be commended for their dedication in establishing what is now one of the top 10 foundations in the denomination.

Hiring of New Staff.

As we transitioned staff leadership on the Finance and Stewardship Team this year, we are grateful to Rev. Wayne DeHart for his service as Interim Treasurer. Wayne served the conference well for three months and he actively initiated and promoted several cost reductions and process improvements during his tenure. We are also pleased to have welcomed Paul Eichelberger as the new Chief Financial Officer and Treasurer in June 2010, in addition to Dave Schoeller as the new Business Analyst in October 2010.

Finance Team Review

In combination with the addition of new staff, a consultant review of the Finance Team's processes and systems was conducted by Beyond the Bottom Line. Recommendations from that review will be evaluated by the CFA and conference leadership and we will be implementing many of the new initiatives in 2011. Our team will continue to focus on improvements to the technology and related processes used in our financial operations, such as Gateway, Shelby and the financial statements used by local churches.

6-Year Budget Plan (2012 – 2017)

There are two long-term events that will positively impact the Conference budget in the future. The accelerated Mission Center mortgage payments with the Board of Child Care will decline each year since they are established with constant payment of principle plus interest on the remaining balance. As mentioned previously, the current schedule completes payment of the 30-year loan in only 23 years. In addition, the General Church will most likely propose to the 2012 General Conference that the General Church Apportionments be reduced by an estimated 10% over the next Quadrennial, 2013-2016. This trend builds on a 3.6% reduction in 2012 General Church apportionments. As a result of these trends, it is anticipated that the conference will be able to continue to reduce the benevolence factor over time.

Summary

It is once again CFA's pleasure to summarize this report by stating that the financial status of our Conference has remained strong through the entire economic downturn and we are now positioned for long-term maintenance of that viability. By continuing to stress the use of technology, the efficiency of our processes and staff personnel, and the sound management and leadership in controlling conference expenses, the financial results should be able to provide strong support to our overall mission to make disciples for the transformation of the world.

Our connectional system has ensured that needs within our conference and throughout our world continue to be addressed in poor economic times. As we continue to strive for that day when all of our churches are able to pay 100% of their conference apportionments, we fully acknowledge that our Conference has been blessed to be a beacon of hope.

Concluding Thoughts

As this year marked a significant milestone by moving into the new Mission Center, we close this year's report with a prayer from the Blessing of the Offices on August 23, 2010, the first day of God's

work in a new place.

O God, the beginning and the end of all that is, we are witnesses of the fruits of your creative energies on behalf of all people. Teach us the purpose for our labors. Guide us by your Spirit to put the efforts of our minds and bodies to constructive and meaningful use here. May we and all your children work together towards your eternal purposes to bring the Gospel message of grace and reconciliation and justice to the world so that all may know that we are your disciples. In the name of Jesus Christ our Savior. Amen.

Conference Treasurer (CC)

I would like to thank everyone in the Conference and staff who have made my transition to this new role an enjoyable and fulfilling experience. I am especially grateful to Rev. Wayne DeHart for his interim leadership and assistance with my transition and I wish him the best in his well deserved retirement after years of service to the Conference.

Many of the details involved with the 2010 financial performance for the Conference can be found in the Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) report. I am thankful for Charlie Moore's leadership and the time that was devoted this year by all members of the CFA, Connectional Giving Committee and Building Committee in conducting the business of the Conference. Their oversight of the finances enables the right steps to be taken to ensure the long-term viability of the Conference and our local churches.

In this report, I would like to lay out the seven areas of focus that guide the stewardship efforts of the Conference. The focus in these areas will help us optimize mission and ministry opportunities with our combined resources.

Maintain a courageous and forward leaning conference mission that is strengthening congregations and the conference for mission and ministry. As the Conference has become clearer about its mission, to call, equip, send and support spiritual leaders to make disciples and grow Acts 2 congregations for the transformation of the world, financial decisions become clearer. The aspirational focus on the local church and a mission to the greater world has helped congregations recognize the importance and urgency of their apportionment support.

Use technology to save the conference money. The goal is to provide a high quality of service in the most efficient manner with minimal staff and supply expenses. Improving our system interface with the local church is part of this objective.

Take advantage of new Mission Center cost controls. We will focus on accelerating the mortgage payments by making a 13th payment each year. Regular payments will also be made to a reserve fund so that dollars will be available when systems, carpet or furniture need to be replaced. The ability to keep these costs flat over time will be a strong factor in our ability to control increases to apportionments.

Don't spend money without a plan. Our focus is to create high value with the dollars that we spend. Creating a plan before spending Conference dollars is a key process for making sure the results are measurable and effectiveness can be gauged. Steps like this will eliminate the year end urge to spend the remaining budget.

Continue to increase the quality and strength of staff and conference leadership. We will continue to focus our efforts on the staffing and nomination processes to ensure skill requirements are identified and the processes used to fill the positions are robust and capable of finding the right person for the job.

Hold congregations accountable for paying apportionments. Our connectional system demands that we work together to enable the overall strength of the Conference to meet our transformational mission. We have made great strides in sharing this vision as many local congregations have renewed their commitment to pay or work towards paying 100% of their apportionments. The ability to lower the benevolence factor for local churches is tied directly to our ability to increase the apportionment collection rate.

Promote healthy stewardship in congregations. Helping our local churches maintain healthy stewardship is essential to the long-term maintenance of our mission and ministry. A strong apportionment base is also required to support long-term reductions in the benevolence factor for local churches.

In writing these goals this year, I ask for our Conference and our various committees and organizations to hold us accountable for their maintenance. The more we work together towards these common goals, the more viable our outreach will be to our communities and throughout the world.

Board of Trustees Report (CC)

As Trustees of the Baltimore -Washington Conference, our mission of supervision and maintenance is to provide good stewardship over all of the conference properties for the purpose of effective ministry. By doing so, we seek not only to embrace but also to enhance our conference's calling – "to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." To this mission, we are committed and ever seeking to remain faithful.

While it would be difficult to summarize all of the Trustee Board's work, I would like to note some of the board's tasks:

We continued to work with the bishop and Cabinet to improve avenues of communication that would increase workload efficiency and identify conference properties that would be available for sale. Upon the Cabinet's approval, the Trustees took appropriate steps to prepare each property for sale and care for its disposition.

In late February 2010, the Rider Estate in Owings Mills, was sold for \$195,000. The proceeds from the sale, after expenses, were applied to the debt on the Ethel C. Rider Dining Center and the Dorothy L. Ordwein Commons at West River. At the end of February 2010, the Canton United Methodist Church property in Baltimore was sold for \$900,000. The proceeds from the sale, after expenses, are held in trust and made available upon request to the Baltimore Metropolitan District for its mission and ministry needs.

On Aug. 31, the Western Region's Cumberland-Hagerstown District parsonage in Williamsport was sold for \$192,500. The proceeds from the sale, after expenses, are used to fund our district superintendents' housing allowances per Baltimore-Washington Conference policy.

On Dec. 30, the Calvary-Casa del Pueblo United Methodist Church's parsonage in Washington, D.C., was sold. The proceeds from the \$450,000 sale, after expenses, are held in trust and upon request made available to the Greater Washington District for its mission and ministry needs.

The Trustees continue to work diligently toward the sale of the Dover United Methodist Church property in Reisterstown, and the Keys Chapel United Methodist Church property in Mt. Airy.

The episcopal residence and the Washington East District's parsonage were inspected. The board is working toward making the necessary repairs and upgrades to both houses that will assure our conference leadership has comfortable and adequate living spaces to call home. This year, at the Washington East District's parsonage, a deck was added; and at the episcopal residence, the water well was moved within the property lines.

Many challenges faced the board over the past 12 months. In the spring of 2010, Sunnyside United Methodist Church in Frederick announced that the congregation had decided to leave the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church and sought ownership of its property. Working along with our bishop, our Cabinet and legal counsel, the Trustees resolved to preserve and protect the "trust clause" of The United Methodist Church's Book of Discipline. To that end, the board remained steadfast and successful.

The number of church closures also demanded the board's attention and care. With the discontinuance or closure or abandonment of a church, by Discipline, the Trustees assumed responsibility for the church's assets, records, buildings and land as well as its disposition. By Jan. 1, 2010, Ames-Sudbrook United Methodist Church in Pikeville, was discontinued; on July 1, 2010, Calvary-Casa del Pueblo United Methodist Church in Washington, D.C., Living Springs Christian Fellowship of the United Methodist Church in Bowie, Olive Branch-Good Shepherd United Methodist Church and Strawbridge United Methodist Church in Baltimore were discontinued; and on December 31, 2010, Monroe Street United Methodist Church in Baltimore was discontinued.

The leased space for the Living Springs Christian Fellowship in Bowie has been subleased to Bethel Christian Church for the remainder of the lease term in the business park. The Ames-Sudbrook United Methodist Church property is now the home for the St. Paul United Methodist Church of West Saratoga Street in Baltimore. With a request from the Baltimore Metropolitan District to consider this missional move of the St. Paul's church to Pikeville, in order to facilitate greater ministry and mission, the Trustees were honored to share in this missional ministry opportunity and to see the connectional church at its best.

In August 2010, the Trustees joined in the Ribbon Cutting celebration to open the new Baltimore-Washington Conference Mission Center in Fulton, Maryland. On Oct. 19, board members joined episcopal and denominational leaders, conference staff and leadership as well as many guests in the Consecration Service of the Mission Center. The Trustees are grateful the New Conference Center Building Committee, Turner Construction, Design Collectives, our owner's representative, Jim Truby, and so many more who labored to give life to this vision. We praise God for this wonderful and miraculous deed as well as for the ministry our conference staff and leadership provide in and throughout this sacred space of transformation.

The Board of Trustees continues to provide training at the Regional Leadership Days on the role and responsibilities of local church Trustees as well as to support local churches by being available.

Presently, the Trustees are developing a conference policy to protect and prevent all conference properties from being placed on Historic Preservation/Designation Registry.

I offer my sincere appreciation and thanks to all of the Trustees who faithfully serve. And to the conference office on Finance and Administration, I am profoundly grateful for your cooperation and assistance to the Board of Trustees. Shalom.

Board of Pensions and Benefits (CC)

We seek to be like Christ as we call, equip, send and support spiritual leaders to make and engage disciples in the Adventure and bear Acts 2 fruits.

The Board of Pensions and Health Benefits continues to pursue its goal of enabling clergy and lay staff to accomplish their missions without concern for their long-term financial protection. We continue to position ourselves to face the challenges that lie ahead and to assist clergy and staff in their mission.

Pre-1982 Service: The General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits administers funds for the pre-1982 pension program. We currently contract for a rate of 0.8% of the Conference Average Compensation (CAC). This translates to a Past Service Annuity Rate (PSAR) of \$553 per year of service for 2011.

The 2011 Past Service Rate (PSR) is \$553. The PSR for 2012 shall remain at \$553. Para. 1506.7, grants authority to the annual conference to review the annuity rate for Pre-82 service and to adjust the PSR rate as appropriate taking into consideration the changes in the economy.

Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP): The General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits actuarial valuation for MPP Annuities as of January 1, 2009, showed an unfunded plan liability of 91%. To fully fund this plan, all Plan Sponsor Groups have a shortfall to meet in 2011. BWC contributions will be cared for by reserves. Monies previously contributed to MPP will continue to be held in individual participant accounts.

Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) Funding: The Baltimore-Washington Conference funds the program as follows:

- BWC is required to collect 3% of a participant's plan compensation (salary plus housing) for the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP). CPP provides death and disability benefits for all participants.
- BWC is required to collect an additional 3% of participant's plan compensation (Salary plus housing) to fund the participants Defined Contribution (DC). The Defined Contribution part of the plan is similar to the old MPP where monies accumulate in an individual's personal account. The primary difference is that these contributions are not limited by the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC).
- The Defined Benefit (DB) portion of the plan provides for a guaranteed benefit at retirement. (That benefit would be equal to 1.25% of the DAC at the time of retirement times the number of years of service). In order to ensure that this benefit will be fully funded, the Annual Conference is required to make an additional payment for the Defined Benefit. Because the DB is the same for all retirees and tied to the DAC, BWC shall collect 12% of each participant's plan compensation limited by the DAC. The reason for this is that all full-time clergy for the years 2006 and forward received the same Defined Benefit based on the number of years of service after January 1, 2007. Part-time pastors received a DB based on their percentage equivalent of a full-time appointment.

HealthFlex: As health care costs continue to rise, the Conference Board of Pension and Health Benefits and the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits, have been working diligently on identifying funding in order to continue providing our Retiree's Supplemental Medical coverage. There will **not** be any changes made to the Retiree Medical Plan in 2012. However, we anticipate a change in the plan offering and funding structure from the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits beginning in 2013. Alternative measures have been approved by the CBOP that will help balance the conference's liabilities, (for Supplemental Insurance premiums) which remain exceedingly high, with lower investment returns that have reduced our reserves.

Further, the Board strongly recommends that all clergy of the Conference participate in Social Security since eligibility for Medicare is dependent on Social Security contributions, and our retiree plan for HealthFlex is a Medicare Supplement. If a clergy member elects not to participate in Social Security and is therefore ineligible for Medicare, HealthFlex will not pay what Medicare would have paid.

Arrearages: Medical and Pension debts reached an all-time high during 2010. In order to remedy this situation, the Cabinet and Arrearage Committee adopted a new policy that went into effect in September 2010. This new practice provides for a closer working relationship between the Conference Guides and church officials. The goal is to identify a specific payment plan for past debt that would eliminate the arrearage while simultaneously enabling the church to stay up to date with current invoices. If there is no plan in place or if a church is unable to identify a joint solution, there would be a formal recommendation for a change in appointment; a change in church alignment; church merger/closing, or reduction in pastor salary that would be forwarded to the Cabinet. After three months in operation and as of December 31, 2010, there has been progress and reduction to the overall debt. We will continue to be diligent and work with those churches that require our assistance.

Final Comments: The Baltimore-Washington Conference thanks Frances Tagoe, Benefits Administrator, for her enthusiastic and professional work on behalf of our participants and the board. She effectively communicates and administers the benefits based on plan rules and regulations, the Book of Discipline, the conference's policies and procedures, and all applicable state and federal laws so that there is an understanding of the benefits for our clergy and lay employees. It is her goal and the board's goal to continue to provide the best possible benefits package for our plan participants, while maintaining the utmost care for and fiduciary responsibility to you, the plan participants, and those in the Baltimore-Washington Conference for whom we owe the same. We wish to also give thanks to Nancy McCarthy, Benefits Assistant, Pier McPayten, Controller, and the Guides and the district superintendents who all support the work we do.

Stewardship Center and Foundations (CC)

Mid-Atlantic United Methodist Foundation, Inc.

Investment management, endowments, stewardship education, charitable gift annuities, and planned giving advice are some of the many services available for local churches and agencies through the Mid-Atlantic United Methodist Foundation, Inc. The Foundation is an independent 501(c) nonprofit investment corporation established on July 1, 2010, by merger of the United Methodist Stewardship Foundation of the Baltimore-Washington Conference and the Eastern-Pennsylvania –Peninsula United Methodist Foundation. The merger was approved by their respective Board of Directors on May 5, 2010, and May 13, 2010. The Mid-Atlantic United Methodist Foundation serves the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference, Peninsula-Delaware Conference, and the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

The ministry of the Mid-Atlantic United Methodist Foundation focuses on being the primary resource for each Conference in five areas:

- 1) Investing long-term assets on behalf of United Methodist churches and agencies.
- 2) Leadership on the creation, management and governance of endowment funds.
- 3) Assistance for individuals in planning gifts through donations, wills or trusts.
- 4) Comprehensive stewardship educational programs and materials.
- 5) Conference leadership training in financial education and fiscal responsibility.

The Foundation advises individual churches/agencies on the process of establishing endowment funds, stewardship programs, charitable gift annuity programs, and writing investment management policies. This process can often include creating and writing both endowment and investment policies with the church. Additional support is given by conducting seminars and sermons at both the district and church level in investment education, trust and estate planning, planned giving, fiduciary responsibilities, and the overall importance of stewardship in funding ministry.

One hundred percent of assets invested by the church with the Foundation's Investment Advisors are managed according to the Social Principles of the Book of Discipline. The Foundation's board of directors is comprised of both clergy and lay members of all three Annual Conferences.

Commission on Archives and History (CC)

The archives of the Baltimore–Washington Conference, a valuable historical resource, are housed at the Lovely Lane Museum and Archives in Baltimore. Researchers and visitors are welcome Thursday and Friday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and by appointment. James E. Reaves, director of Archives and History, Wanda B. Hall, assistant archivist, and the Rev. Edwin Schell, executive secretary, emeritus, of the United Methodist Historical Society provide assistance with research questions and other needs. Archives and History supports the conference's efforts to make disciples of Jesus Christ by maintaining and making available the rich evidence of its United Methodist heritage of worship, fellowship, stewardship, Christian education, service and faith sharing.

Accomplishments: The Museum and Archives continue to be involved in the Greater Baltimore History Alliance and other locally focused historical organizations.

As of Dec. 15, 2010, archives staff processed 512 telephone, e-mail and postal mail inquiries and hosted 68 researchers. The researchers included students, genealogists, church historians, pastors, seminary students and religious and historical scholars. The Lovely Lane Museum welcomed more than 1,135 visitors from Jan. 1 through Dec. 15, 2010.

Archives staff and volunteers continue the ongoing active church history files reviewing and reorganizing project. Previously initiated projects inventorying archival materials are continuing, as is the reorganization of the library.

A project reviewing and organizing Charge Conference records from the 1980s and 1990s is progressing. These records are rich in material relating to local churches, including publications, blueprints for construction projects, worship bulletins, special event programs and more.

Steps were taken to secure the records of closed churches, according to the Discipline.

Assistant Archivist Wanda Hall has continued her outreach to the local genealogical community by attending meetings representing Lovely Lane Museum and Archives.

The staff continues to serve local churches in the conference by answering church history inquiries and distributing literature on record management and writing local church histories. When requested, an archives staff member will visit a local church to assist with records/archives management or historical questions.

Volunteers: The Museum and Archives volunteers have contributed more than 500 hours of their time to valuable projects including research, assessment and arranging of materials, clipping newspaper articles, filing and sorting materials, building shelves, sweeping, dusting and moving boxes.

Volunteers Elaine Entwhistle, Joan Ford, Dave Hall, Rev. Galen Menne, John and Bill Parrish, Rev. Edwin Schell and Dorothy Shindle greatly contributed to the mission and ministry of the Lovely Lane Museum and Archives with their service. Members of the Baltimore Appliqué Society Marylou McDonald, Eleanor Layman and Margo Cramer continue to assist museum staff with caring for the rare quilts in our collection and selling materials from the 2005 Lovely Lane Quilt Show. During

2010, members of the society, led by Marylou McDonald, hosted private quilt shows for interested individuals and groups, exhibiting the historic quilts in our collection to the public and also raising funds to care for these treasures.

Resources and exhibits: Director James Reaves was interviewed in December 2009 for a segment of *Maryland Morning* on local NPR station WYPR about the Christmas Conference. UMHS Executive Secretary (Emeritus) Rev. Edwin Schell was also interviewed regarding the fire at Cokesbury College in 1795. Originally aired in December 2009, the segment was rebroadcast December 24, 2010.

The Lovely Lane Museum and Archives' main vault had been experiencing problems with minor but unacceptable moisture incursion. This water infiltration was evident because of deposits of efflorescence, a white, powdery mineral substance which are the minerals and salts left after water evaporates. To correct a potentially devastating moisture incursion, a grant from the Patterson Foundation was secured by commission chairperson Rev. Emora Brannan, supplemented by Historical Society funds. With the help of an Eagle Scout candidate, the vault was emptied of materials, and then a licensed contractor scraped, treated and sealed the walls, installed a flexible plastic barrier and a commercial dehumidifier. All archival materials were replaced in an organized manner to facilitate finding documents, artifacts and other items held in the collection. These steps will help keep the irreplaceable items in the museum collection safe for future generations of United Methodists.

Annual Conference exhibits celebrating the 250th Anniversary of the arrival of Robert Strawbridge to Maryland and the 225th anniversary of Cokesbury College were prepared and well received.

The original Strawbridge pulpit was returned to the museum after being the centerpiece of a Maryland Historical Society exhibit since 2003.

A memorial exhibit was installed commemorating the life of Bishop James K. Mathews, bishop of the Baltimore Conference 1972-1980, after his death in September 2010.

Church History Contest: The winners for the 2010 Annual Church History Contest are the United Church of Washington, D.C. for Class 1 (under 200 members) and Trinity UMC of Annapolis for Class III (over 500 members). There were not enough entries for a Class II (201-500 members) contest in 2010. John Wesley UMC of Baltimore and Huntingtown UMC of Huntingtown, Md., were both given an Honorable Mention for a Class III church history. All church histories become part of the permanent collection of the Lovely Lane Museum and Archives. We thank all churches who participated.

The Commission on Archives and History encourages every local church to write and publish its history. The staff at Lovely Lane Museum and Archives stands ready to assist local churches in their efforts to document the history of their church.

Request: Director James E. Reaves asks every local church to forward to the Archives items such as bulletins for significant events (church anniversary celebrations, dedication of a new building, etc.), church histories, photo directories and the like to become part of the permanent collection documenting the activities of the local churches in the conference.

United Methodist Historical Society of The Baltimore-Washington Conference

Incorporated in November, 1855, as the “American Methodist Historical Society” (in order to emphasize a pan-Methodist hope that shared history could be a unifying force) the Baltimore society is arguably the oldest in The United Methodist Church and the model for the current national United Methodist Historical Society. For 155 years, through civil and international conflict, economic prosperity and depression, calamitous fire and storm, the Society has faithfully sought to carry out its mission of gathering, preserving and sharing our United Methodist and Pan-Methodist heritage as an instrument for discernment and empowerment for mission and discipleship in the world where Christ has placed the “People called Methodists” who are “one throughout the world” and witnesses together to John Wesley’s final words: “The best of all is that God is with us!”

Accomplishments: On May 2, 2010, the Society sponsored a tour of historic Strawbridge Country in Carroll County, visiting the sites of the first Methodist societies in all of America. This was followed by a delightful luncheon at Westminster United Methodist Church and the holding of the annual meeting of the Society at which officers were elected, recognition of local church histories took place and the members and friends of the Society were treated to an account of the “Battle of Westminster,” which is credited with buying valuable strategic time for the Union Army preliminary to the Battle of Gettysburg in the American Civil War.

Museum expansion: Lovely Lane United Methodist Church: Baltimore City Station, the Mother Church of American Methodism, the gracious and supportive hosts to the Society since 1904 and the original projectors and facilitators of the opening of the Museum in 1954, (at the Society’s centennial) have made available additional display space in the Asbury Room, adjacent to the Edwin Schell Reading Room. Provision of improved lighting, painting and new display spaces have required immense amounts of time, dedicated and patient labor by staff and volunteers, and financial commitment. This is still a work in progress, but visitors will find the new arrangements refreshing and more user-friendly.

Outreach: The Society made available an assortment of artifacts from its collection for use at the 2009 session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference held in Baltimore in June. This was the 224th annual session of the Conference (the oldest in the entire denomination). Christmas of 2009 also marked the 225th anniversary of the “Christmas Conference” at which the Methodist Episcopal Church in America was founded, the first independent Methodist denomination to be organized anywhere in the world.

A new brochure was designed and printed advertising the work and contents of the museum and encouraging tourists and others to discover and recover our heritage. Exhibits were mounted and shared at the sessions of the Annual Conference in June 2010. Thousands of visitors from local churches – especially confirmation classes – both in the Baltimore-Washington Conference and beyond, from every part of the United States, and around the globe have shared the museum exhibits and frequently have also worshipped at Lovely Lane Church. The collections, as well as the archives of the conference, and the extensive research library have been utilized by numerous scholars of secondary, collegiate and graduate levels. Prior to the session of conference, a delegation of visitors from Korea gathered for a time of worship, food and fellowship at Lovely Lane. As part of that program, the president of the Society shared a paper on the role of an earlier president of the same body, John Franklin Goucher, and his wife, Mary Fisher Goucher, in the opening of Methodist mission work in Korea.

Personnel: The Historical Society works in close cooperation with the Conference Commission on Archives and History. The Board of Directors of the Society usually meet concurrently with the CAH, and the president of the Society serves as chair of the Commission. The Director of Archives, James Reaves, and associate director, Wanda Hall, are invaluable to the ministry of the museum and to both the CAH and UMHS. Executive Secretary, emeritus, the Rev. Edwin Schell, a long-time leader in American and worldwide Methodist historical studies, continues – despite personal and family health challenges – to be present at the museum on a regular basis and is actively engaged in significant research and writing projects. A cadre of faithful volunteers also add to the hands-on work of the Society and Archives.

Challenges: Like every other aspect of the conference’s life, the historical endeavors are suffering from the mandated reduction of funds which has threatened to reduce the staff to a level that would severely compromise the ministry and mission of the CAH. The Historical Society, despite its own limited resources, has committed itself to maintaining this work. For example, Life Members have been asked to contribute to a special fund for staff salaries in an attempt to continue the work of the Archives and Museum. In addition to these basic program operational needs, significant capital challenges have arisen with water penetration and humidity level in the archival vault. These are crises which must be addressed.

A challenge to all readers of this report: Fundamentally, the Society exists and carries on its mission supported by the membership of concerned United Methodists. If you are not a member of the Society, you should be. Why is it that every member of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, both clergy and lay members, is not a member of your United Methodist Historical Society? Join today.

The proposed budget of \$18,484,406 shall be adopted for 2012, including an apportionment income budget of \$15,154,223. This represents an increase of 2.4% in the apportionment asking over the 2011 budget. (The collection rate assumption for 2012 is set at 91.0%).

The Benevolence Factor (BF) target for 2012 shall be 18.0%.

As required by The Book of Discipline, the ratio for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be set as follows: 33% for World Services and 67% for Conference Benevolences and other General Church Benevolences, with fine adjustments being made between Conference sessions by CFA.

The selection of an independent auditor to audit the Conference Treasurer's financial records for 2011 is pending the results of a multiple vendor Request for Proposal (RFP). The Audit Committee will complete the process in time for the selection to be announced at Annual Conference. *Note: CFA selected Ellin and Tucker of Baltimore as auditors.*

The date for the closing of the 2011 books shall be set at 17 January 2012, with all payments to be received by the Treasurer's office not later than 17 January 2012.

The Baltimore-Washington Conference grants authority to the Council on Finance and Administration, in consultation with the Bishop, to act on financial matters between sessions of the annual Conference.

Recommendation from Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits

Any people appointed or hired after December 31, 2011, would be eligible for Conference-funded retiree medical insurance only if they pay 100% of the premium. *Note: Conference voted to refer this proposal as amended to the Board of Pensions for further study. The Board of Pensions will report back to the Annual Conference when it gathers in 2012.*

1. The CRSP Defined Benefit rate shall remain 12.0% of the participant's Plan Compensation limited by the DAC.
2. The CRSP Defined Contribution rate shall remain 3.0% of the participant's Plan Compensation.
3. The CPP contribution rate shall remain 3.0% of the participant's Plan Compensation.
4. The CRSP and CPP contributions shall be paid monthly to the annual conference by the church or other salary paying unit.
5. That in accordance with paragraph (e) of Supplement One, the surviving spouse benefit shall continue to be 85% of the participant's formula.
6. That the special grants for Marguerite Hall, Madelyn Hoffman, Dallas Beall, and Grace Jones be continued.
7. **Pre-1982 Service – Past Service Rate (PSR):** The Annual Conference shall approve the following pre-1982 prior service funding plan in compliance with the Disciplinary requirement listed in ¶1506.8:

The 2011 Past Service Rate (PSR) is \$553. The PSR for 2012 shall remain at \$553. Para. 1506.7, grants authority to the annual conference to review the annuity rate for Pre-82 service and to adjust the PSR rate as appropriate taking into consideration the changes in the economy.

For the past several years, the Conference Average Compensation (CAC) has increased by an average of almost 4% per year, and we expect that pattern to continue. The PSR will automatically increase to the amount needed to maintain the minimum of 0.8% of the CAC.

8. The Annual Conference shall approve the following pre-1982 prior service funding plan in compliance with the Disciplinary requirement listed in ¶1506.8: As of January 1, 2010, the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits' actuarial valuation of the plan for the Conference shows a significant drop in assets vs. benefit obligations.*

The funding plan as of January 1, 2010 for 2012 is summarized below.

9. The following resolution, as required for IRS compliance, shall be approved:

Resolutions Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Clergypersons of the Baltimore-Washington Conference

The Baltimore-Washington Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental/housing allowances for active, retired, or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination know as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through

ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church (“clergypersons”);

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental/housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to active, retired and disabled clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired and disabled clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental/housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church (the Discipline), which includes all such payments from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits (“GBOPHB”), during the years **2011-2012** by each active, retired, or disabled clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental/housing allowance for each such clergyperson; and

THAT the pension or disability payments to which this rental/housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities or funds authorized under the Discipline, including such payments from the GBOPHB and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a GBOPHB plan, annuity or fund authorized under the Discipline, that result from any service a clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired or disabled clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity or fund for such active, retired, or disabled clergyperson’s pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance that may be excluded from a clergyperson’s gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the least of: (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the clergyperson’s employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the clergyperson to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

RESOLUTIONS TO THE CONFERENCE

A Resolution Allowing a Pastoral Response to Requests for Same-Gender Marriages and Civil Unions

WHEREAS The Book of Discipline prohibits the celebration of same-gender marriages and civil unions in our churches and by our clergy; and

WHEREAS several civil jurisdictions in the United States, including the District of Columbia, now permit same-gender marriages or civil unions;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Baltimore-Washington Conference adopts the following resolution and recommends it to the General Conference of 2012 as an amendment to The Book of Discipline.

Suggested Title: Celebration of Same Gender Marriages or Civil Unions where Allowed by Governmental Jurisdictions

Discipline Paragraph or Resolution Number: 341.6

General Church Budget Implications: None

Global Implications: Yes

It is Resolved that Paragraph 341.6 (Page 253) is amended by adding the underlined sentence appearing below:

“Ceremonies that celebrate homosexual unions shall not be conducted by our ministers and shall not be conducted in our churches. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in those civil jurisdictions where homosexual persons have been granted the right to same gender marriage or civil union, ceremonies celebrating those marriages or unions may be conducted in our churches and by our ministers, the decision being the right and responsibility of the pastor.”

The rationale for this amendment:

1. In a democratic society civil authorities define the civil rights of citizens. The Book of Discipline establishes two United Methodist principles relating to the rights of homosexual persons.
 - First, we declare that “All persons, regardless of age, gender, marital status, or sexual orientation, are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured and to be protected against violence.” (Para 161.F, Page 103.)
 - Second, we further declare that “Certain basic human rights and civil liberties are due all persons...(and that) We are committed to supporting those rights and liberties for all persons, regardless of sexual orientation.” (Para. 162.j, Page 111)

As several civil jurisdictions have granted the right of marriage or civil union to same-gender couples, there is a conflict between the United Methodist principles of supporting the civil and human rights of all and our prohibition on doing so in regard to celebrating marriages or civil unions. The amendment will eliminate that conflict. Further, the amendment acknowledges the sanctity of a marriage or civil union that expresses a couple’s mutual love, support, personal commitment and shared fidelity. Finally, the amendment allows the Church to take a stand for the protection against those who would do violence to same-gender couples.

2. Many same gender couples live with anxiety and fear arising from the fear that health authorities will not allow them the same access and consultation during health emergencies, that the mutual control of their finances and legal arrangements be challenged in the event of emergency or death, and that their commitments to mutual care and guardianship over the length of their lives be ultimately dismissed. These are fears that society has relieved for heterosexual persons through the legal status of marriage.
 - *The Book of Discipline* proclaims, “We see a clear issue of simple justice in protecting the rightful claims where people have shared material resources, pensions, guardian relationships, mutual powers of attorney, and other such lawful claims typically attendant to contractual relationships that involve shared contributions, responsibilities and liabilities, and equal protection before the law.” (Para. 162.j, Page 111-112) Experience has clearly demonstrated that these just protections are assured only through a legally established marriage or civil union.

The amendment provides The United Methodist Church with a method by which it can live up to its commitments to ensure justice and relieve the anxiety and fear of those who have made mutual life commitments to each other.

3. The discretion of the pastor in conducting marriage ceremonies is retained. The Book of Discipline provides that “The decision to perform the ceremony shall be the right and responsibility of the pastor.” (Para 340.(3)(a), Page 251)

While there is a broadening of a pastor’s ability to respond to the pastoral needs of his/her members, there is no change in the pastoral discretion when deciding the nature of the pastoral care needed in the local congregation or community. Specifically, the word “may” does not convey an obligation or duty.

4. While some may object to the amendment’s introduction of diversity in the way marriages are performed in The United Methodist Church, there is already a precedent that allows the Central Conferences to respond to the different marriage laws of countries outside the United States.
 - *The Book of Discipline* provides that “A Central Conference shall have the power to conform the detailed rules, rites, and ceremonies for the solemnization of marriage to the statute laws of the country or countries within its jurisdiction.” (Para 543.14, P. 347)

The amendment adopts a solution that the General Conference has already adopted when considering the diversity of marriage laws in non-US jurisdictions.

Proposed Resolution: Aligning UMC Investments with Resolution on Israel and Palestine

WHEREAS Palestinian Christians have implored Christians everywhere to put actions behind their words to end Israel's occupation of Palestinian land, which is destroying their lives;¹ and

WHEREAS, although The United Methodist Church (UMC) has long opposed the occupation, UMC boards and agencies still hold stock in companies that sustain it;² and

WHEREAS the United Methodist General Conference in 1996 declared that "continuing efforts by the State of Israel to build settlements in the occupied territories violate both international law and the spirit of the Declaration of Principles (the Oslo peace process)"³ and

WHEREAS the 2004 General Conference approved a resolution opposing "confiscation of Palestinian land, ... the continued building of illegal Jewish settlements, and any vision of a 'Greater Israel' that includes the occupied territories and the whole of Jerusalem and its surroundings;"⁴ and

WHEREAS The UMC Book of Discipline discourages investment in companies "that directly or indirectly support the violation of human rights" (§716);⁵ and

WHEREAS Palestinian human rights are violated by companies that sustain illegal settlements, segregated roads, checkpoints, the separation wall, home demolitions and other realities of the occupation; and

WHEREAS researchers with the General Boards of Global Ministries and Church and Society, several annual conferences, and ecumenical partners have identified a limited number of U.S. and international companies in the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits (GBOPHB) portfolio that sustain Israel's occupation;² and

WHEREAS United Methodists have engaged Caterpillar, Motorola and Hewlett Packard on this issue for years and have asked them to end their involvement with the occupation; and

WHEREAS the Book of Discipline requires consideration of divestment when companies do not respond to corporate engagement with changed practices (§716);⁵ and

WHEREAS, at the October 2010 Socially Responsible Investing (SRI) Summit, the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits stated that SRI measures it has employed in the past, including screening and divestment, have not violated the board's fiduciary responsibility to beneficiaries; and

WHEREAS divestment is not aimed at Israel itself, but at the occupation of land beyond its

internationally recognized borders; as a non-violent moral action, divestment seeks to strengthen the church's support for the peoples of Israel and Palestine, whose future can only be secured through a just peace; and

WHEREAS many faith groups and organizations around the world have already divested or publicly support divestment;⁶ and

WHEREAS all United Methodist mission personnel who have served in the Holy Land since the 1990s support divestment; and

WHEREAS the church should lead with prophetic action by publicly and promptly aligning its investments with long-standing church policies opposing the Israeli occupation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that, following the teachings of Jesus Christ and supported by people of every faith, the General Conference calls for the United Methodist Church to end its financial involvement in Israel's occupation by divesting from companies that sustain the occupation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the General Conference of The United Methodist Church: instructs the United Methodist General agencies, including the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits, to divest promptly from Caterpillar, Motorola and Hewlett Packard, which have been engaged repeatedly by United Methodist agencies and annual conferences on this issue, until these companies end their involvement in the Israeli occupation; and calls for the United Methodist General agencies to immediately engage with other companies in their portfolios that have been identified by researchers at the United Methodist agencies and annual conferences as being involved in the occupation.² If these companies do not change their involvement within two years, they should be removed from United Methodist portfolios; and requires the GBOPHB to provide updates on its website regarding the process of corporate engagement with and/or divestment from companies that support the Israeli occupation; and directs the GBOPHB to provide a report to the 2016 General Conference regarding its progress toward complying with this resolution; and calls on United Methodist boards and agencies, annual conferences, local churches and individuals to prayerfully consider corporate involvement in Israel's occupation when making investment decisions; and encourages United Methodists to partner with Jews, Christians, Muslims and other people of conscience working for corporate accountability, human rights and an end to the occupation.

The 2012 General Conference directs the following:

¶ 357 of the 2008 Discipline is amended as follows:

¶ 357. Incapacity Health Leave Resulting From Health Matters and Disabling Conditions

1. When clergy who are members of an annual conference (¶ 369) are unable to perform their ministerial work because of ~~incapacity due to health matters and disabling conditions~~, upon recommendations of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry and the conference board of pensions, and by a majority vote of the executive session of clergy members in full connection with the annual conference who are present and voting, they may be granted annual ~~incapacity~~ health leave without losing their relationship to the annual conference; provided, however, that such leave may be granted or renewed upon reasonable and appropriate investigation of the case by the joint committee on ~~incapacity clergy health leave~~ of the annual conference, or the party responsible for managing the ~~incapacity clergy health leaves of clergy~~ in accordance with the annual conference’s policies, which will report its findings to the conference Board of Ordained Ministry and the conference Board of Pensions. This relationship may be initiated by the clergy member or Cabinet with or without the consent of the clergy member through the Board of Ordained Ministry. When ~~incapacity~~ health leave is given without the clergy member’s consent, reasonable accommodation shall be offered whenever possible. When a clergy member is granted ~~incapacity~~ health leave by the annual conference, if the medical evidence has not yet met the standards for the receipt of benefits as set forth in the Comprehensive Protection Plan, section 5.04, the conference board of pensions may authorize payment of the benefits in the amount that would otherwise be payable from the Comprehensive Protection Plan. The payments shall be made by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits as a charge to the annual conference granting the ~~incapacity~~ health leave. If payments from the Comprehensive Protection Plan are subsequently approved, the annual conference will be reimbursed for benefits already paid, not to exceed the amount otherwise payable from the Comprehensive Protection Plan. Each ~~incapacity~~ health leave granted by the annual conference shall be recorded in the conference minutes.

2. When clergy who are members of an annual conference are unable to perform their ministerial work between sessions of the annual conference on account of health matters ~~and disabling conditions~~, with the approval of a majority of the district superintendents, after consultation with the executive committee of the conference Board of Ordained Ministry and the executive committee of the conference board of pensions, ~~an incapacity~~ health leave may be granted by the bishop for the remainder of the conference year; provided, however, that such leave may be granted upon reasonable and appropriate investigation of the case including accommodation provisions by the joint committee

on ~~incapacity clergy health leave~~ of the annual conference, or the party responsible for managing the ~~incapacity clergy health leaves~~ of clergy in accordance with the annual conference's policies, which will report its findings to the conference Board of Ordained Ministry and the conference board of pensions. When a clergy member is granted ~~incapacity health~~ leave by the bishop, if the medical evidence has not yet met the standards for receipt of benefits as set forth in the Comprehensive Protection Plan, section 5.04, the conference board of pensions may authorize payment of the benefits in the amount that would otherwise be payable from the Comprehensive Protection Plan. The payments shall be made by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits as a charge to the annual conference granting the ~~incapacity health~~ leave. If payments from the Comprehensive Protection Plan are subsequently approved, the annual conference will be reimbursed for benefits already paid, not to exceed the amount otherwise payable from the Comprehensive Protection Plan.

3. When clergy members on ~~incapacity health~~ leave provide medical evidence that they have recovered sufficiently to resume ministerial work, or are able to return through reasonable accommodation, they may receive an appointment from a bishop between sessions of the annual conference, thereby terminating the ~~incapacity health~~ leave. Such appointment shall be reported immediately by the Cabinet to the conference board of pensions and to the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. Such termination of leave, together with the effective date, shall also be recorded in the minutes of the annual conference at its next regular session.

4. A person under consideration for ~~incapacity health~~ leave shall have the right to appear before the joint committee on ~~incapacity clergy health leave~~ and ~~or~~ to designate someone to meet with the committee on his or her behalf. In the event of unresolved issues, a person under consideration may appeal to the conference Board of Ordained Ministry. Access to independent advocacy and consultation will be made available to the person experiencing unresolved issues, denied health leave or placed on health leave without consent.

5. Any person eligible to receive an appointment from a bishop may not be placed on health leave solely because of a disability. All reasonable accommodations should be made to enable qualified clergy with disabilities to serve in ministry settings compatible with their gifts and graces. (See 2008 Book of Resolutions, No. 3002)

¶ 652 of the 2008 Discipline is amended as follows:

¶ 652. Each annual conference shall establish a procedure by which it will manage ~~incapacity of clergy health leaves~~. The annual conference may establish a joint committee on ~~incapacity clergy health leave~~. If the annual conference establishes such a committee, it should be composed of at least two representatives each from the Board of Ordained Ministry and the conference board of pensions, who may be elected by those boards at the beginning of each quadrennium and at other times when vacancies occur, and a district superintendent appointed from time to time by the bishop to represent the Cabinet. The joint committee shall be encouraged to include in its composition a person with a disability, preferably someone under appointment. Unless and until other members are elected, the chairperson and registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the chairperson and secretary of the conference board of pensions, or others designated by them, shall be authorized to represent their respective boards. The committee shall organize at the beginning of each quadrennium by the election of a chairperson and a secretary. If the annual conference does not establish a joint committee, the annual

conference's established policy and process for managing ~~incapacity~~ clergy health leave nonetheless should involve the Board of Ordained Ministry, the conference board of pensions and representation from the Cabinet.

The duties of the annual conference, with respect to ~~incapacity~~ health leave, or the joint committee on ~~incapacity~~ clergy health leave, or its equivalent, shall be:

- a. To study the problems of ~~incapacity~~ related to health and wellness of clergy in the annual conference.
- b. To provide for a continuing personal ministry to any ~~disabled clergy~~ on health leave of the conference and to aid them in maintaining fellowship with the members of the conference.
- c. To provide advice and support to and, where appropriate advocacy for, clergy on ~~incapacity~~ health leave in (i) applying for and securing disability benefits from the Comprehensive Protection Plan and government programs, (ii) exploring possible sources of interim financial assistance before disability benefits can be obtained, and (iii) establishing rehabilitation and return-to-service programs, and (iv) assessing the need for and providing reasonable accommodations.
- d. To make recommendations to the Board of Ordained Ministry, the conference board of pensions, and the Cabinet on matters related to clergy ~~incapacity~~-health leave concerns, including steps for ~~the prevention of the need for health leave~~; ~~incapacity~~ health leave; benefits; grants or other assistance; and programs of rehabilitation.
- e. To cooperate with and give assistance to the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits in its administration of the Clergy Retirement Security Program, the Comprehensive Protection Plan and other benefit plans for clergy on ~~incapacity~~ health leave, and to the extent applicable assist with the disability benefits and other benefits provided under those plans.

All references to "joint committee on incapacity" in the Discipline are changed to "joint committee on clergy health leave."

Rationale for change of language: The term "incapacity" when describing a clergy person who is in need of a health-related leave denotes a lack of ability and/or eligibility yet the need of a clergy person to take such a leave from an appointment for reasons of health and wellness does not mean one is inherently or permanently incapable of serving the church. The United Methodist Church has a vital interest in recognizing and nurturing all persons who have been ordained and commissioned for ministry, and cannot afford to waste the gifts and graces of any person eligible to receive an appointment by a bishop. Eligibility should not be determined solely by the presence of a disability.

Rationale for change of process: Often clergy in the process or on "incapacity" (health) leave feel abandoned by their conference and have difficulty fitting into an appropriate status in the Church. There is a need for an expanded due process providing opportunity for those persons to be heard. An important theological basis for ministry is that "ordained persons exercise their ministry in covenant with all Christians ... [and] also live in covenant of mutual care and accountability with all those who share their ordination, especially in The United Methodist Church, with the ordained who are members of the same annual conference and part of the same Order." (§ 303.3).

Suggested Title: Remove condemnatory language on homosexuality

Amend ¶161F as follows:

F) Human Sexuality—We affirm that sexuality is God’s good gift to all persons. We call everyone to responsible stewardship of this sacred gift.

Although all persons are sexual beings whether or not they are married, sexual relations are affirmed only within the covenant of monogamous, heterosexual marriage.

We deplore all forms of the commercialization, abuse and exploitation of sex. We call for strict global enforcement of laws prohibiting the sexual exploitation of children and for adequate protection, guidance, and counseling for abused children. All persons, regardless of age, gender, marital status, or sexual orientation, are entitled to have their human and civil rights ensured and to be protected against violence. The Church should support the family in providing age-appropriate education regarding sexuality to children, youth, and adults.

We affirm that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God. All persons need the ministry of the Church in their struggles for human fulfillment, as well as the spiritual and emotional care of a fellowship that enables reconciling relationships with God, with others, and with self. ~~The United Methodist Church does not condone the practice of homosexuality and considers this practice incompatible with Christian teaching.~~ We affirm that God’s grace is available to all. We will seek to live together in Christian community, welcoming, forgiving, and loving one another, as Christ has loved and accepted us. We implore families and churches not to reject or condemn lesbian and gay members and friends. We commit ourselves to be in ministry for and with all persons.

Rationale:

This judgmental, condemnatory language is in conflict with the present state of scientific knowledge and societal acceptance. Such language puts United Methodism at odds with the positions of other denominations most closely related to it and with the emerging ecumenical consensus. Most important, this language is manifestly unchristian.

Resolution Regarding our Unified Christian Witness to the World

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church has a longstanding dual identity as an evangelical church that emphasizes the conversion of the heart and a socially active church that promotes the extension of social justice to all humanity and creation.

AND WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church is a connectional church whose congregations and members are joined together in a corporate Christian witness regardless of geography, race and theological perspective.

AND WHEREAS, for several decades the United Methodist Church has been defined by arguments regarding homosexuality and efforts to change our theological stance regarding this behavior.

AND WHEREAS, the issue of homosexuality has been vehemently debated by non-United Methodist groups in the United States on both sides of the issue; as evidenced by the protests by Westboro Baptist Church at numerous public funerals and by the smashing of a Communion chalice by Soulforce in Pittsburgh, Pa., at the 2004 General Conference of our own denomination.

AND WHEREAS, this issue has been vehemently debated within our denomination as evidenced by our own conference where the salvation and faith of those who wish to change the Book of Discipline has been called into question, and those who support the Discipline have been compared to racists.

AND WHEREAS, our ongoing conflicts over homosexuality have defined us as a church in perpetual conflict, have hindered us from addressing other spiritual and social issues particularly those relating to racial equality, have discouraged our clergy and laity and have even rendered us unable to offer a corporate ministry to the homosexual population.

AND WHEREAS, said conflicts have caused United Methodists across the theological and political spectrum to seriously question their loyalty to our denomination.

BE IT RESOLVED that the 2012 General Conference of the United Methodist Church shall appoint a Task Force to create an Amendment to our Constitution, which would give guidance and clarification regarding ministry to the homosexual population within the parameters of: our desire to welcome homosexual persons seeking Christ into our churches, our current disciplinary standards and social principles regarding homosexuality, and our commitment to social justice for homosexual persons.

Rationale, there are many different voices and concerns that need to be heard regarding this sensitive subject. Unfortunately, the debate is driven too much by special interest groups and those with extreme agendas on both sides. The making of a Constitutional Amendment would force us to seek a solution which speaks to a greater extent for The United Methodist Church as a whole, since in order for it to pass such an amendment would require the support of two-thirds of the delegates to our various annual conferences.

Resolution Concerning Usury

In the summer of 2009, the 17 member organizations of the Metro Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF) launched the 10% is Enough Anti-Usury Campaign. The purpose of this campaign was to take a firm stand for economic justice by calling for a banking industry cap on interest rates at 10% – a level that prevailed prior to interest rate deregulation in 1980 (see www.10percentisenough.org for more information).

Capping interest rates is critical because financial institutions are legally stripping wealth from ordinary Americans through usurious interest rates and fees on various financial instruments. These include credit cards (30%+), payday loans (300%+), rapid refund tax anticipation loans (300%+), check-cashing services, etc. Unfortunately, the new Federal financial reform law explicitly prohibits the new Consumer Protection Agency from capping interest rates.

Central to the 10% Is Enough Campaign is a commitment to encourage states, cities, counties, unions, denominations, churches, universities, foundations, and other institutions to move financial assets from financial institutions that refuse to adopt the 10% is Enough interest rate cap to financial institutions that do comply with the standard.

Our Scriptures are quite clear about the practice of usury. There are numerous references and prohibitions which include:

Exodus 22:25: “If you lend money to my people, to the poor among you, you shall not deal with them as a creditor; you shall not exact interest from them.”

- Psalm 15: “O Lord, who may abide in your tent? Who may dwell on your holy hill? Those who walk blamelessly, and do what is right, and speak the truth from their heart ...; who do not lend money at interest, and do not take a bribe against the innocent. Those who do these things shall never be moved.”
- Proverbs 28: 6-8: “Better to be poor and walk in integrity than to be crooked in one’s ways even though rich. Those who keep the law are wise children, but companions of gluttons disgrace their parents.”

With this biblical witness, and the testimonies of thousands of exploited human beings as our guide:

Be it resolved that the 227th annual session of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church – faithful to John Wesley’s General Rule to do no harm by the giving or taking of things on usury – calls upon the councils, boards, local congregations and affiliated organizations of the Baltimore-Washington Conference to be a counter-voice to usurious practices, and prayerfully consider moving money out of large financial institutions that exploit consumers and move those funds into community banks that practice responsible consumer lending practices.

Be it resolved that CFA shall provide to each Baltimore-Washington [Conference] council, board, local church and affiliated organization, the following list of financial evaluation standards to be used when considering a banking relationship.

We believe that the standards to be used to evaluate financial institutions used by churches and organizations of the Baltimore-Washington Conference should include:

- clearly defined interest rate ceilings or caps (pegged to inflation, unemployment, and other factors);
- reasonable and fully transparent limits on credit card fees and charges;
- no involvement, direct or indirect, in the pay-day-lending industry;
- no involvement, direct or indirect, in the predatory lending industry; and
- no involvement, direct or indirect, in the rapid tax refund industry.

Opposing Immoral Immigration Laws in Maryland

The United Methodist Church affirms the worth, dignity and inherent value and rights of every person regardless of their nationality or legal status. United Methodist churches throughout the United States are urged to build bridges with immigrants in their local communities, to learn from them, celebrate their presence in the United States and recognize and appreciate the contributions in all areas of life that immigrants bring.

The General Conference of The United Methodist has called us to take action in support of our immigrant brothers and sisters. In the Book of Resolutions the church has stated:

In a time when our nation and world are desperate for peace, security and community, people of faith and good will are needed to encourage leadership at home and abroad and, especially, in our churches; and to have the courage to speak up for the newly vulnerable people put at risk in the rush to provide for our own safety. We must remember that God's household is bigger than our own. (The Book of Resolutions of The United Methodist Church 2004. Resolution #265, "Immigrants and Refugees: To Love the Sojourner" (Italics are mine).

And,

[W]e call upon United Methodists to practice hospitality and express our commitment to an inclusive church and society through all our ministries in the spirit of our biblical tradition...(The Book of Resolutions of The United Methodist Church 2004. Resolution #266, "Immigrants in the United States: Ministries of Hospitality, Advocacy, and Justice" (Italics are mine).

The biblical tradition which states that: "When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the foreigner. The foreigner who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the foreigner as yourself, for you were foreigners in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." (Lev. 19:33-34).

Therefore, in response to our biblical and our Wesleyan traditions we urge all people of faith in our conference to oppose any legislation by the Maryland State legislature that would seek to implement laws like Arizona's immoral SB 1070.

Before the passage of the Arizona SB 1070, leadership of the Desert South West Conference advocated against passage of the Bill. They understood that:

1. The stated purpose of the law was the creation of a state-wide immigration policy of "immigration enforcement through attrition." The idea was to make the state and the people of Arizona such an inhospitable and legally difficult state that undocumented migrants would choose not to go to Arizona, and that those that finally made it would choose to

leave. Even if the federal courts had thrown out the whole law, the mere passage of the law has been a success on this account

Although there are no survey data available to indicate just how many immigrants and Hispanic/Latino citizens have left Arizona, there is some significant anecdotal information from the Desert South West churches and agencies that minister with that community, as well as from the Catholic Church, evangelical churches, and other denominations. They all tell stories of undocumented aliens, immigrants with proper documentation, and U.S. citizens alike that have already moved away from Arizona to other states. In some cases, they left to seek work because of the Arizona economy. But the majority cited not the law, but the atmosphere it has created, in which citizen and immigrant alike would become targets, especially children in school.

What church leaders are hearing across the board in Arizona is that immigrant churches have lost up to thirty percent of their members. For a law that claims to address the issue of immigrant crime, especially along the border, it is instructive to note its effect on church-going Christians. Now that the majority of the law has entered into effect, churches are waiting to see how many more Christians leave for other states. It seems that the impact of the law has been broader than expected.

2. The legislation sought to criminalize a whole class of people on the basis of having broken an immigration law. Phoenix Chief of Police Jack Harris points out that many people in the U.S. break laws each day, but that does not make them criminals. Declaring all illegal immigrants criminals goes beyond federal immigration law. The court injunction put this part of the law on hold, on the presumption that it would be stricken down after legal arguments were heard; but in the meantime it would have damaged people by criminalizing them when federal immigration law does not do so.
3. The legislation was ambiguous at the point of making it a crime to “harbor and transport illegal immigrants.” In the amendments made to SB 1070 after its signature by the governor, a clause was inserted exempting child protective services officers and state social workers from prosecution, even though the language of the law referred to people involved in the commission of a crime. This subsequent change puts in doubt whether or not church people involved in ministry could be arrested and have personal and church vehicles impounded and property confiscated, cutting to the heart of the issue of the separation of church and state. This part of the legislation entered into effect on July 29.

These and many other reasons could be given to show that this type of legislation will cause more harm than good in our communities. Therefore, we call upon all United Methodist churches to engage in the following:

- Pray for a change of heart on those advocating the passage of this type of law.
- Commit to have dialogues in local churches about the realities of migration using the resources produced by the General Board of Church and Society, United Methodist Woman, the General Commission on Religion and Race, and the General Board of Global Ministry.
- Advocate for legislation that will uphold the civil and human rights of all migrants in the United States and provide an opportunity to attain legal permanent status to all undocumented migrants who are currently in the United States;
- Denounce and oppose the rise of xenophobic, racist, and violent reactions against migrants in the United States, and to support all efforts to build relationships between people, instead of building walls, between diverse ethnicities and cultures;
- Provide wherever possible pastoral care and crisis intervention to refugees and newly

- arrived migrants, identifying and responding compassionately to their spiritual, material, and legal needs; and,
- Continue the work for the passage of a comprehensive immigration law at the Federal level.

In Support of Our Maryland Immigrant Youth

In the State of Maryland, and as part of our conference, there are thousand of immigrant students who have grown-up in our midst attending our schools and attending our churches, but who are here without documents. These children are our children, the children of the State of Maryland and the Children of the Baltimore Washington Conference. They are yours, mine, and ours; they are God's little ones whom God has called us to protect and to sustain.

In the 2011 legislative session Maryland legislators will be voting on a bill to grant in-state tuition to deserving Maryland high school graduates. This is a vital issue that can have a life altering impact on the future of hundreds of Maryland students. Under the Higher Education - Tuition Charges - Maryland High School Students bill – or the Maryland DREAM Act as it is often called, students that have attended and graduated from Maryland high schools and can show that they or their parents have paid Maryland taxes will be charged in-state tuition like other Maryland students when they attend a community college or 4 year university. As it is now, undocumented students as well as some US Citizens and Permanent residents are considered non-Marylanders and the tuition rate is 3 to 4 times the in-state tuition rate, which makes college out of reach.

Passing this legislation will not cause a drastic change in what our Maryland universities look like. Most of the 10 states that already offer in-state tuition (California, Illinois, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Texas, Utah, Washington, and Wisconsin) recorded less than 300 total students per semester taking advantage of this provision, consistently occupying less than 0.5% of the total student enrollment. In Maryland, it has been estimated that 135 students would be eligible for the program. Most of these students will start in the community college system, which has open enrollment so no spots are at jeopardy for US Citizens. In the four-year college system, these students will be competing on pure merit with any other applicant EXCEPT that they will not be eligible for scholarships or student loans.

The In-state tuition bill will provide hope and unity for families. Making higher education more accessible to all students regardless of immigration status provides hope for and a more certain future. Changing the requirements of in-state tuition would make it so that students who qualify continue working hard and remain motivated because more options will be made available to them. Motivated students are the best way to reduce the societal issues that plague our communities (i.e., teen pregnancy, substance abuse and gangs). When students see a future for themselves, and a possibility of attending college, they are more likely to stay in school and graduate.

Because we believe that the Scriptures calls us to welcome the stranger (Matthew 25:35; Hebrews 13:1-2), we understand that foreigners that who reside in our midst should be treated with equality and love, as God declares in Leviticus: "When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the foreigner. The foreigner who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the foreigner as yourself, for you were foreigners in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God." (Lev. 19:33-34).

Therefore the Baltimore Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church urges the passing of the In-State Tuition bill because:

- It is a way of supporting our children. It will go to benefit the State of Maryland by helping undocumented young people be better prepared to contribute to our communities. These motivated and bright students can go to college instead of the alternative of living in the shadows of society. They can become full participants of the process to make Maryland a better place.

Their going to school will help our economy because these aspiring young professionals will fulfill the shortages of nurses, engineers and other professions. And as their income increases, so do our tax revenues.

Resolution Concerning Promoting Gay Unions/Marriage

WHEREAS, God’s Holy Word, the Scriptures, as contained in the Holy Bible, Old and New Testaments, is given for us to live by, to teach, and to preach; and

WHEREAS, in Scripture, in Leviticus 18:22, we read “You shall not lie with a male as one lies with a female; it is an abomination” And in multiple places in Scriptures homosexuality is referred to as sinful behavior; and

WHEREAS, nowhere in God’s Scripture does God state that He did not mean that which he stated to Moses, and nowhere in Scripture is the practice of homosexuality confirmed as holy or right, and **WHEREAS**, in Scripture, marriage is narrowly defined as the cleaving of husband to wife, and

WHEREAS, Jesus Christ states, as recorded in God’s Holy Scripture, in Matthew 5:17-18, “Do not think that I came to abolish the law, or the prophets: I did not come to abolish but to fulfill. For truly I say unto you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or stroke shall pass from the law, until all is accomplished.” And,

WHEREAS, when joining The United Methodist Church, candidates state “We receive and profess the Christian faith as contained in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments.” And,

WHEREAS, all clergy in the United Methodist faith professed the same faith, and,

WHEREAS, The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, in paragraph 161F, states that The United Methodist Church does not condone homosexuality, and “The practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teaching.” And

WHEREAS, The Book of Discipline, paragraph 341.6, states, “Ceremonies that celebrate homosexual unions shall not be conducted by our ministers and shall not be conducted in our churches” and,

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church by the Book of Discipline paragraph 806.9 is prohibited from supporting financially or otherwise, groups or ministries supporting the homosexual lifestyle,

and

WHEREAS, one of our churches in Washington, D.C., was recently used for the purpose of a rally promoting homosexual unions in Washington, D.C., and the pastor spoke in favor of such unions, urging the Washington D.C. City Council to pass a bill allowing and recognizing such unions. And,

WHEREAS, such actions contradict Scriptures as contained in the Old and New Testaments, and the spirit and intent of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church

Now, THEREFORE, be it resolved that no United Methodist church, church building, or church property, within the Baltimore-Washington Conference be used in any way to promote homosexual unions, and that no clergy person within the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church shall promote homosexual unions within church property or elsewhere.

RATIONALE: Realizing that homosexuality was the main sin mentioned in regards to Sodom and Gomorrah, and that God did not destroy that city, sin did. God only carried the judgment on that city.

Not wishing to destroy The United Methodist Church by sin within, as many other denominations are now experiencing, we must remain true to God, His Only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, and the Scriptures as contained in The Old and New Testaments.

In God's Scriptures, we read in Ezekiel 3:20-21, "Again, when a righteous man turns away from his righteousness and commits iniquity, and I place an obstacle before him, he will die since you have not warned him, he shall die in his sin, and his righteous deeds which he has done shall not be remembered, but his blood I will require at your hand. However, if you have warned the righteous man, that the righteous should not sin and he does not sin, he shall surely live because he took warning; and you have delivered yourself."

Therefore I have no choice, but to warn you, and I have no choice but to warn The United Methodist Church, we can never stray from God's Holy Scripture. We must live by it, and we must teach it, and we must preach it and it only. I do not want you to one day look up from hell, and curse me, saying, "I am here because I, a righteous man, did commit iniquity, and you did not warn me." I took responsibility for your blood on my hands the day I accepted The Lord Jesus Christ as my Savior and Lord and I do not take that responsibility lightly.

Further, the Discipline of The United Methodist Church is the law of the church you now serve. Anyone who deliberately violates the Discipline, has also violated the Oath of Ordination in The United Methodist Church.

WHEREAS, the FBI has determined that the most common time for children, especially teens, to experiment with dangerous behaviors is between 3:30 and 6:30 p.m., after school when they have no parental supervision;

WHEREAS, choices that children, especially teenagers, make can have long term negative consequences especially when experimenting with sex, drugs, alcohol, Internet, and smoking;

WHEREAS, there is more and more discussion about shortening the school week to only four days, which will leave our children even more vulnerable;

WHEREAS, most of the churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church have buildings that are very under-utilized during the week days;

AND WHEREAS, there are many retired members who have a special gift of feeding, loving and tutoring children and are seeking a special mission opportunity within their own churches and towns;

THEREFORE, Let it be resolved that

The Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church encourages every church in the conference to open its doors to children and teens from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m. after school to provide help with homework, show caring for individuals, provide a safe place, and model Christian behavior. This shall be a high priority for each church and be recognized as an essential mission field to help strengthen families in each community.

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MEMOIRS**BISHOP JAMES K. MATHEWS
1913-2010**

James K. Mathews was born Feb. 10, 1913, in Breezewood, Pa., one of eight children born to Laura Mae Wilson Mathews and James Davenport Mathews, an itinerant Methodist preacher.

He received his B.A. from Lincoln Memorial University in Harrogate, Tenn., in 1931, working his way through college as a baker. His brother, Joe, convinced him to enter the clergy. He received his Bachelor of Sacred Theology degree from Biblical Seminary in New York City, then entered Boston University School of Theology, where he studied for his master's degree in theology.

During his first semester, he heard a lecture by Bishop Azariah from South India and decided to become a missionary. He was ordained as a Methodist minister in 1937 and in February, 1938, arrived in Bombay (now Mumbai). As part of his mission work, Mathews mastered several Indian languages, including Marathi, Hindustani, Urdu and eventually, Sanskrit.

In 1939, Mathews traveled to northern India to hear the well-known evangelist E. Stanley Jones lecture. While there, he met Jones' daughter Eunice. The two married on June 1, 1940. They had three children.

In 1942, Mathews enlisted in New Delhi in the United States Army CBI Theater (China-Burma-India) and was appointed First Lieutenant and assigned to the Quartermaster Corps, while Eunice worked for the OSS, the predecessor to the CIA.

After the war, Mathews enrolled in Columbia University under the GI Bill, where he pursued his PhD in theology. His dissertation was on Mahatma Gandhi, whom he had met in India, and who was a close friend of his father-in-law, E. Stanley Jones, whose book "Gandhi: Portrait of a Friend," inspired Martin Luther King to embrace non-violence as the core principle of the Civil Rights movement.

The Mathews returned to the United States in 1946 where he worked for the Methodist Board of Missions in New York City, eventually serving as associate general secretary of the Division of World Missions. He traveled constantly, crossing the Atlantic Ocean 220 times, making more than 60 trips to India, 28 to Africa, 16 to Latin America, and a dozen to Korea and Japan during his lifetime. Throughout his life, Mathews maintained close ties with India.

In 1955, Mathews moved his family to Cambridge, England, for six months, where he researched Mahatma Gandhi's earlier writings. His dissertation on Gandhi was published "The Matchless Weapon: Satyagraha" in 1994. In 2003, 90-year-old Bishop Mathews was invited to discuss Gandhi as the featured guest on Washington Journal on C-SPAN.

Mathews was first elected Bishop of the Methodist Church in 1956 in Lucknow, India; however, he declined, suggesting that Indians should be ministered to by their own people. Four years later he was elected Bishop by the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference in Washington, D.C., and was assigned to the New England Conference.

He served in New England 12 years and in 1972, Mathews was appointed bishop of the Washington, D.C. Area. During the first Bush administration, Bishop Mathews was instrumental in the effort to construct an interdenominational chapel at Camp David. He, along with then Archbishop (later Cardinal) William Baum, created an ecumenical initiative called the Inter-Faith Conference of Metropolitan Washington in 1978, which is now the most widely representative such body in the country. He retired in 1980.

Bishop Mathews was active in the Civil Rights struggles of the 1960s. As early as 1960, he met with Jackie Robinson to discuss growing racial tensions and in 1963, Bishop Mathews joined President Kennedy at the White House to discuss civil rights. He participated in the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom, and was present at Dr. Martin Luther King's "I have a Dream" speech. On Easter Sunday in 1964, he and African-American Bishop Charles Golden were barred from entering an all-white Methodist church in Jackson, Miss. In 1978, Bishop Mathews participated in "The Longest Walk" in Washington, with Mohammad Ali, Vice President Walter Mondale and many other well known names, to draw attention to the plight of Native Americans.

In 1985, Bishop Mathews was called out of retirement to replace Bishop Abel Muzorewa, Methodist bishop of Zimbabwe, who had to flee the country after challenging Prime Minister Robert Mugabe in an election. He served in Harare for a year, and helped to found Africa University. In 1987, he was recalled a second time to form a new area in the Northeastern Jurisdiction and served for two years as bishop of the Albany Area in upstate New York. He finally retired in 1996, 16 years after his first retirement.

In 1995, Bishop Mathews flew to Honolulu on Air Force One with President Clinton to lead ceremonies at Pearl Harbor to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the end of the war and to introduce President Clinton.

He served on a number of boards, including those of American University and Sibley Hospital in Washington, Boston University, and as chairman of the United Methodist Committee on Relief.

Bishop Mathews was the author of nine books, written from 1955 to 2006, including his autobiography/memoir "A Global Odyssey," in 2000. His last is a tribute to his brother Joseph Mathews, "Brother Joe: A 20th Century Apostle."

Survivors include his wife of 70 years, Eunice Mathews; daughters Anne Mathews-Younes of Potomac, and Janice Stromsem of Arlington County, Va.; son, J. Stanley Mathews of Geneva, NY; six grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Bishop James K. Mathews died Sept. 8, 2010. He was one of the longest-serving bishops in the United Methodist Church. A memorial service was held Sept. 25, at Metropolitan Memorial UMC. Participating in the service were eight bishops of 24 who attended, including Bishop John Schol. The Rev. William Holmes whom Bishop Mathews appointed to Metropolitan UMC in 1974, also spoke.

CHARLES HOLTON ACKER JR.
1928-2010

Charles Holton Acker Jr. was born Jan. 3, 1928, in St. Petersburg, Fla., the son of the late Charles Holton Acker Sr. and Gladys Irene McCraven Acker. He was raised by his maiden aunt, Ida Acker. Acker graduated from high school in Trian, N.C., in 1942 and attended the University of Florida. He served in the Army Air Corps during World War II, and then the U.S. Air Force. He stayed in the Army Reserves and was called back for the Korean War to train others in weather bureau service.

He and Virginia “Gina” Burns met at the University of Florida, and married in 1947. Prior to his ministerial career, he worked in movie theaters as a projectionist then in an auto parts store. In 1955 he and his wife bought their own parts store, which by 1990 had grown into two stores and a Honda motorcycle agency, in Dunkirk, N.Y.

Acker became a licensed preacher in 1968 and started serving small country churches. He was a deacon and was ordained in 1973 and graduated from seminary in 1976. He served a church in Sheridan, N.Y., where he also started working at the Sisters of Charity Hospital in Buffalo as a chaplain.

In 1992 he came to New Windsor, serving St. Paul’s UMC, until he retired in 1998. He then took a charge at Flohrville UMC. His last church was the Johnsville UMC, but his ministry didn’t stop. He and his wife were curators of the Strawbridge Shrine from 1997 until 2004.

Acker filled in as a volunteer chaplain at Carroll Hospital Center and in December 1997 was awarded the Gold Star Employee of the Month, the only part-time employee to receive that award. In January 1997 he started as a State Police chaplain, working out of the Westminster barracks, and in 1999 was appointed as director of chaplains of the Maryland State Police, working in Pikesville. He was a member of VFW 1017 in Dunkirk.

He was predeceased by his wife Jan. 8, 2009.

Surviving are daughter, Melissa Lee Hopkins of Olean, N.Y.; son, Charles H. Acker III of Gaithersburg; five grandchildren, and five great-grandchildren, including Charles H. Acker V. Rev. Charles Holton Acker Jr., a retired associate member, died Oct. 1, 2010, at Shady Grove Adventist Hospital in Rockville. A funeral service was held at the Hartzler’s Funeral Home in New Windsor Oct. 6.



THOMAS JOON HWA AHN
1934-2011

Thomas Joon Hwa Ahn was born in Korea Oct. 7, 1934, and was educated there. He graduated from Duke Divinity School in 1966 and studied periodically in the United States in the 1970s. He settled permanently with his family in the United States in 1975. He and Sally Young Ahn were married in 1963 and had two children.

In his ministry, he served in Korean churches, including a short time in the West Michigan Conference and with the Korean Mission in the Western Jurisdiction. In the Baltimore-

Washington Conference he pastored Wesley Korean in Silver Spring for four years , Korean First UMC in Hyattsville from 1977 to 1982; Korean First in Mount Ranier 1982-1985; and 10 years at the Korean UMC on Cedar Lane in Beltsville. He retired in 2005.

After retirement he worked in commercial real estate investment.

**ZACARIAS J. CARDOSO
1928-2010**



Zacarias J. Cardoso was born in Angola, Africa, June 26, 1928.

He had the distinction of having served both as an Elder in the United Methodist Church and as a bishop in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Angola.

He transferred to the Baltimore-Washington Conference from the Angola Conference, where he had served United Methodist churches. He was elected an associate member in 1974, and appointed to Asbury UMC in Shepherdstown, W. Va. In 1977, he was appointed to Mt. Zion UMC in Baltimore. From 1982-1986, he served St. Paul UMC in Chevy Chase, then pastored Metropolitan UMC in Pomonkey from 1986-1991. He retired in 1991.

Cardoso had exceptional organizing skills as well as respect from others, which led Angolan United Methodist officials to ask him to return after his retirement. After the country had been in a violent civil war for 15 years, he was considered to be one who could best reorganize and revitalize the church. Leaving his family in the U.S., he responded to the call and returned to Angola in 1991. He stayed until a second retirement in 2002, when he returned to the United States.

In 1993, he was elected and ordained a bishop in the AME Zion Church and established the independent AME Zion Church in Angola, which now has more than 60,000 members.

Summing up Cardoso's life, Bishop Warren Brown of the Mid-Atlantic II Episcopal District of the AMEZ Church, said, "Some lives are long, but not full. Cardoso's life was full because he was gripped by an extraordinary passion. He lived his life not for himself but for others."

Survivors include his wife, Adelia Cardoso, two daughters, Esperanca Cardoso and Aurina Hawthorn; a son, Joaquim Cardoso; and 11 grandchildren.

The Rev. Zacarias Joao Cardoso, who served in the Baltimore-Washington Conference from 1974-1991, died Sept. 15, 2010, at his home in Waldorf. The Rev. Stephen Larsen officiated at his funeral Sept. 21, at the Good Shepherd UMC in Waldorf, the church he attended. The Rev. Donald Burgard participated in the service. Bishop Warren Brown of the AME Zion Church gave the eulogy, and Pastor Mike Hilson of the New Life Wesleyan Church of La Plata, also took part.



JAMES T. CLEMONS
1929-2011

James T. Clemons was born Oct. 17, 1929, to Mildred and Russell Clemons in Wynne, Arkansas. He graduated from Wynne High School in 1947. He received his undergraduate degree at Hendrix College in 1951, his Bachelor of Arts in Divinity from Perkins School of Theology in 1954, and a Doctor of Philosophy degree at Duke University in 1963. Hendrix College awarded him an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree and in 2005 named him their Humanitarian of the Year.

Clemons was an ordained Elder in the United Methodist Church in the Arkansas Conference, where he served churches in the 1950s and 60s, and was a staff member at Hendrix College. He was Chaplain and Associate Professor at Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa, before coming to Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C., in 1967, where he taught New Testament and Greek for 28 years. He was active in Chevy Chase UMC. While teaching, he led study tours to Greece, Rome and Israel. He retired in 1995, but continued to teach occasionally. The seminary named him Professor Emeritus of New Testament.

Clemons wrote a book on Syriac manuscripts and 40 articles on biblical interpretation, ethical and

social issues. He was an avid student of the life and works of John Wesley. He lectured and held workshops in 23 states, Canada, Iceland and Israel.

Clemons was known as a ground-breaking leader in suicide prevention, a topic he extensively researched for more than 25 years. He published more than 25 articles on suicide prevention and four books on the topic. He advised four Protestant denominations on writing compassionate policies about suicide.

He founded the Organization for Attempters and Survivors of Suicide in Interfaith Services (OASSIS) in 1997, and served as its president until it dissolved in 2006. Through his efforts, OASSIS was responsible for initiating and co-sponsoring several first national conferences on suicide prevention. His work with OASSIS was highly commended by former U. S. Surgeon Generals Dr. M. Jocelyn Elders, and Dr. David M. Satcher, and the National Council of Suicide Prevention. In 2009, he was awarded a Medal of Commendation from the U.S. Public Health Service.

Clemons was a life-long advocate and activist for civil rights. He preached against segregation in the 1950s and continued his advocacy in his latest book, "Crisis of Conscience: Arkansas Methodists and the Civil Rights Struggle," published in 2007.

In spite of being widely known as the consummate gentleman, he did not hesitate to challenge the inequalities of the status quo and prevailing assumptions. He courageously addressed important and controversial issues and worked to improve conditions for the benefit of everyone.

Clemons was preceded in death by his wife of 47 years, Barbara Pettingill Clemons.

Survivors include his daughter, the Rev. Margaret E. Clemons, pastor of Severn UMC; a son, J. Thomas Clemons of Port Clinton, Ohio; and three grandchildren.

The Rev. James T. Clemons died at the scene after being accidentally struck by a commuter train in Gaithersburg Jan. 14, 2011. He was on his way to visit his daughter, where he served as youth minister to Middle and High School students. Memorial services were held Jan. 29 at Severn UMC; Jan. 30 at Asbury Village in Gaithersburg where he'd lived for five years; and Feb. 26 at Metropolitan Memorial UMC. He arranged for his body to be donated for medical training and research upon his death.



**JOHN WESLEY COLEMAN
1926-2010**

John Wesley Coleman was born April 16, 1926, in Camden, New Jersey, one of five children of the late Rev. Howard R. Coleman and Effie Selena (Brummel) Coleman.

Coleman grew up mostly in his beloved Philadelphia, Pa., where he graduated from Central High School. He served his country bravely in World War II, spending more than a year in the U.S. Army in Japan, as the war ended. In 1953 he married the former Katherine L. Harris, with whom he raised three children and celebrated 52 years of devoted matrimony, until her death in 2006. Several years after the tragic, accidental death of his father in 1952, John Coleman accepted God's call to ordained ministry while serving as a young adult leader at the former Trinity Methodist Church in

Philadelphia. He earned his Bachelor's degree from Temple University in Philadelphia and Master's degrees in Divinity and Sacred Theology from the Crozer Theological Seminary, located then in Chester, Pa. Continuing a family legacy, this fourth-generation Methodist clergyman began his ministry life in Philadelphia and then served the Methodist and United Methodist churches for four decades, in Maryland, Delaware, New York, and Ohio.

Coleman served seven historic, African-American congregations, including some of the oldest in the denomination: "Mother" Zoar in Philadelphia, Pa. (as associate pastor); Cokesbury in Port Deposit, Md.; Union Memorial in St. Michaels, Md.; St. Paul in Royal Oak, Md.; Newman Memorial in Brooklyn, N.Y.; Ezion (now Ezion-Mt. Carmel) in Wilmington, Del.; and Sharp Street Memorial in Baltimore, Md. He led faithful laity in creating innovative ministries to serve these churches and their communities, including mission outreach initiatives, special choirs, Christian education opportunities and the Sharp Street Memorial Church historical archives still in operation.

Coleman was the first full-time executive secretary of the Community Developers Program at the General Board of Global Ministries from 1970 to 1977. The program, still active today, pioneered community organizing and social-change strategies among racial-ethnic churches in partnership with their communities. He left the board to become the pastor of Sharp Street Memorial from 1977 to 1984, and then he became the final superintendent of the former Baltimore-Southwest District before it was dissolved.

A year after retiring in 1988, Coleman became Associate Professor of Homiletics at the Methodist Theological Seminary in Delaware, Ohio. For three years he made imaginative use of curriculum and teaching methods to challenge and inspire fledgling preachers, helping many to develop a profound commitment to preaching the gospel.

Coleman, who did post-graduate work toward a doctorate in ministry, also taught at pastors' training schools and Christian schools of mission, and led Bible study for several annual conferences. He was a faculty member and board officer of the ecumenical McKendree School of Religion in Baltimore, which conferred upon him an honorary doctorate in divinity.

He served on the boards of a number of organizations, including the N.M Carroll Home in Baltimore, the United Methodist Development Fund and the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries; and he joined Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity while at Sharp Street. His earlier work at the General Board of Global Ministries took him to places and events around the U.S. and the world, instilling in him a passion for travel and for working with people and ministries near and far. His other passions included Methodist and Protestant history, all genres of music but especially jazz, football and other sports, poetry, art, literature and philosophy. His most ardent passion, however, was for his family and his faith in Jesus Christ.

Coleman is survived by his two daughters, Beverly K. Rawlins and Pamela Coleman; his son John W. Coleman Jr.; and a grandson. He also leaves behind his dearest friend, the Rev. Herbert Palmer of Philadelphia, who accompanied him into the ministry.

John Wesley Coleman blessed many lives through his own life and ministry as a man of integrity, respect, affection, charm, distinguished intellect and bold vision. While a resident at Simpson House in Philadelphia, he became ill and departed from this earthly life on July 8, 2010, at age 84. His death

followed that of his wife, Katherine, and two of his sisters. A memorial service was held at Sharp Street UMC July 23, with the Rev. Delylne Hinton officiating and Bishop Felton E. May offering the eulogy.

Steward Howard Frazier Jr. was born May 4, 1933, in Royal, W. Va., to the late Rev. Steward and Beatrice Holman Frazier. He graduated from DuBois High School in Mt. Hope, W. Va., in 1950. He was a graduate of West Virginia State University in 1954.

While a student there, he worked part-time for a veterinarian, and decided to pursue the profession. After a two-year stint in the military, where he was trained as a parachutist, he took up the study of veterinary medicine and graduated from the Tuskegee University (Alabama) College of Veterinary Medicine in 1962.

He had a full career as a veterinary medical officer for the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Food and Drug Administration and retired in 1992 after 32 years.

Frazier was a second career pastor who came from the American Baptist Convention, South in 1988, to serve in the Baltimore-Washington Conference. Frazier was first diagnosed with prostate cancer in 1986 at the age of 53. Radiation treatments caused heart valve problems and he had open heart surgery to correct them. At the same time, he worked toward a Course of Study degree from Wesley Theological Seminary and graduated in 1995. He also attended Howard University School of Divinity.

He kept a positive attitude through all the treatments, many of which had adverse effects. He was an enthusiastic walker, which was not only a way to cope, but improved his health, strengthened his body and lifted his spirit. He became an avid educator on prostate cancer, working with the national Prostate Health and Education Network (PHEN).

In April 2009, he was diagnosed with multiple myeloma, "However, my PSA remains normal, and I consider surviving prostate cancer for over 20 years to be one of the greatest achievements of my life," he said Nov. 10, 2009, in an interview.

He was preceded in death by a son, Wesley.

He is survived by his wife of nine years, Jean Evansmore, of Ellicott City; his former wife; daughters Myra Frazier of Ellicott City and Annette Sylvester; eight grandchildren and step-grandson, Nicholas, with whom he had a special relationship.

The Rev. Steward H. Frazier Jr., a retired Associate Member, died May 26, 2010, after battling cancer for some time. He donated his body to be used for medical education and research. The Rev. HAROLD GARRETT

1922-2009

In 1987, he was appointed to Lincoln Park UMC, and retired from there in 1989.

Garrett then transferred to the Wisconsin Conference and served two churches there until 1993 when he retired again and the family moved to Montpelier, Va. At the time of his death, Garrett was a member of the Wisconsin Conference.

At the same time he did what was needed to support her in the churches she pastored – Strawbridge UMC in New Windsor from 1998-2001, Jerusalem-Mt. Pleasant UMC from 2001 to 2003; and Ames UMC in Bel Air until she retired in January, 2010.

Blagmond's hobbies included photography and collecting antique model cars. He was a jazz enthusiast and an avid sports fan of basketball, football and baseball.

Survivors include his wife, a brother, nephew and great nieces and nephews.

LOUISE PYKE BOWLING 1918-2010

Louise Taft Pyke was born Jan. 30, 1918, to missionary parents, Frederick Merrill Pyke and Francis Pyke, in the Peking Methodist Compound in China, the year the great influenza pandemic killed millions around the world. The family lived in a part of China that was torn by continual battles among the various warlords vying for control of the local cities and towns. After the shelling, her parents, trained in medicine, helped treat the wounded soldiers.

In 1937, after a year at Yenching University in Beijing, Louise Pyke left China by the trans-Siberian railroad, through Communist Moscow, across Hitler's Germany, on to England, then the United States to attend Wellesley College.

After her arrival in the U.S., her parents and brother were arrested and sent to a Japanese prison camp in Manchuria, as were many other missionaries.

After college she taught school in Alabama and worked for the Board of Child Welfare in New Jersey, and earned two master's degrees along the way.

She met Herley Bowling while they attended graduate school at Drew University. They married June 1, 1947, and soon moved to the Oklahoma Conference of the Methodist Church where he served churches in Arnett and Norman. He was called back into military service in 1950 in the Korean War as a Marine Corps chaplain.

Louise Bowling moved a lot to keep up with her husband, who, after the war, pursued additional graduate studies at Drew University, and took a position with the National College for Christian Workers in Kansas City, Mo., for two years. From 1955-1968, he was appointed to the Commission of Chaplains of the Methodist Church, which required extensive traveling.

In 1969, he returned to parish ministry in the Baltimore-Washington Conference and served at Petworth UMC until 1974; Hillsworth-Chatsworth UMC from 1974-1981; and Otterbein and Aldersgate UMCs from 1981-1983. He retired in 1983. He died in 2001 after years battling Alzheimer's Disease.

Louise Bowling, living in Asbury Village, cared for her husband throughout his illness. She herself was afflicted with a serious loss of short-term memory. "Yet throughout it all she was the same charming, loving person, bearing the burden of her disease with grace and even humor," said her son Tim Bowling.

Survivors include two sons, Herley Jim Bowling of Los Angeles, and Tim Bowling of Derwood, and two grandsons.

Louise Pyke Bowling, 92, the wife of the late Rev. Herley Curtis Bowling and sister to the late Rev. James Pyke (who died in January 2010), died from a bone marrow disorder at Asbury Village July 2, 2010. The Rev. Rebecca Heber officiated at a memorial service in Guild Chapel July 24. Interment was in a private service at Arlington National Cemetery in August, 2010, alongside her husband.

1931-2010

Teresa Blackstone was born Sept. 18, 1931, in Annapolis. She studied at Howard University in Washington, D.C., and was an exchange student to Yale University and Smith College. In 1952 she earned a Bachelors of Science degree in Religious Philosophy with a minor in Education from Virginia Union University and a Masters of Education at Bowie State University.

As an educator for almost 50 years, she taught in the Louisiana and Maryland Public School systems. Her vision of equitable education helped integrate the New Orleans Public Schools and Louisiana State University. She was sent on assignment to Louisiana for a youth camp and while there, she was introduced to her future husband by Washington Conference Bishop Edgar A. Love. She married Rev. James C. Calvin in 1952. He was a former District Superintendent in the Methodist Church South.

Asbury UMC in Annapolis was Calvin's home church since her baptism and where she returned in 1972 after her husband's death. In the local church, she served on the United Methodist Women, sang with the Senior Choir, was a certified Lay Speaker, which she maintained since the 1950s, chaired Religion & Race and Grants & Proposals committees, Administrative Council and the Pastor's advisory Emmaus Group. In the Baltimore-Washington Conference, she was chair of Christian Personhood.

She founded the Living Education Center, "History Room" at Asbury UMC in Annapolis in 1982. She was especially proud to create an annual Ethnic Tea in the 1980s to celebrate diversity within the congregation, as well as to bring traveling choirs from the U.S. Naval Academy to expose the public to various music genres and youth to educational possibilities. Annapolitans best knew her for her beautiful operatic soprano singing voice.

Calvin served as a member of the Social Studies Education Assessment Team for the United States' People-to-People Ambassador Programs to Vietnam and China in 1993.

Survivors include four daughters: Jamesetta Lamartin, Ann Calvin, Lavenia Calvin and Lenora Calvin, all of Annapolis, one grandson and two great-grandchildren.

Teresa A.B. Calvin died suddenly May 4, 2010, just before Mother's Day. Her funeral service was held at Annapolis UMC May 15, preceded by a Delta Sigma Theta Service.

COMPENSATION FOR EXTENSION MINISTRIES

In accordance with the 2008 Book of Discipline, ¶628, every clergy member of the annual conference appointed to extension ministry shall furnish annually to the conference secretary at such time as the secretary shall direct a statement of his or her total compensation (including base compensation, travel, automobile, housing, and other expenses allowed and paid) for the year then ending, and said compensation of all clergy appointed to extension ministry shall be published in the journal of the annual conference.⁷⁵ When this information is not furnished, the appointment of the clergyperson shall be subject to review by the resident bishop and the cabinet. Clergy members are listed according to the categories of ¶344.1. District Superintendent compensation is set by conference policy.

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POLICY STATEMENT & PROTOCOL ON CLERGY SEXUAL MISCONDUCT OF THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

I. Policy Statement

A. Introduction

The pastoral office is a position of great trust, responsibility, and power. This trust and responsibility provide the opportunity for unique relationships of grace and caring. Persons in pastoral roles sometimes violate the trust given them by the abuse of their power. Sexual misconduct is one of the gravest violations of this trust.

This Policy Statement of the Baltimore-Washington Conference deals with the specific abuse of power by those in pastoral ministry who engage in sexual misconduct. The intent of this Policy Statement is to provide for the safety of parishioners by ensuring a protective climate, protect the special covenantal relationship between pastors and those to whom they minister, and ensure the health and authenticity of clergy persons in pastoral ministries.

B. Theological Reflections

Our relationship with and knowledge of God guides and illuminates our reflections on pastoral behavior and sexual misconduct. Some of these reflections are:

- God created us as embodied sexual beings, male and female; there is no dichotomy between body and spirit — our selves are not separate from our bodies (Genesis 2:18-25).
- God calls us to honor the integrity of our neighbors, and their authority over their own personhood (Deuteronomy 22:25-27).
- God calls us into covenant with each other within the family of God (Deuteronomy 14:1-2; Ephesians 4:14-16).
- God, through the church, calls pastors to witness to the preciousness of bodies, our own and others, and to declare that each person is unique and of divine worth (I Corinthians 6:19-20).
- God's grace, freely given through Jesus Christ, calls us to be channels of grace, not exploitation, and to be agents of healing and redemption. In light of these understandings, when we honor the complete integrity of another, we honor and remember the Body of Christ.

C. Definition of Sexual Misconduct and Statute of Limitations

1. Sexual misconduct is an abuse of power through sexual contact or activity, not limited to sexual intercourse, in which a clergy person violates the free choice, or abuses the vulnerability of a parishioner (adult or minor), client, church staff person, colleague, or any other person to whom the clergy person has a professional relationship in his or her ministry.

2. Sexual misconduct may take several forms, including sexual harassment and/or sexual abuse. Sexual harassment is a form of sexual misconduct and is defined as "any unwanted sexual advance or demand, either verbal or physical, which is perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating, or coercive." (1988 Book of Resolutions, p. 375. The policy on sexual harassment is further detailed in the document prepared by the Board of Ordained Ministry and adopted by the Annual Conference in June of 1992, see ¶2413, 2001 Manual on Policies & Procedures.)

3. Sexual misconduct breaks the sacred trust inherent in Licensing and Ordination. Any such sexual misconduct by a clergy person — as well as child sexual abuse, adult sexual abuse or sexual harassment — is a chargeable offense (2004 Discipline ¶2702). All clergy persons shall be responsible for their own behavior.

4. Any charges filed must be in the language of the Discipline in effect at the time the alleged offense was committed. Other limitations in the filing of complaints include:

- a. no complaint shall be considered for any misconduct which shall not have been committed within six years immediately preceding the filing of the complaint;
- b. in the case of sexual or child abuse, no complaint shall be considered which occurred prior to January 1, 1993; any offense of sexual or child abuse occurring on January 1, 1993 or afterwards shall have an unlimited statute of limitations (2004 Discipline ¶2702.1,4).

D. Definition of “Complainant,” “Respondent,” and “Victim”

1. In this Policy statement and Protocol, a “complainant” is understood to be a person who submits a written and signed complaint for arbitration.
2. A clergy person against whom a complaint of sexual misconduct has been filed shall be known as the “respondent.”
3. While a complainant may also be an alleged victim, the Policy and Protocol does not assume that the complainant is an actual victim. The term “victim” will be used in cases where either the respondent makes confession of alleged sexual misconduct or where the respondent is proven to be guilty.

E. Standards for Clergy Conduct

The following are standards which underlie this Policy Statement and its definition of sexual misconduct by clergy persons:

1. Clergy persons are responsible for avoiding sexual misconduct by establishing and maintaining appropriate personal and social boundaries in all interpersonal relationships.
2. Clergy persons are responsible for their conduct regarding the emotional, spiritual, and physical protection of all persons who come to them for help or over whom they have any kind of authority. Breach of this protective relationship is unethical and abusive even when sexual activities are initiated by the person(s) to whom the pastor is ministering. Because of the imbalance in power and trust in such a relationship, the person(s) being ministered to by the clergy person should be presumed to be unable to give meaningful consent to any sexual activity.
3. Because clergy persons often deal with individuals who are emotionally and psychologically fragile or personally vulnerable, it is imperative that clergy persons:
 - a. be as psychologically, emotionally, and spiritually healthy as possible at all times;
 - b. have adequate preparation and education for helping those individuals under their care and making appropriate referrals; and
 - c. have continued supervision to deal with the inherent risk caused by dependency and/or transference between the parties.

F. Responsibility to the Victim(s)

1. To be a victim of sexual misconduct is to experience a devastating betrayal of trust. The victim has trusted that the power and the authority given to a clergy person will be used for the well-being of all persons. In turning to a clergy person, persons become vulnerable and trust that their vulnerability will be respected and not abused. When a clergy person uses power to abuse and disrespect the trust and vulnerability of persons, the effects are painfully traumatic.

2. When sexual misconduct occurs, there are many victims: the person(s) who has been abused, the spouses and families of the abused person(s), the spouse and family of the respondent(s), and the congregations and the larger community surrounding them. While all these victims are not addressed by current disciplinary procedures of the United Methodist Church, all are hurt when sexual misconduct occurs. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team of the Conference will be available to provide assistance for the complainant(s) as well as appropriate intervention on behalf of the congregation(s) or the larger community (see Section III).

3. When allegations of sexual misconduct are made against a pastor, the complainant(s) and victim(s) will receive sensitive and respectful care both during the time of investigation and through the season of healing. By the same token, justice for the respondent(s) will also be maintained. Care will be taken to protect the privacy of the respondent, the complainant(s), and the victim(s).

G. Expectations of the Covenantal Relationship of Clergy Persons

All clergy persons are bound in a covenant of mutual respect and responsibility, including a call to exemplary living which incarnates the Gospel:

1. Because of this covenant with the church which pastors make upon their ordination or through licensing, clergy persons are called to remain faithful to the Church by not ignoring knowledge of sexual misconduct by other clergy persons:

- a. "knowledge of sexual misconduct" is understood to be specific information, not suggestions, rumors, or innuendos;
- b. this Policy Statement shall not be understood as granting other clergy persons permission to go searching for such information;
- c. a clergy person with knowledge of sexual misconduct by another clergy person is encouraged to approach the clergy in question directly and discreetly, share the knowledge, and encourage him/her to cease the behavior, and seek counseling and/or therapy;
- d. when a clergy person possesses knowledge of sexual misconduct by another clergy person and the second clergy person refuses or is unable to stop the behavior, the clergy person with the knowledge of sexual misconduct is encouraged to report the knowledge to the Cabinet and/or the bishop.

2. All clergy persons are to do their utmost to support those who feel victimized and to encourage them to submit their complaints directly. If, for whatever reason, individuals need assistance in submitting a written and signed complaint, clergy shall make every effort to help them file such a complaint. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team will be available to all clergy persons within the Conference to assist them in these efforts.

3. Clergy persons who are appointed to congregations where their predecessor has been sexually irresponsible find themselves living with the consequences arising from the misconduct of a previous clergy person. When friends in the ministry are caught in the web of sexual misconduct, clergy persons often find themselves caught between caring for a personal friend involved in sexual misconduct and caring for the health and authenticity of the ordained ministry. Intentional support from the bishop and the Cabinet is to be given to any clergy person who is appointed to a congregation where sexual misconduct by a previous clergy person has occurred.

4. Finally, the effects of sexual misconduct by a clergy person are also felt by both pastoral colleagues and the laity within the Conference. Whenever one of us acts in sexually inappropriate ways, all of us experience hurt and grief over the breaking of the special covenantal relationship between the clergy persons and parishioners.

H. Expectations of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations

1. The Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations of the local church is charged with monitoring the relationship of the clergy person to the congregation and cooperating, in an advisory capacity, with the bishop and Cabinet at the time of a change of a clergy person. Because of this role of leadership, members of the Committee have a responsibility to be alert to possible sexual misconduct and to report knowledge of sexual misconduct by clergy persons to the Cabinet and/or the bishop.

2. If, for whatever reason, individuals with grievances do not choose to file a complaint of sexual misconduct, members of the Committee shall do their utmost to support those who feel victimized by encouraging them to become familiar with the Policy Statement & Protocol and file such complaints directly. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team will be available to local Committees, or other personnel committees, to assist them in these efforts.

I. Suspension of Clergy Persons Accused of Sexual Misconduct

1. It shall be the policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference that the bringing of an allegation of sexual misconduct by a written and signed complaint against a clergy person shall qualify as “unusual circumstances” for the suspension of that clergy person to protect the well-being of the complainant, the church and/or the clergy (2004 Discipline ¶ 362.1c).

2. When a written and signed complaint of sexual misconduct is brought against a clergy person, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall immediately recommend to the Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry that the clergy person be suspended. The bishop and the Cabinet may request that the Executive Committee take immediate action through a phone conference when there is a matter of urgency. Upon the approval of the suspension by the Executive Committee, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall immediately suspend the accused clergy person from all clergy responsibilities, but not from an appointment, for a period not to exceed sixty days while procedures are followed. Suspension is a neutral category, implying neither innocence nor guilt, during which all parties will receive fair process (2004 Discipline ¶ 362.2, ¶ 2701 and sections # II.B. 9-11 of the Protocol).

J. Resolution and/or Reconciliation

1. At every step in this process, following the filing of a complaint of sexual misconduct, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall seek a just resolution and/or reconciliation among all parties. These efforts shall take place as a part of the “supervisory response” (2004 Discipline ¶362.1b).

2. At all meetings seeking such a resolution and/or reconciliation, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall insure that:

- a. no verbatim record shall be made;
- b. no legal counsel shall be present;
- c. the respondent may choose another person to accompany him/her with the right to voice; and
- d. the complainant shall have the right to choose a person to accompany him/her with the right to voice.

3. At the bishop’s determination, the Sexual Misconduct Response Team of the Baltimore-Washington Conference shall serve as the trained, neutral mediation team to assist the bishop and/or superintendent during the supervisory response. The bishop may consult with any other party whom s/he determines may be helpful in the healing process.

4. If the supervisory process leads to a resolution or reconciliation between all parties, the bishop may dismiss the complaint if s/he determines that no additional action is necessary.

If the bishop decides to dismiss a complaint for whatever reason, or if there is a reconciliation, the bishop and/or the Cabinet shall keep a record of the complaint, dismissal, or reconciliation in the personnel records of the clergy person and in the supervisory files of the bishop and the Cabinet.

K. Breaking the Silence

1. Breaking the silence when sexual misconduct has occurred has the power to release persons, both perpetrators and victims, from the bondage of secrecy, denial, and guilt that results from sexual misconduct. When bringing incidents of pastoral sexual misconduct to the attention of proper authorities, the greatest possible care shall be taken to assure that the least possible additional harm is done to the complainant(s) and/or victim(s), the respondent(s), and the congregation(s). Procedures will be followed strictly and carefully with respect for both the complainant(s) and the respondent.

2. When a written and signed complaint alleging sexual misconduct against a pastor is made, the bishop shall communicate in writing with the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, concerning: the nature of the allegations, but not the specific information; the meaning of suspension; and the procedures which will follow. This information shall be provided for sharing with the congregation(s) or other appropriate entity (2004 Discipline ¶362.1e).

3. Finally, when it has been determined that a clergy person(s) has engaged in sexual misconduct, clergy colleagues within the Annual Conference will be informed either through the Clergy Executive Session or through other appropriate avenues determined by the bishop. The Clergy Executive Session may vote to release the information to all members of the annual conference.

L. Double Jeopardy and Untruthfulness During a Judicial Process

1. Clergy persons shall not be subjected to a judicial process a second time for the same alleged occurrence(s), that is, “double jeopardy” (2004 Discipline ¶2701.5).

2. If a clergy person has been untruthful during a judicial process, this may be considered a chargeable offense. Such a charge of untruthfulness shall not constitute double jeopardy.

II. Protocol

A. Procedural Assumptions

1. All written and signed complaints of sexual misconduct will be taken as worthy of full investigation.

2. Presumption of innocence of the respondent(s) shall be maintained until such time, if any, as the respondent is proven to be guilty (2004 Discipline ¶2701, “Fair Process in Judicial Proceedings”).

3. The rights of those involved, including the complainant(s)/victim(s) and their families, the respondent and his/her family, and the congregation or institution, shall be maintained until all facts have been carefully considered and appropriate actions determined.

4. The bishop shall have the right of final approval over and supervise the implementation of all decisions and agreements reached in the process.

5. Whenever a complaint made against a clergy person involves misconduct that may be subject to mandatory reporting requirements with regard to civil processes, such as the sexual abuse of a minor or a vulnerable adult (e.g., the developmentally disabled), upon receiving such information the bishop and/or Cabinet shall consult legal counsel as to whether the allegations are in fact subject to these requirements and shall notify the civil authorities where appropriate.

B. Procedures When Sexual Misconduct Is Alleged

When sexual misconduct is alleged, all of the provisions of ¶362 (“Complaint Procedures”) of the 2004 Book of Discipline shall be in effect. In concert with ¶362, the following procedures shall be in effect as the Procedural Policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference:

1. Written and signed complaints may be received or initiated by the bishop and/or Cabinet. A complaint may be brought by a complainant(s) or by others who have verifiable knowledge and who are willing to pursue a resolution. If a complaint is submitted to a district superintendent, the superintendent shall promptly share the complaint with the bishop. In situations where sexual misconduct is perceived to have occurred, but where the complainant does not believe that a written and signed complaint is immediately necessary, the complainant may seek informal consultation with the bishop, Cabinet, or a trusted member of the clergy.
2. From the beginning of this process to its completion, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall seek a just resolution and/or reconciliation between all parties (see “Supervisory Response,” 2000 Discipline ¶359.1b). The supervisory response is not part of any judicial process.
3. The bishop and/or Cabinet shall meet with the complainant(s) and shall:
 - a. explain the process and the procedures to be followed in response to the complaint, including the meaning of the supervisory response (2004 Discipline ¶362.1b);
 - (1) the complainant(s) shall be encouraged to bring one support person with him/her to any meeting or hearing at any point in the process;
 - (2) this explanation shall also be completed in the presence of another person or persons, chosen by the bishop, who shall be present whether or not the complainant(s) chooses to bring a support person; one of these persons chosen by the bishop shall be of the same gender as the complainant(s);
 - (3) complete and total confidentiality is expected of all persons who attend any meeting or hearing during the process; and
 - b. encourage and assist the complainant(s) to provide a written and signed statement alleging sexual misconduct, and the related facts, making it clear to the complainant(s) that this information will be shared with the respondent.
4. The bishop and/or Cabinet shall make contact with the respondent to inform him/her that a complaint alleging sexual misconduct has been made. A meeting with the bishop, and/or Cabinet, and the respondent will be held as soon as possible to share: the allegations of sexual misconduct; the meaning of the supervisory response (2004 Discipline ¶362.1b); the meaning of suspension (i.e., “administrative leave”); the meaning of fair process (2004 Discipline ¶2701); and the process to be followed (2004 Discipline ¶362) and its purpose. The bishop and/or the Cabinet shall emphasize to the respondent the presumption of innocence and the right to fair process. The bishop and/or Cabinet shall also:
 - a. inform the respondent that the meeting shall deal with allegations of sexual misconduct including the fact that the respondent shall be granted “the right to be accompanied by another person to any judicial process hearing to which they are subject” (2004 Discipline ¶2701.3);
 - b. complete this explanation in the presence of another person or persons, chosen by the bishop, who shall be present whether or not the respondent chooses to bring a support person; at least one of these persons chosen by the bishop shall be of the same gender as the respondent; and
 - c. emphasize to all parties that complete and total confidentiality is expected of all persons who attend any meeting or hearing during the process.
5. At this meeting with the respondent, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall:
 - a. provide the respondent the opportunity to read the complainant’s written and

signed statement, as well as any other supporting materials; these are to be read in the presence of the bishop and/or Cabinet and shall be returned to the bishop or Cabinet before the end of the meeting; and

b. ask the respondent for a written and signed response to the allegations which is to be returned to the bishop's office within twenty-four hours.

6. The bishop and/or Cabinet shall provide the complainant(s) the opportunity to read the respondent's written and signed response, as well as any other supporting materials; these are to be read in the presence of the bishop and/or Cabinet and shall be returned to the bishop or Cabinet by the end of the meeting.

7. Following the meetings with both the complainant and the respondent, the bishop shall determine whether or not the nature of the complaint is "administrative" (a matter involving competency and effectiveness) or "judicial" (a matter involving a chargeable offense under ¶2702 of the 2004 Discipline). All administrative complaints shall be referred to the Board of Ordained Ministry. All judicial complaints (including all complaints of sexual misconduct) shall be referred to the counsel for the church who shall prepare, sign, and forward the complaint to the Committee on Investigation (2004 Discipline ¶362.1d.1).

8. When the matter is referred to the counsel for the church, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall also immediately recommend the suspension of the respondent to the Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry (2004 Discipline ¶362.1c).

9. Upon the recommendation by the bishop and/or Cabinet and the approval of the Executive Committee, suspension (i.e., "administrative leave") shall be in place for all clergy persons accused of sexual misconduct, whether or not the respondent confesses to the complainant's allegations. Suspension is not intended, nor is it to be interpreted, as punitive action toward the respondent; it is to be understood as a "neutral category" during which the procedures of this Protocol are followed:

a. during the suspension, salary, housing, and benefits will continue at a level no less than on the date of suspension; the congregation(s) or institution of employment shall assume these costs;

b. the person so suspended shall retain all rights and privileges as stated in the 2004 Discipline ¶329.2 and ¶334.1;

c. during the suspension, the respondent shall not communicate in any formal capacity, verbally or in writing, with members of any congregation s/he has served or is serving; specifically, the respondent may not present his/her case in any format outside of this Protocol during the period of suspension; all communication between the suspended pastor and the congregation(s) shall be through the district superintendent;

d. the cost of supply for the pastoral charge during the suspension will be borne by the Annual Conference;

e. if a settlement or agreement satisfactory to all parties is achieved at any point during the sixty days, the bishop shall immediately remove the respondent from suspension and shall also inform the Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry and the local Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee .

10. In the event that the respondent fails to appear for any supervisory interview, or refuses mail, or refuses to communicate personally with the bishop and/or district superintendent, or otherwise fails to respond to supervisory requests, such actions or inactions shall not be used as an excuse to avoid or delay any Church processes, and such processes may continue without the participation of such individual (2004 Discipline ¶362.2f).

11. Following the suspension of the respondent, the bishop, or district superintendent in consultation with the bishop, shall communicate in writing with the Committee on Pastor-Parish

Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, the nature of the allegations, but not the specific details; the meaning of suspension (i.e., “administrative leave”); and the procedures which will follow. All of this information shall be provided to the Committee for sharing with the congregation(s) (2004 Discipline ¶2701.8). If the respondent confesses to the allegations or surrenders credentials as a result of the allegations during the judicial process, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall inform the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, and the congregation, of the confession or of the reason for the surrendering of credentials.

12. Notwithstanding any of the above, in any of the communications to the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations or to the Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the identity of the complainant(s) shall not be disclosed except upon written permission of the complainant(s).

13. At any point in this process, the bishop and/or Cabinet may choose to consult with or employ the Sexual Misconduct Response Team. Steps in the deployment of the Sexual Misconduct Response Team include the following:

- a. the bishop or district superintendent shall inform the complainant(s) and the respondent that a Sexual Misconduct Response Team will meet with each party to enable feelings to be shared and expressed;
- b. one Team shall work primarily with the complainant(s) to help determine if a just resolution and/or reconciliation between all parties can be reached. No effort will be made to limit the complainant’s options in any way. The complainant(s) will be free at all times to continue the Complaint Procedure if that is his/her wish. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall seek to provide emotional and spiritual support for the complainant and/or the complainant’s family in any way possible. All information shared with the members of this Team by the complainant(s) shall be held confidential within the Teams;
- c. the second Team shall work primarily with the respondent to help determine if a just resolution and/or reconciliation between all parties can be reached. Again, no efforts will be made to limit the respondent’s options in any way. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall seek to provide emotional and spiritual support for the respondent and/or the respondent’s family in any way possible. All information shared with the members of this Team by the respondent shall be held confidential within the Teams;
- d. a third Team shall also meet with the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, to help insure that all issues of the congregation are heard. All information shared with the members of this Team by the members of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, shall be held confidential with the Teams;
- e. in cases where a complainant(s) is a member of a congregation other than the respondent’s current appointment, an additional Team shall also meet with that Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, to help insure that all issues of the additional congregation(s) are heard. All information shared with the members of this Team by the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations of the additional congregation(s) shall be held confidential within the Teams;
- f. when appropriate, the District Committee on Superintendency for district superintendents, or other appropriate personnel committees, shall be consulted if a superintendent or a clergy person in an administrative position is accused of sexual misconduct. Anyone seeking to bring a complaint of sexual misconduct against a bishop is referred to the provisions of ¶413 of the 2004 Discipline. It is important to begin the process of healing in the places where the clergy person has worked. Attending to the pain of a congregation where a clergy person has been accused of acting in sexually inappropriate ways is a vital concern of the Church.

14. If a just resolution and/or reconciliation between all parties can be reached, the Sexual Misconduct Response Teams shall report this to the bishop and/or Cabinet. Upon receiving the report, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall communicate in writing with the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee, to be shared with the congregation(s), or other appropriate entity, that a settlement or agreement satisfactory to all parties has been reached. In cases where the respondent has confessed to the allegations of sexual misconduct, or has surrendered orders as a result of allegations of sexual misconduct, the bishop and/or Cabinet shall so inform the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate personnel committee. In the event the bishop does not approve of the resolution and/or reconciliation, the matter may be returned to the parties, with the bishop's recommendations, for further discussion until the parties and the bishop reach a just resolution and/or reconciliation or until the parties and the bishop conclude no resolution and/or reconciliation can be reached. The Sexual Misconduct Response Teams will be available for further meetings with any of the parties for continued support and consultation and may make suggestions of further therapy or other referrals for either or both of the parties.

15. When the Committee on Investigation process is involved, the bishop, and/or Cabinet, shall inform the complainant(s) of the Committee's response immediately after the respondent is informed. If the complainant(s) is dissatisfied with the decision, s/he shall be informed of procedures the complainant(s) may follow. Any further action involving the respondent by the Committee on Investigation shall be made known to the complainant(s).

16. During all parts of the Complaint Procedure, complainants, victims, and respondents are strongly encouraged to initiate steps for personal healing, especially through counseling and therapy. The Sexual Misconduct Response Teams will be particularly available to any of the parties for appropriate referrals and support.

17. Notwithstanding any of the above, in any of the communications by the Sexual Misconduct Response Teams to the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the congregation(s), or any other entity, the identity of the complainant(s) shall not be disclosed except upon written permission of the complainant(s).

C. Reconciliation and Rehabilitation in Cases Where Sexual Misconduct Has Occurred

1. "Understanding Forgiveness." Clergy persons, like members of any profession, must be subject to discipline if they have not adhered to the professional standards they are expected to follow. It is important in this regard to distinguish the concept of "discipline" from the concept of "forgiveness." As the Body of Christ, the Church proclaims God's forgiveness to all who have sinned and who ask for forgiveness. A clergy person involved in sexual misconduct receives this forgiveness like anyone else. However, the fact that a clergy person is forgiven does not mean that the clergy person can avoid the consequences of actions amounting to professional misconduct.

2. "Permanent File." In cases where the respondent is found to be guilty of sexual misconduct but where a return to itinerancy is recommended, the record of the sexual misconduct shall be carried in the respondent's permanent file and disclosed to the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, or other appropriate personnel committee, in all future appointments.

3. "The Rights of and Responsibilities for the Victim(s) and Respondent." The bishop and the district superintendent will endeavor to:

a. initiate a process to seek healing and restoration for all of the victims including the abused person(s) and their families, the family of the respondent, and the congregation(s), and to also initiate a process to seek healing and restoration for the respondent; the Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall be one of the resources which may be deployed by the bishop or the district superintendent for healing and restoration;

- b. work with the present or new clergy person(s) to minimize further victimization by the attitudes of and actions by the congregation(s);
 - c. invite clergy colleagues, as appropriate, to be a part of the healing process;
- and
- d. clarify with the offending clergy person his/her moral and ethical responsibility for assisting financially in the rehabilitation of the victim(s).

D. Disclosure and Records in Cases Where Sexual Misconduct Has Occurred

1. Disclosure in cases of sexual misconduct is required. Such information shall be shared with the successor clergy person(s) and with present and future Pastor-Parish Relations Committees, or the appropriate personnel body of churches or institutions the clergy person has served.
2. When credentials have been surrendered because of sexual misconduct, the Executive Session of the Annual Conference shall be informed through the annual report of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
3. Full information of sexual misconduct and subsequent actions taken by the United Methodist Church shall be kept in the respondent's permanent record in the bishop's office. If a respondent surrenders orders as a result of sexual misconduct, the information regarding the misconduct (allegations, response, confession, result of due process, etc.) shall also be kept in his/her permanent record in the bishop's office.
4. A summary of the congregation's experience with the case of sexual misconduct, prepared by the bishop or district superintendent, shall be placed in the local church's permanent file in the district office.

E. Records in Cases Where a Charge of Sexual Misconduct Is Not Sustained

In cases where a charge of sexual misconduct is either withdrawn or not sustained by investigation, one (1) complete confidential record of the alleged sexual misconduct, investigation, and outcome shall be retained in the bishop's office. No other official record of the matter shall be retained.

III. Sexual Misconduct Response Team

A. Team Design

1. Neutral mediation teams within the Baltimore-Washington Conference will be recruited and trained.
2. In each complaint, three women and three men may be deployed. One Team will be assigned to the complainant(s), a second Team to the respondent, and a third Team to the congregation(s), or other appropriate entity.
3. Every effort shall be made to ensure that Teams are balanced with regard to gender, ethnicity, and lay/clergy participation.

B. Team Recruitment and Training

1. The Commission on Clergy & Congregational Care, in consultation with the bishop and Cabinet, will be responsible for the recruitment of all Team members. Any person interested in serving as a Team member may submit his/her name to the Commission. The Commission shall recommend Team members to the bishop and the Cabinet, who will review the Task Force membership; no Team member shall be selected without the approval of the bishop and Cabinet.

2. The Commission will also be responsible for the training of all team members and will assume all related training costs.

IV. Publishing of the Protocol & Procedures

The Policy & Protocol on Clergy Sexual Misconduct shall be published annually in the Journal of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

Questions and inquiries regarding the Policy & Protocol may be directed to the Chairperson of the Commission on Clergy & Congregational Care.

All clergy persons are responsible for being informed about the Policy Statement & Protocol on Clergy Sexual Misconduct.

(The original Policy & Protocol on Sexual Misconduct was first adopted by the Baltimore-Washington in October, 1992, and went into effect on January 1, 1993.)

POLICY STATEMENT & PROTOCOL ON LAY SEXUAL MISCONDUCT OF THE BALTIMORE-WASHINGTON CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

1. Policy Statement

a. Introduction.

The exercise of lay leadership and authority within the local church and the annual conference holds within it great trust, responsibility, and power. This trust and responsibility provide the opportunity for unique relationships of grace and caring. Lay persons within the church sometimes violate the trust given them by the abuse of their power. Sexual misconduct is one of the gravest violations of this trust and will not be condoned.

This Policy Statement of the Baltimore-Washington Conference deals with the specific abuse of power by those lay persons within any area of ministry with in the Conference, who engage in sexual misconduct. The intent of this Policy Statement is to provide for the safety of parishioners by ensuring a protective climate, protect the special covenantal relationship between parishioners and others within the church, and ensure the health and authenticity of all laity as a vital part of the priesthood of all believers.

B. Theological Reflections

Our relationship with and knowledge of God guides and illuminates our reflections on the behavior of lay persons and the relationship to sexual misconduct. Some of these reflections are:

- God created us as embodied sexual beings, — our selves are not separate from our bodies (Genesis 2:18-25).
- God calls us to honor the integrity of our neighbors, and their authority over their own personhood (Deuteronomy 22:25-27).
- God calls us into covenant with each other within the family of God (Deuteronomy 14:1-2; Ephesians 4:14-16).
- God, through the church, calls pastors to witness to the preciousness of bodies, our own and others, and to declare that each person is unique and of divine worth (I Corinthians 6:19-20).
- God's grace, freely given through Jesus Christ, calls us to be channels of grace, not exploitation, and to be agents of healing and redemption. In light of these understandings, when we honor the complete integrity of another, we honor and remember the Body of Christ.

C. Definition of Sexual Misconduct

1. Sexual misconduct is an abuse of power through sexual contact or activity, not limited to sexual intercourse, in which a lay person violates the free choice, or abuses the vulnerability of any other person (adult or minor), client, church staff person, or colleague, with whom the lay person comes into contact because of the lay person's position or area or responsibility within the church.

2. Sexual harassment is a form of sexual misconduct and is defined as "any unwanted sexual advance or demand, either verbal or physical, which is perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating, or coercive." (1988 Book of Resolutions, p. 375. The policy on Sexual Harassment is further detailed in the document prepared by the Board of Ordained Ministry and adopted by the Annual Conference in June of 1992.)

3. Sexual misconduct breaks the sacred trust inherent in baptism and church membership. Any such sexual misconduct by a lay person shall be seen as a chargeable offense (2004 Discipline ¶ 2702). All lay persons shall be responsible for their own behavior.

D. Definition of "grievant" and "victim"

1. In this policy statement of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, a "grievant" is understood to be a person who submits a written and signed grievance for arbitration.

2. While a grievant may also be an alleged victim, the Policy and Protocol of the Baltimore-Washington Conference does not assume that the grievant is an actual victim. The term "victim" will be used in cases where either an accused lay person makes confession of alleged sexual misconduct or where the accused lay person is proven to be guilty.

E. Standards for Lay Conduct

The following are standards which underlie this Policy Statement and its definition of sexual misconduct by lay persons:

1. Lay persons, both within the local church and the Annual Conference, are responsible for avoiding sexual misconduct by establishing and maintaining appropriate personal and social boundaries in all interpersonal relationships.

2. Lay persons holding positions of responsibility within the church are responsible for their conduct regarding the emotional, spiritual, and physical protection of all persons who come to them for help or over whom they have any kind of authority. Breach of this protective relationship is unethical and abusive even when sexual activities are initiated by the person(s) to whom the lay person is ministering. Because of the imbalance in power and trust in such a relationship, the person(s) being ministered to by the lay person should be presumed to be unable to give meaningful consent to any sexual activity.

3. Because lay persons often deal with individuals who are emotionally and psychologically fragile or personally vulnerable, it is imperative that these lay persons:

- a. be as psychologically, emotionally, and spiritually healthy as possible at all times;
- b. have adequate preparation and education for helping those individuals under their care and making appropriate referrals;
- c. and have continued supervision to deal with the inherent risk caused by dependency and/or transference between the parties.

4. Lay persons who are not members of a local congregation, the Annual Conference, or the United Methodist Church, but who may be working in a church facility with children and youth (e.g., Scout leaders, etc.) are expected to maintain the same standards of behavior as are members of the congregation of the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference.

F. Responsibility to the Victim(s)

1. To be a victim of sexual misconduct is to experience a devastating betrayal of trust. The victim has trusted that the power and the authority given to a lay person will be used for the well-being of all persons. In turning to the lay person, persons become vulnerable to the lay person and trust that their vulnerability will be respected and not abused. When the lay person uses the power and responsibility invested in that position to abuse and disrespect the trust and vulnerability of persons, the effects are painfully traumatic.

2. When sexual misconduct occurs, there are many victims: the person(s) who has been abused, the spouses and families of the abused person(s), the spouse and family of the accused lay person(s), and the congregations and the larger community surrounding them. While all these victims are not addressed by current disciplinary procedures of the United Methodist Church, all are hurt when sexual misconduct occurs. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team of the Conference will be available to provide assistance for the grievant(s) as well as appropriate intervention on behalf of the congregation(s) or the larger community (see Section 3).

3. When allegations of sexual misconduct are made against a lay person, the grievant(s) and victim(s) will receive sensitive and respectful care both during the time of investigation and through the season of healing. By the same token, justice for the respondent(s) will also be maintained. Care will be taken to protect the privacy of the accused lay person, the grievant(s), and the victim(s).

4. This Policy & Protocol also asserts the vital importance of extending pastoral care to the grievant. In administering the initial steps in the Protocol, however, it may not be possible for the pastor of the church to also provide pastoral care to the grievant. Pastors are therefore encourage, in consultation with the PPRC, to offer alternate pastoral care opportunities to either the grievant, the accused, or both. When the pastor presents such possibilities to the grievant or the accused, no assumptions should be made by either part or by members of the congregation, as to the pastor's disposition of the case.

G. Expectations of the Covenantal Relationship of Church Members.

Lay persons are bound in a covenant of mutual respect and responsibility, including a call to exemplary living which incarnates the Gospel:

1. Because of this covenant with the church inherent in baptism and membership, lay persons are called to remain faithful to the Church by not ignoring knowledge of sexual misconduct by other lay persons:

a. "knowledge of sexual misconduct" is understood to be specific information, not suggestions, rumors, or innuendos;

b. this Policy Statement shall not be understood as granting other laity permission to go searching for such information; if the information comes to a lay person, the lay person is to approach the individual directly and discreetly;

c. a lay person with knowledge of sexual misconduct by another lay person is encouraged to approach the lay person and share the knowledge, encourage the other party to cease the behavior, and encourage the individual to seek counseling and/or therapy;

d. when a lay person possesses knowledge of sexual misconduct by another lay person and the second individual refuses or is unable to stop the behavior, the lay person with the knowledge of sexual misconduct is encouraged to report the knowledge to the pastor, bishop, or the district superintendent.

2. Lay persons are to do their utmost to support those who feel victimized and to encourage them to submit their grievances directly:

a. if, for whatever reason, individuals with grievances do not choose to make a report, the lay person who has knowledge of allegations of sexual misconduct by another lay person shall make every effort to work with the alleged victim(s) to help him or her to make a full report of the grievance, especially including referring the grievant to appropriate places for healing;

b. the Sexual Abuse Task Force will be available to the laity within the Conference to assist them in these efforts.

3. A lay person who joins a congregation where other laity have been sexually irresponsible find themselves living with the consequences arising from lay sexual misconduct. When friends in the church are caught in the web of sexual misconduct, lay persons often find themselves caught between caring for a personal friend involved in sexual misconduct and caring for the health and authenticity of the church at large. Intentional support from the bishop and the Cabinet is to be given to both to churches and other areas within the Annual Conference where sexual misconduct by a lay person has occurred.

4. Upon request, the Baltimore-Washington Conference shall provide a list of legal resources, in addition to the Conference Chancellor, who will be available to offer confidential and legal counsel of any of the following: lay persons who themselves are now, or who once were, involved in sexual misconduct; lay persons or pastors with knowledge of sexual misconduct by another lay person; lay persons who believe they have been falsely or unfairly accused of sexual misconduct; or lay persons who may feel that they are victims of sexual misconduct. The purpose of this endeavor shall be to recommend legal counsel pertaining to sexual misconduct. Those providing such legal counsel shall also be asked to encourage any of the above to seek direct counseling and/or therapy.

5. Finally, the effects of sexual misconduct by a lay person are also felt by other parishioners within the local church, by pastors appointed to the church, and by the laity at large within the Conference. Whenever one of us acts in sexually inappropriate ways, we experience hurt and grief over the breaking of the special covenantal relationship between members in the Church of Jesus Christ.

H. Expectations of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations

1. The Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations of the local church is charged with monitoring the general health of the congregation. Because of this role of leadership, members of the Committee have a responsibility to be alert to possible lay sexual misconduct within the congregation and to report knowledge of such behavior to the pastor, and either the district superintendent or bishop. If, for whatever reason, individuals with grievances do not choose to make a report of sexual misconduct, members of the Committee shall do their utmost to support those who feel victimized and encourage them to become familiar with the Policy Statement & Protocol on Lay Sexual Misconduct and to submit their grievances directly. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team will be available to local Committees, or other personnel committees, to assist them in these efforts.

2. As an established policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, all lay persons, both salaried and volunteer, who work with children and youth shall be screened on an annual basis ("Questionnaire & Response Form on Sexual Misconduct by Lay Persons & Unappointed Clergy Who Work with children & Youth"). By action of the Annual Conference, the Questionnaire shall be administered by all churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference, and by all conference agencies which minister to children and youth. The PPRC of each local church, or the appropriate Conference agency, is charged with administering the Questionnaire & Response form.

3. In addition to the issue of sexual misconduct, as defined above in this Policy (#1.c.1-3), the Committee on Pastor Parish Relations may also be confronted with the related issues of sexual harassment or sexual abuse by lay persons within a local congregation or within the Annual

Conference. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team is available to the PPRC, and to other appropriate conference agencies, for consultation and suggested courses of action in responding to such issues.

4. The members of the PPRC shall be trained by the Conference Commission on Clergy & Congregational Care on issues related to confidentiality and sexual misconduct.

I. Suspension of Lay Persons Accused of Sexual Misconduct

1. It shall be the policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference that the bringing of an allegation of sexual misconduct by a written and signed grievance by a grievant against a lay person shall qualify as circumstances appropriate for the suspension of that lay person from any staff position held within the church or Annual Conference, or from any voluntary or elected position (2004 Discipline, ¶ 259.2.f.12) held within a local church or Annual Conference, to protect the well-being of the church and the lay ministry of the church.

2. When a written and signed grievance of sexual misconduct is brought against a lay person, the pastor of the church, in consultation with the district superintendent, shall immediately suspend the accused lay person from any area of responsibility within the local church (“administrative leave”), salaried or voluntary. In the case of salaried personnel, consultation with the PPRC shall also take place (2004 Discipline, ¶259.2.f.12). When the accused lay person holds positions of responsibility with the Annual Conference, either salaried or voluntary, the district superintendent and/or the bishop shall suspend the said lay person from all areas of responsibility. All lay persons against whom allegations of sexual misconduct are made shall be suspended for a period not to exceed sixty days while procedures are followed. Suspension is a “neutral category”, implying neither innocence nor guilt, during which all parties will receive fair process (2004 Discipline, ¶2701).

J. Responsibility to the Accused.

1. In every instance in which allegations of sexual misconduct are made against a lay person, every effort shall be made to maintain justice for the accused. Presumption of innocence of the accused lay person shall be maintained until such time, if any, as the lay person confesses guilt or is proven to be guilty (see 2.A.1). It is imperative, therefore, that the pastor, the chairperson of the PPRC, and the members of the PPRC adhere to the highest standards of impartiality throughout all of the proceedings. Throughout, the pastor and the chairperson of the PPRC shall reiterate, as often as should prove necessary, that the Protocol implies neither innocence nor guilt on the part of the accused lay person.

2. This Policy & Protocol also asserts the vital importance of extending pastoral care to the accused lay person. In administering the initial steps in the Protocol, however, it may not be possible for the pastor of the church to also provide pastoral care to the accused lay person. Pastors are therefore encouraged, in consultation with the PPRC, to offer alternate pastoral care opportunities to either the grievant, the accused, or both. When the pastor presents such possibilities to the grievant or the accused, assumptions should not be made by either party or by members of the congregations as to the pastor’s disposition of the case.

3. In cases where a grievant withdraws a written and signed grievance, or where it is determined that the allegations against a lay person are false, every effort shall be made by the pastor and the chairperson of the PPRC, or by the district superintendent and/or bishop in cases in the Annual Conference, to protect and rehabilitate, when necessary, the reputation and name of the lay person.

K. Breaking the Silence.

1. Breaking the silence when sexual misconduct has occurred has the power to

release persons, both perpetrators and victims, from the bondage of secrecy, denial, and guilt that results from sexual misconduct. When bringing incidents of lay sexual misconduct to the attention of proper authorities, the greatest possible care shall be taken to assure that the least possible additional harm is done to the grievant(s) and/or victim(s), the perpetrator(s), and the congregation(s). Procedures will be followed strictly and carefully with respect for both the grievant(s) and the accused lay person.

2. When a written and signed complaint alleging sexual misconduct against a lay person is made, it shall be presented to the pastor and to the chairperson of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations. The grievant, after consultation with the pastor and chairperson of the PPRC and under conditions of complete confidentiality, may decide to share the allegations with the members of the PPRC. If the allegations are to be investigated in the church, this information, in summary form, shall be provided for sharing with the congregation(s) or other appropriate entity of the Annual Conference.

3. If the accused lay person confesses guilt in such cases, or when it has been determined that the lay person is guilty, the pastor shall seek to forward such information to new congregations with which the lay person may affiliate. By so doing, churches in the Baltimore-Washington Conference agree to insure the health of the whole church to the best of their ability.

2. Protocol

A. Procedural Assumptions

1. All written and signed complaints of sexual misconduct will be taken as worthy of full investigation.
2. Presumption of innocence of the accused lay person(s) shall be maintained until such time, if any, as the lay person confesses guilt or is proven to be guilty.
3. The rights of those involved, including the grievant(s)/victim(s) and their families, the accused lay person and his or her family, and the congregation or institution, shall be maintained until all facts have been carefully considered and appropriate actions determined.
4. The bishop shall have the right of final approval over and supervise the implementation of all decisions and agreements reached in the process.
5. Whenever an allegation made against a lay person involves misconduct that may be subject to mandatory reporting requirements, such as the sexual abuse of a minor or a vulnerable adult (e.g., the developmentally disabled), upon receiving such information, the pastor in consultation with the district superintendent and/or the bishop and the chairperson of the PPRC, shall consult legal counsel as to whether the allegations are in fact subject to these requirements and shall notify the civil authorities where appropriate.

B. Procedures When Sexual Misconduct Is Alleged

When sexual misconduct is alleged, the following procedures shall be in effect as the Procedural Policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference:

1. Written and signed grievances may be received or initiated by the pastor, the district superintendent, or the bishop. A grievance may be brought by a grievant(s) or by others who have verifiable knowledge and who are willing to pursue a resolution. If a grievance is submitted to a pastor, the pastor shall promptly share the grievance with the district superintendent and/or bishop.
 - a. In situations where sexual misconduct is perceived to have occurred, but where the grievant does not believe that a written and signed grievance is immediately necessary, the grievant may seek informal consultation with the pastor, the superintendent, and/or the bishop;
 - b. In situations where the pastor initiates the written and signed grievance, the pastor shall excuse him or herself from the case; in such situations, the district superintendent shall

administer the Protocol.

2. The pastor and/or district superintendent in consultation with the bishop, shall meet with the grievant(s) and shall:

a. explain the process and the procedures to be followed in response to the grievance;

(1) the grievant(s) shall be encouraged to bring one support person with him or her to any meeting or hearing at any point in the process;

(2) this explanation shall also be completed in the presence of the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and/or PPRC members, who shall be present whether or not the grievant(s) chooses to bring a support person; one of these persons chosen by the pastor shall be of the same gender as the grievant(s);

(3) complete and total confidentiality is expected of all persons who attend any meeting or hearing during the process;

b. encourage and assist the grievant(s) to provide a written and signed statement alleging sexual misconduct, and the related facts, making it clear to the grievant(s) that this information will be shared with the accused lay person.

3. The pastor shall be authorized to suspend the lay person accused of sexual misconduct (i.e., “administrative leave”); from all responsibilities and duties within the church which shall be confirmed by the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations within ten days. When the lay person holds positions of responsibility within the Annual Conference, the district superintendent and/or bishop shall be authorized to likewise suspend lay persons accused of sexual misconduct from all responsibilities within the Annual Conference.

4. The pastor, in consultation with both the district superintendent and the chairperson of the PPRC, shall make contact with the accused lay person to inform him or her that allegations of sexual misconduct have been made. A meeting with the pastor and the PPRC chairperson and the accused lay person will be held as soon as possible to share: the allegations of sexual misconduct; the meaning of suspension (i.e., “administrative leave”); and the process to be followed and its purpose. The pastor and the PPRC chairperson shall emphasize the presumption of innocence and the right to fair process:

a. having been informed that the meeting shall deal with allegations of sexual misconduct, the accused lay person shall be encouraged to bring one support person with him or her to any meeting or hearing at any point in the process;

b. this explanation shall also be completed in the presence of another person or persons, chosen by the pastor in addition to the PPRC chairperson, who shall be present whether or not the accused lay person chooses to bring a support person; one of these persons chosen by the pastor shall be of the same gender as the accused lay person;

c. complete and total confidentiality is expected of all persons who attend any meeting or hearing during the process.

5. At this meeting with the accused lay person, the pastor, in consultation with the district superintendent, shall:

a. provide the lay person the opportunity to read the grievant’s written and signed statement, as well as any other supporting materials; these are to be read in the presence of the pastor and the PPRC chairperson and shall be returned to the pastor before the end of the meeting;

b. ask the lay person for a written and signed response to the allegations which is to be returned to the pastor’s office within twenty-four hours;

c. inform the lay person that his or her suspension (i.e., “administrative leave”) from all areas of responsibility, salaried or volunteer, is effective immediately. This suspension will

be submitted to the full membership of the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations for confirmation within 10 days.

6. Suspension (i.e., “administrative leave”) shall be in place for all lay persons accused of sexual misconduct, whether or not the accused lay person confesses to the grievant’s written and signed complaint. Suspension is not intended, nor is it to be interpreted, as punitive action toward the accused lay person; it is to be understood as a “neutral category” during which the procedures of this Protocol are followed:

a. during the suspension, all salary benefits for lay persons employed by a local church or by the Annual Conference will continue at a level no less than on the date of suspension; the congregation(s) or institution of employment shall assume these costs;

b. during the suspension, the accused lay person shall not communicate in any formal capacity about the accusations, verbally or in writing, with members of the congregation where he or she is a member or with members of the congregation where he or she is employed or with members of the Annual Conference agency where the lay person is employed; specifically, the accused lay person may not present his or her case in any format outside of this Protocol during the period of suspension; all communication between the suspended lay person and any other party shall be through either the pastor and the PPRC chairperson or the bishop and district superintendent, depending upon the circumstance;

c. in cases where the local congregation chooses to make use of the Sexual Misconduct Response Team, the Administrative Board or Administrative Council of such congregation shall be responsible for providing the team’s consultation fees; such fees shall be commensurate with fees used in the Policy and Protocol on Clergy Sexual Misconduct; when the Sexual Misconduct Response Team is requested by any other agency or committee in the Annual Conference in cases of lay sexual misconduct, such agencies or committees shall assume responsibility for providing the team’s consultation fees;

d. if a settlement or agreement satisfactory to all parties is achieved at any point during the sixty days, the pastor shall immediately remove the lay person from suspension; in cases where the lay person is employed by the Annual Conference, the bishop or district superintendent shall remove the lay person from suspension upon such settlement.

7. Following the suspension of the accused lay person, the pastor and/or the chairperson of the PPRC, in consultation with the bishop and/or the Cabinet, shall communicate to the congregation:

a. that the accused lay person has been suspended from all areas of responsibility within the congregation because of the filing of a complaint of sexual misconduct; the meaning of suspension (a period of time not to exceed sixty days during which procedures will be followed to examine the complaint and reach a determination in regard to it); and that neither the pastor, the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, nor any other member of the PPRC shall provide any further information or details to the congregation, or to any other party, about the nature of the allegations; and

b. that the exact format of this communication shall be as follows: “Within our congregation, a written and signed complaint alleging sexual misconduct has been made against (name of accused lay person). According to the Policy of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, (name of accused lay person) has been suspended from all areas of responsibility within our congregation during the period of suspension. Suspension implies neither innocence nor guilt but is a period of time not to exceed sixty days during which the PPRC shall make a determination of the matter. Neither the pastor nor any member of the PPRC shall provide any further information to the congregation, or to any other party, about the nature of the allegations. If you have a question or a concern about this process, a confidential telephone contact with the Sexual Misconduct Response

Team from the conference is available. The number is: (telephone number).”

8. The pastor, in consultation with the district superintendent and/or the bishop, shall provide the grievant(s) the opportunity to read the accused lay person’s written and signed response, as well as any other supporting materials; these are to be read in the presence of the pastor and shall be returned to the pastor by the end of the meeting:

a. when appropriate, the pastor shall bring the grievant(s) and the accused lay person together in a face-to-face meeting to explore the possibilities of resolution and/or reconciliation;

b. when resolution occurs in the process, the pastor shall communicate with the congregation or other appropriate entity, that a resolution between the parties has occurred.

9. The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall be the body within the local church charged with making a determination in cases where allegations of sexual misconduct are made against a lay person. When allegations against a lay person arise from settings within the Annual Conference, the bishop and/or the district superintendent shall designate the particular district or conference committee which shall make a determination in such cases.

10. In seeking to make a determination in cases of alleged sexual misconduct against a lay person, Committees on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other committees of the Annual Conference are encouraged to make use of the Sexual Misconduct Response Team:

a. the Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall serve as the designated trained neutral mediation team within the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church;

b. in such cases, the Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall provide consultation to the PPRC, or other conference committee, regarding: justice for and reconciliation between all parties; suggested approaches for the PPRC, or other conference committee, as it seeks to make a determination; and possible mediation in which all parties are assisted in reaching a settlement or agreement satisfactory to all parties;

c. Upon request, members of the Sexual Misconduct Response Team will be available to any of the parties throughout this process. Grievants, victims, and accused lay persons are strongly encouraged to initiate steps for personal healing, especially through counseling and therapy. The Sexual Misconduct Response Team will be particularly available to any of the parties for appropriate referrals and support.

11. In making a determination in cases where lay persons have been charged with sexual misconduct, the PPRC, or other appropriate conference committee, shall seek to arrive at a consensus (“an opinion held by all or most”) within the committee. While this is not always possible, great care shall be taken within the committee to ensure: that all facts in the case have been presented clearly and fairly; that all parties have had the opportunity to express their most deeply-held responses to the case; and that all feelings and opinions of committee members in closed session shall be fairly and sensitively received by the PPRC.

a. in cases where a settlement or agreement satisfactory to all parties has been reached, the pastor and/or the chairperson of the PPRC, or other appropriate committee, shall report to the congregation, or other body, that such a settlement has been reached; specific details of such settlements or agreements shall not be revealed to the congregation;

b. in cases where the lay person has confessed to the allegations of sexual misconduct, or has surrendered church membership as a result of allegations of sexual misconduct, the pastor and/or the chairperson of the PPRC, or other appropriate committee, shall so inform the congregation;

c. in cases where the PPRC, or other committee of the Annual Conference, determines that the allegations of sexual misconduct are either true or not true, the pastor and/or the

chairperson of the PPRC shall report the nature of the determination to the congregation;

d. in cases where the PPRC, or other committee of the Annual Conference, is unable to make a determination, the pastor and the members of the PPRC shall discuss other options with both the grievant and the accused lay person; when discussing such options, the pastor and the PPRC shall make clear to each party that the committee's inability to make a determination neither validates nor invalidates the nature or substance of the grievant's allegations or the nature and substance of the lay person's response to the allegations.

12. In cases where the lay person has submitted a written and signed confession to allegations of sexual misconduct, or in cases where the lay person has been found guilty of charges of sexual misconduct through the civil courts ("due process"), the pastor, in consultation with the bishop and/or the district superintendent and the chairperson of the PPRC, shall relieve the lay person of all areas of oversight and responsibility within the local church. When the lay person who submits a confession and/or who has been found guilty of such charges is serving in either a volunteer or salaried position at any other level with the conference, the bishop and/or district superintendent shall remove the lay person from all areas of oversight and responsibility within the conference.

13. Notwithstanding any of the above, in any of the communications by the pastor, the chairperson of the PPRC, members of the PPRC, or the Sexual Misconduct Response Team to the congregations, or any other entity, the identity of the grievant(s) shall not be disclosed except upon written permission of the grievant(s).

C. Reconciliation and Rehabilitation in Cases Where Sexual Misconduct Has Occurred

1. "Understanding Forgiveness." Lay persons within the life of the church must be subject to discipline if they have not adhered to the standards and expectations of membership. It is important in this regard to distinguish the concept of "discipline" from the concept of "forgiveness." As the Body of Christ, the Church proclaims God's forgiveness to all who have sinned and who ask for forgiveness. A lay person involved in sexual misconduct receives this forgiveness like anyone else. However, the fact that a lay person is forgiven does not mean that he or she can avoid the consequences of actions which amount to professional misconduct, especially in situations where the lay person is employed by the local church or be an agency of the Annual Conference. When such lay persons' behavior is determined to be "disqualifying", he or she shall not continue in any staff position within the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

2. "Permanent File." In cases where the lay person makes a confession as a result of the allegations, or is found to be guilty of the charges, the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or the Council Director (on behalf of CPPP), shall keep a permanent record of the misconduct in the church's files, or in the Office of the Council Director.

3. "The Rights of and Responsibilities for the Victim(s) and Accused Lay Person." The pastor, in consultation with the district superintendent and/or the bishop, will endeavor to:

a. initiate a process to seek healing and restoration for all of the victims including the abused person(s) and their families, the family of the accused lay person, and the congregation(s), and to also initiate a process to seek healing and restoration for the accused lay person; the Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall be one of the resources which may be deployed by the pastor, the district superintendent and/or the bishop, for healing and restoration;

b. work with the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, or other appropriate committee of the Annual Conference, to minimize further victimization by the attitudes of and actions by the congregation(s);

c. clarify with the offending lay person his/her moral and ethical responsibility for assisting financially in the rehabilitation of the victim(s).

D. Disclosure and Records in Cases Where Sexual Misconduct Has Occurred

1. Disclosure in cases of sexual misconduct is required. Such information shall be shared with the successor pastor(s) and, as may be wise or necessary, with present and future Pastor-Parish Relations Committees, or the appropriate personnel body of churches or institutions involved.
2. When an office has been surrendered because of sexual misconduct, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, or the appropriate personnel body shall be informed.
3. Full information of sexual misconduct and subsequent actions taken by the United Methodist Church shall be kept by the pastor in a permanent record and may be forwarded to the bishop's office. If a lay person surrenders an office as a result of sexual misconduct, the information regarding the misconduct (allegations, response, confession, result of due process, etc.) shall also be kept in a permanent record by the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
4. A summary, prepared by the bishop or district superintendent, shall be placed in the local church's permanent file in the district office of the congregation's experience with the case of sexual misconduct.

E. Records in Cases Where a Charge of Sexual Misconduct Is Not Sustained

In cases where a charge of sexual misconduct is either withdrawn or not sustained by investigation, one (1) complete confidential record of the alleged sexual misconduct, investigation, and outcome shall be retained in the bishop's office. No other official record of the matter shall be required.

3. Sexual Misconduct Response TeamA. Team Design

1. Each team deployed in case of alleged sexual misconduct against a lay person will consist of one woman and one man. When possible, each team shall also be racially inclusive.

B. Team Recruitment and Training

1. The Commission on Clergy & Congregational Care, in consultation with the bishop and Cabinet, will be responsible for the recruitment of all Team members .
2. The Commission will also be responsible for the training of all team members. The chairperson, or co-chairpersons, of the Sexual Misconduct Response Team shall be responsible for the assignment of team members to specific cases.

4. Publishing of the Protocol & Procedures

The Policy & Protocol on Clergy Sexual Misconduct shall be published annually in the Journal of the Baltimore-Washington Conference.

Questions and inquiries regarding the Policy & Protocol may be directed to the Chairperson of the Commission on Clergy & Congregational Care or to the chairperson, or co-chairpersons, of the Sexual Abuse Task Force.

Lay persons of the Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church are responsible for being informed about the Policy Statement & Protocol on Lay Sexual Misconduct.

Notes To Combined Financial Statements

Note 1. Nature Of Activities And Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of activities: The Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, Inc. (the Conference) was formed to provide for the promotion of the Christian faith, missionary, and benevolent causes.

The United Methodist Church, Washington Area Episcopal Office (the Affiliate) was formed to manage many aspects of the Conference, including presiding over sessions, overseeing fiscal and program operations, and to ensure fair process.

BWC Borrower, LLC was formed during 2009 to finance, manage, and maintain property and to operate a management business for this purpose. The Conference is the sole member of BWC Borrower, LLC.

Combining policy: The combined financial statements include the accounts of the Conference and the Episcopal Office, (collectively, the Conference). All intercompany accounts and transactions were eliminated for combination purposes.

A summary of the Conference's significant accounting policies follows:

Basis of accounting: The Conference prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenue is recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Basis of presentation: The Conference is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets.

Unrestricted net assets – Unrestricted net assets are the net assets that are neither permanently restricted nor temporarily restricted by donor-imposed stipulations.

- Operating – Represents resources available for support of operations.
- Plant – Represents resources restricted for plant acquisitions and net assets expended for plant.
- Medical Benefits – Represents resources designated by the Board to fund medical premiums.
- Designated for Loans – Represents resources available to fund the low interest loans to United Methodist Churches.
- Designated for Post-Retirement Health Benefits – Represents resources available to fund the future claims for post-retirement health benefits.

Temporarily restricted net assets – Temporarily restricted net assets result from contributions whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that either expire by passage of time or can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the Conference pursuant to these stipulations. Net assets may be temporarily restricted for various purposes, such as use in future periods or use for specified purposes.

Permanently restricted net assets – Permanently restricted net assets result from contributions whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by the passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by the Conference's actions.

The accompanying financial statements are those of The Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, Inc. and Affiliate only and are not those of the primary reporting entity. The consolidated financial statements of The Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church, Inc. and its Subsidiary have been issued as the financial statements of the primary reporting entity.

Cash and daily investments: Cash and daily investments include cash balances and interest earned on these balances through overnight sweep accounts.

Other receivables: Other receivables include amounts due from individuals and organizations related to the Baltimore-Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church for pension and medical costs. Management determines the need for an allowance for uncollectible accounts on a client-by-client basis. For 2010 and 2009, management determined that an allowance of \$193,694 and \$111,990, respectively, was necessary for uncollectible accounts.

Investments: Investment securities are carried at fair value. Accordingly, the change in unrealized appreciation and depreciation of marketable securities for the year is reflected in the combined statements of activities. Realized gains and losses on sales of investments are computed on a specific identification basis and recorded on the settlement date of the transaction.

Reserve cash: Reserve cash includes cash held by the Conference Trustees on behalf of a District in connection with the sale of church property. The funds are to be allocated at the discretion of the District Committee. During 2009, a portion of these funds were loaned to the Conference to fund the purchase of land to be used for the construction of a new conference center. The liability to the District is shown as funds held for others on the combined statements of financial position.

Cash restricted for construction: Cash restricted for construction includes cash that has been received from draws on the construction loan but not yet paid to the developer.

Promises to give receivable: Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Conference that is, in substance, unconditional. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increases those net asset classes. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same period in which the contribution is received, the Conference reports the support as unrestricted. Promises to give receivable are carried at the present value of expected future cash flows, net of unamortized discounts. Management determines the allowance for uncollectible promises to give receivable by identifying specific uncollectible accounts and by using historical experience. Promises to give receivable are written off when deemed uncollectible. Recoveries of receivables previously written off are recorded when received.

Concentration of credit risk: The Conference has cash and marketable securities in financial institutions which, at times, may be in excess of amounts insured by independent or governmental agencies. The marketable securities are invested with more than one institution to limit exposure to any one entity. The Conference performs periodic evaluations of the credit standing of those entities.

The Conference invests in a professionally managed portfolio that contains common stocks and bonds of publicly traded companies, U.S. Government obligations, certificates of deposit, mutual funds, and pooled investments. Such investments are exposed to various risks such as interest rate, market, and credit. Due to the level of risk associated with such investments and the level of uncertainty related to the changes in value of such investments it is at least reasonably possible that changes in risks in the near-term would materially affect investment balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Income taxes: The Conference, the Affiliate, and BWC Borrower, LLC (as a disregarded entity for tax purposes) are generally exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Income which is not related to exempt purposes, less applicable deductions, is subject to federal and state corporate income taxes. The Conference had no net unrelated business income for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009.

On January 1, 2009, the Conference adopted the accounting standard on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes, which addresses the determination of whether tax benefits claimed or expected to be claimed on a tax return should be recorded in the financial statements. Under this guidance, the Conference may recognize the tax benefit from an uncertain tax position only if it is more-likely-than-not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by taxing authorities, based on the technical merits of the position. The tax benefits recognized in the financial statements from such a position are measured based on the largest benefit that has a greater than 50 percent likelihood of being realized upon ultimate settlement. The guidance on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes also addresses de-recognition, classification, interest and penalties on income taxes, and accounting in interim periods.

Management evaluated the Conference's tax positions and concluded that the Conference had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the combined financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance. Generally, the Conference is no longer subject to income tax examinations by tax authorities for years before 2007.

Property, plant, and equipment: Property, plant, and equipment are stated at cost, if purchased or at the fair value at the date of the gift, if donated. Minor repairs and betterments are expensed in the operating fund during the year in which incurred. Depreciation on property, plant, and equipment is calculated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

Valuation of long-lived assets: The Conference reviews the valuation of long-lived assets and certain identifiable intangible assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Recoverability of the long-lived asset is measured by a comparison of the carrying amount of the asset to future undiscounted net cash flows expected to be generated by the asset. If such assets are considered to be impaired, the impairment to be recognized is measured by the amount by which the carrying amount of the assets exceeds the estimated fair value of the assets. Assets to be disposed of are reportable at the lower of the carrying amount or fair value, less costs to sell.

Apportionments: The Conference receives a significant portion of its revenue in the form of apportionments from the local churches that are members of the Conference. Apportionments are accepted by the local churches; however, they are not a legal obligation. As such, apportionments are recognized as revenue when received since the amount to be received is undeterminable until paid by the local churches. The Conference's apportionment policy is to include apportionments paid by the second Friday after the first Sunday subsequent to the date of the accompanying combined statements of financial position. Apportionments are used to fund mission and ministries of the Conference and General Church World Services.

Medical premiums: The Conference receives premiums from local churches that are members of the Baltimore-Washington Conference, the Conference Center and employees. These premiums are used to pay for medical insurance for clergy and lay employees of the Conference.

Pension plan income: The Conference is allocated gains and losses from the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. Gains and losses fluctuate based on investment earnings of the Multi-Employer Pension Plan administered by the Board.

Contributions: Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction is satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

During 2010, certain parsonages and church property of local churches that are part of the Conference were sold and the sale proceeds were contributed to the Conference to further fund its mission and programs.

Camping registration and events: The Conference receives registration fees from families for camps owned and operated by the Conference. The Conference also hosts numerous seminars and conferences throughout the year, for which registration fees are collected by the Conference. Revenue is recognized in the year such services and events occur.

Funds held for giving: The Conference receives restricted contributions from donors for various purposes. These contributions are directed by the Conference to a variety of organizations whose mission satisfies the donor restriction.

Other income: Other income includes receipts from workshop fees, subscription fees, and various other miscellaneous items.

Expenses: Apportioned funds categories represent the following:

- Discipleship – Represents all department staffing costs for the Council on Ministries and Council on Human Resource Development. Also, the activities of ministries, missions performed within the Conference, establishing new churches and the growth of existing churches. In addition, activities and programs undertaken to develop both clergy and lay religious education, and spiritual enrichment of all clergy and lay persons within the Conference.
- Stewardship – Represents all financial and administrative components of the Conference, including the treasury function, trustees, pension and health benefits for clergy and lay employees and costs of the Conference Center offices.

- Leadership – Represents costs for departments linked directly to the Bishop's office.
- General Church and Jurisdictional Apportionment – Represents funds collected by the Conference from local churches and designated by the Conference to send to the General Church and World Services.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Recent accounting guidance: In January 2010, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) released accounting guidance that requires new fair value measurement classification disclosures and clarifies existing disclosures. The guidance requires: (i) separate disclosures of significant transfers between Levels 1 and 2 and reasons for transfers; (ii) disclosure, on a gross basis, of purchases, sales, issuances and net settlements within Level 3 measurements; (iii) disclosures by class of assets and liabilities; and (iv) a description of the evaluation techniques and inputs used to measure fair value for both recurring and nonrecurring fair value measurements. The guidance is effective for annual reporting periods beginning after December 15, 2009. The Conference adopted the guidance during the year ended December 31, 2010.

Subsequent events: The Conference has evaluated subsequent events through June 30, 2011, which is the date on the combined financial statements were available to be issued.

The Conference has issued loans in which the total money related to the loans has not been expended to three churches as of December 31, 2009. Churches are not to begin repaying the loans to the Conference until the money is completely expended for the specified purpose of the loan. The total amount of loans receivable in which the churches are not yet repaying is approximately \$48,000 as of December 31, 2009. As of December 31, 2010, all loan funds have been completely expended and there are no loans which churches are not yet repaying.

Mortgage receivable consists of a mortgage from May 1993, which bears interest at a fixed rate of 10 percent and requires monthly payments of principal and interest over 20 years. The balance of the mortgage receivable was \$47,770 and \$68,446 at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

Note 4. Promises To Give Receivable

Promises to give are receivable from donors to fund capital purchases, specifically the West River Campus Dining Hall project. Promises to give receivable are carried at the present value of expected future cash flows, net of a present value discount. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Conference recorded a present value discount of \$1,504 and \$4,816, respectively. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Conference did not record a reserve for uncollectible amounts based on management's evaluation of the collectibility of promises to give receivable.

The Conference also owns approximately 570 acres of land used by the Outdoor Ministries. The land was donated to the Conference during the period 1948-1960 for which no value was determined and, therefore, is not included in the combined statements of financial position.

In November 2009, the Conference purchased land in Maple Lawn, Maryland at a total price of approximately \$1,300,000. The site was used for the construction of a new conference center.

In August 2010, construction of the new conference center was completed and placed in service. The total cost of this project was approximately \$6,400,000 and is included in buildings and improvements, and furniture, fixtures, and equipment.

During 2009, construction on the West River Dining Hall was completed and placed in service. The total cost of this project was approximately \$4,700,000 and is included in buildings and improvements.

Depreciation expense was \$413,811 and \$255,118 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

Note 6. Notes Payable

On April 16, 2009, the Conference executed a commitment for a \$2,000,000 loan for the construction of the dining hall at the West River Methodist Center. The Conference was required to invest \$2,000,000 in the project prior to drawing on the loan. During the construction phase, the loan accrued interest equal to the bank's prime rate and required interest-only monthly payments. Since the completion of the construction, the loan bears interest equal to the five-year treasury rate plus 300 basis points (5.01 percent and 5.69 percent at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively), with principal and interest payments due monthly through November 2014. A lump-sum payment of the remaining principal balance is due in December 2014. The note is secured by all building materials, machinery, furniture, fixtures, equipment, and all tangible personal property located at the West River Methodist Center. The balance on this loan was \$1,282,113 and \$1,485,458 at December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

On November 13, 2009, BWC Borrower, LLC executed a commitment for a \$6,000,000 loan for the construction of a new conference center in Maple Lawn, Maryland. During the construction phase, the loan accrued interest at a fixed annual rate of 3.5 percent and required interest only monthly payments, for a period not to exceed 12 months. Since the completion of construction, the loan accrues interest at a fixed rate of 5 percent, adjusted on the third anniversary of the conversion date to 5.25 percent, and on the seventh anniversary of conversion date to 5.5 percent. On the 10th, 15th and 20th anniversaries of the conversion date, the rate of interest is subject to adjustment if on the respective fifth day preceding the respective adjustment date, *The Wall Street Journal* (WSJ) Prime Rate, plus 225 basis points, equals or exceeds 8 percent; however, the rate will not necessarily increase to the WSJ Prime Rate, plus 225 basis points, but will be established based on then-current commercial lending practices. The note requires principal and interest payments due quarterly through December 31, 2033. The note is secured by the land, building, facilities, improvements constructed thereon, equipment, and a lien on the West River Methodist Center. At such time as the appraised fair-market value of the property equals not less than 143 percent of the principal balance outstanding on the loan, the West River Methodist Center will be released from the lien. The balance on this loan was \$5,980,000 at December 31, 2010.

Note 7. Pension Expense

The Conference participates in three Multi-Employer Pension Plans which are administered by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Conference provides pension benefits for all active ministers. Members of the clergy are covered by three plans. Services provided prior to January 1, 1982, are covered by a Defined Benefit Plan (Pre-82 Plan). As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the General Board determined that the Pre-82 Plan of the Conference is over funded by \$31,901,199 and \$29,594,557, respectively. The Pre-82 Plan contributions have been designated by the Conference as funds for future retirement liabilities. An analysis of the funding is performed annually.

Services provided subsequent to December 31, 1981, are covered by the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP), which is a defined contribution benefit plan. In February 2010, the Conference was notified by the General Board of Pensions that a MPP shortfall payment will be due from the Conference on December 31, 2011, in the amount \$934,371, based on an analysis of the plan funding. This amount is accrued for and included in accounts payable and accrued expenses on the combined statements of financial position.

Services provided subsequent to December 31, 2006, are covered under a Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP Plan), which has components of both a defined benefit and defined contribution plan. An analysis of the funding of the CRSP Plan is performed annually.

A characteristic of Multi-Employer Plans is that assets contributed by an employer are not segregated into separate accounts nor restricted to allow for matching of assets to liabilities of any one employer. As such, since plan assets are not segregated on a conference-by-conference basis, the Conference is not required to record a liability related to the Pre-82 Plan or CRSP Plan. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, the Conference had no past service liability related to the Pre-82 Plan or CRSP Plan.

Lay employees of the Conference are covered by a Defined Contribution Plan (the Plan). The level and thus the funding of pension benefits to individual participants of the Plan are determined annually by the Conference within certain guidelines established by the General Board of Pensions. The Conference contributed approximately \$239,000 and \$281,000 to the Plan for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

Note 8. Post-Retirement Medical Benefits

The Conference is on a pay-as-you-go basis for post-retirement medical benefits for all retired personnel and their spouses, widows, and widowers. The cost of post-retirement medical benefit premiums was approximately \$2,330,000 and \$1,957,000 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

The post-retirement medical benefits plan is a discretionary Multi-Employer Plan administered by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Conference can cease its participation in the Plan at any point in time. As of December 31, 2010 and 2009, \$17,882,625 and \$15,612,576, respectively, is available from unrestricted net assets of the Conference to fund post-retirement medical benefit premiums.

Note 9. Commitments And Contingencies

Guarantees: In May 1989, the Conference guaranteed a \$250,000 loan made to Franklin United Methodist Church with a local bank and trust company. The balance of the loan at both December 31, 2010 and 2009, was \$90,672.

On July 9, 1993, the Conference guaranteed a mortgage to Mays Chapel United Methodist Church for the total mortgage of \$675,000 at an interest rate of 9 percent per annum. The balance of the loan at December 31, 2010 and 2009 was \$342,988 and \$378,296, respectively.

Additionally, the Conference guaranteed a lease for Living Springs United Methodist Church. The property is located at 4831 Telsa Drive, Bowie, Maryland, and the original lease term expires on October 31, 2012. Living Springs United Methodist Church merged with another congregation in 2010 and the Conference is required to make payments on this lease. The lease requires monthly payments of approximately \$7,500, plus annual payments for real estate taxes and common area maintenance. An accrual of \$206,944 and \$284,000 has been recorded in the combined statements of financial position as of December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively, representing the total present value of remaining future lease obligation net of anticipated sublease income.

Contingent receivables: Contingent receivables of \$4,044,852 exist at December 31, 2010 and 2009. These contingent receivables are conditional donations made by the Conference to churches in The Baltimore-Washington Conference of The United Methodist Church, Inc. that will be repaid only if the church ceases to be a United Methodist Church.

Note 11. Lease Obligations

The Conference leases minimal office space in Washington, DC and Hagerstown, Maryland, as well as a copier and other office equipment which expire through May 2012.

Rent expense was \$381,309 and \$631,113 for the years ended December 31, 2010 and 2009, respectively.

In October 2009, the Conference executed a lease agreement with The United Methodist Publishing House of Nashville, Tennessee (UMPH) to provide space in the new conference center for the UMPH to operate a bookstore, which commenced in September 2010 for a term of two years. Annual rent is \$36,000 and can be increased by up to \$6 per square foot based upon overall sales growth.

Note 12. Endowment Funds

Interpretation of relevant law: The Conference has interpreted the Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act (UPMIFA), enacted in Maryland on April 14, 2009, as requiring the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date of the donor-restricted endowment funds, absent explicit donor stipulations to the contrary. As a result of this interpretation, the Conference classifies as permanently restricted net assets (a) the original value of gifts donated to the permanent endowment, (b) accumulations to the permanent endowment made in accordance with the direction of the applicable donor gift instrument at the time the accumulation is added to the fund, and (c) the change in unrealized gains and losses of invested endowments to the extent allocations do not reduce the endowment value below the original corpus. The remaining portion of the donor-restricted endowment fund that is not classified in permanently restricted net assets is classified as temporarily restricted net assets, until those amounts are appropriated for expenditure by the Conference in a manner consistent with the donor's stipulations or unrestricted net assets.

Return objectives and risk parameters: The Conference's investment policy is to provide a common investment vehicle, which will generate a stable and continuously growing income stream to support operations. The overall investment goal is to preserve the purchasing power of the future stream of endowment payout for those funds. Other goals include maximizing return within reasonable and prudent levels of risk and maximizing the value of the endowment while maintaining liquidity needed to support spending in prolonged down markets. The Conference seeks a return on investment consistent with levels of investment risk that are prudent and reasonable given medium-to-long-term capital market conditions and the investment objectives.

Endowment spending policy: The Conference follows the specific spending requirements of each endowment, and if there are no donor stipulations, the income is used for the purpose and mission of the Conference.

Note 13. Fair Value Measurements

The Conference has adopted guidance issued by the FASB which defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date and sets out a fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy gives the highest priority to quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (Level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (Level 3). Inputs are broadly defined as assumptions that market participants would use in pricing an asset or liability. The three levels of the fair value hierarchy are described below:

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date. The types of investments included in Level 1 include listed equities and mutual funds.

Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and fair value is determined through the use of models or other valuation methodologies. Investments which are generally included in this category include corporate loans, less liquid, restricted equity securities and certain corporate bonds and over-the-counter derivatives. A significant adjustment to Level 2 input could result in the Level 2 measurement becoming a Level 3 measurement.

Level 3 – Inputs are unobservable for the asset or liability and include situations where there is little, if any, market activity for the asset or liability. The inputs into the determination of fair value are based upon the best information in the circumstances and may require significant management judgment or estimation. In certain cases, the inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases an investment's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The Conference's assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement in its entirety requires judgment, and considers factors specific to the investment.

The following section describes the valuation techniques used by the Conference:

Level 1 – Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the measurement date.

Level 2 – Inputs other than quoted prices within Level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and fair value is determined through the use of models or other valuation methodologies.

Government securities and corporate bonds are valued based on their stated interest rates and quality rating.

Nonpublic mutual funds are valued at net asset value per share that may be redeemed at that net asset value at the date of the combined statement of financial position.

Pooled investments consist primarily of an actively managed bond fund and are valued using net asset value per share that may be redeemed at that net asset value at the date of the combined statement of financial position.

Level 3 – The Conference has no Level 3 financial instruments as of December 31, 2010 and 2009.

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
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
